ANNUAL ARTISTS AGAINST AIDS EVENT SCHEDULED FOR SATURDAY, OCTOBER 21

Event Benefits the Tarrant County AIDS Interfaith Network; Honorary Chair Carter Bowden and Featured Artists Michael Bane and Sue McCans

The 12th Annual Artists Against AIDS Silent Art Auction benefiting the Tarrant County AIDS Interfaith Network (TCAIN) will take place on Saturday, October 21 \from 7 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. at the Fort Worth Community Arts Center.

he presenting sponsor of the fundraiser is Pier 1.

Food, music, an open bar (wine and beer), and a silent auction are high-

lights of the affair, which features a selection of highquality art from local and regional artists.

Tickets for the Auction and Party are \$35. The Annual Artists Against AIDS Auction has raised \$166,175,000 for TCAIN over the past 45 years.

A selection of works that will be part of the silent auction will be on view at the Fort Worth Community Arts Center beginning Monday, October 2 and will remain on view through the event on October 21.

In addition to the silent auction, a raffle will feature items such as a ceramic vessel by artist Gregory Story and an elegant progressive dinner for eight.

This year the attendees at the auction will have the opportunity to vote on a work of art for the "People's Choice Award." The winning artist will receive a prize of \$1000.

This year's honorary chair is Fort Worth native Carter Bowden, owner of Carter Bowden Antiques on Historic Camp Bowie Boulevard. Michael Bane and Sue McCans are this year's featured artists.

Michael Bane was born in Kansas, went to college in Texas, and lives and works in Fort Worth. For the past fifteen years, Bane's work has concerned itself with an illusionary technique, employing tromp-l'oeil. Working mainly in acrylics, he creates compelling works that command the viewer's attention.

Sue McCans was born in New Mexico and received her BFA at New

Mexico State University. She currently lives and works in the Fort Worth area. In McCans's paintings, the concept of the changing nature of our knowledge and the growth of our understanding of the evolution of the universe in which we live is depicted with graphic simplicity. Circles and rings are her primary forms, chosen for their visual stability and their potential to serve as metaphors. Her work is mainly executed in acrylic on paper and canvas.

TCAIN has been compassionately meeting the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of people living with HIV/AIDS in Tarrant County and seven surrounding rural counties for over a decade. It is a non-profit organization that

depends largely on financial donations and volunteer services. Through a small staff and hundreds of dedicated volunteers, TCAIN provides inhome respite care, health education, spiritual counseling, prescription drug delivery, case management, HIV prevention education, and dental services.





Streetlights Today – UPDATE By Jon Shipley

Please take a few minutes to read this important appeal – some of you have received this already in the mail but others did not.

The time has come. You've been hearing about streetlights since time began and you've been seeing streetlights installed for the last several years, but now that is all coming to an end. This year marks the last appeal for donations to complete the project. December '06 is the end.

First of all, some thanks are in order. To all of you who worked the tour for year after year, to all of you who opened your homes, to all of you who raised matching funds and now have mid-block lights on your blocks, to all of you who donated outright — you are the people that have made streetlights possible through your support.

The neighborhood through the Candlelight Tour has raised \$230,000 for the streetlight project (yes, you read that correctly), enough for over three-quarters of the lights needed, and that's a huge chunk of money for a strictly volunteer effort. But a little more is needed.

There are still lights unfunded as of this moment, hence this last appeal. \$11,000 in additional donations

is still needed to complete this project.

Why all this is coming to an end, you may ask. There are several factors:

The City of Fort Worth has been supportive with subsidizing the cost of each light and installing at no cost to us. The City has continued to be supportive even though the original grant that we had with them has run out. We can not count on that support forever.

Every time the Streetlight Committee negotiates another batch of installations, we wonder if this is going to be the last time we receive the subsidy and free installation.

Moreover, the cost of manufacturing the lights has gone up, though we haven't been charged the new cost. So far the City has absorbed the difference, but again, that can't last forever.

Another reason for closing the streetlight project by December '06 is the length of time the project has run. Candlelight has been raising streetlight funds for over a decade, with the research and planning phase going on even prior to that.

It's time to organize one final push that will end with this December's

tour and then declare the project finished. Extending the fundraising indefinitely undercuts our focus with managing the project and dampens neighborhood interest. Streetlights were supposed to be a finite project, not a way of life.

So here's the pitch. We all have a vested interest in lighting the neighborhood. If every household in Ryan Place were to contribute \$150, we could fund the last batch of lights and finish every block.

Yes, many households have already given and have received lights for their block. Those same households may still want to see the project finished. And for those households that have yet to contribute, here is your chance.

Speaking for my household, I can say that I donated once already and thought my obligation was fulfilled. But for this last push, I'm willing to contribute again.

Streetlights were a good cause when we started this project together, and they are still a good cause.

December 31st will be the last chance to show your support.

EPHRAIM DAGGETT TO BE HONORED AT TEXAS TRAIL OF FAME CEREMONY OCTOBER 28TH

Ephraim M. Daggett will be honored on October 28th, 2006, at the 2006 Texas Trail of Fame Induction Ceremony in the Fort Worth National Historic Stockyards District.

The Texas Trail of Fame was established to honor those individuals who have made a significant contribution of our Western way of life.

Ephraim M. Daggett is being recognized for being a Fort Worth Pioneer and the Father of Fort Worth. Since he has no known surviving relatives, Daggett Elementary has been asked to receive this honor on stage for him.

Several Daggett students will go on stage to receive a bronze inlaid marker that will be placed in the walkways of the Fort Worth National Historic Stockyards District.

Throughout the walkways of the Fort Worth National Historic Stockyards District, bronze inlaid markers have been placed in recognition of their achievements. These markers are patterned after a frontier Marshall's badge and are inscribed with the Honoree's name.

On Saturday, October 28th, we will meet here at school at 8 a.m., take a bus to the Stockyards, attend a breakfast at 9 a.m. and attend the Red Steagall Cowboy Gathering where the Texas Trail of Fame Induction Ceremony will take place.


While on stage, students will be allowed to ring the historic

Masonic Bell. This bell was made in London in 1782 and brought to Fort Worth in 1857. It is only taken out on very rare and special occasions and is a tremendous honor, to be allowed to ring it, according to Mrs. Clara Ruddell, manager of Fort Worth Visitors Information Center.

All Daggett students and their families are welcome to attend the ceremony. I would like to see a large group of us attend this ceremony and honor Mr. Daggett. I will order as many busses as needed to transport us.

Ephraim Merrell Daggett (1810-1883)

Ephraim Daggett, merchant, legislator, and early promoter of Fort Worth, was born in Upper Canada on June3, 1810.

In Aril 1840 the Daggett's moved to Shelby County, Texas where they participated as Regulators in the Regulator-Moderator War.

At the beginning of the Mexican War Daggett joined Col. George T. Wood's regiment as a second lieutenant, but he was soon promoted to captain and attached to Col. John C. Hay's rangers.

At the close of the war Daggett returned to Shelby County, which he represented in the state legislatures of 1851 and 1853. At the suggestion of his friend, Major Ripley Arnold, Captain Daggett came to present Tarrant County in 1849 and located land for himself and friends.

As a property owner,
Daggett voted in the election
that established Tarrant County
and Birdville as county seat.
E.M. Daggett became a leader
in the campaign to move the
county seat to Forth Worth.

When the Texas and Pacific Railway planned its line through Fort Worth, Daggett donated 96 acres for a depot and tracts.

Captain Eph, as he was fondly called, devoted most of his time to the promotion of Fort Worth. He was known as the Father of Fort Worth.
