President's Letter

NEWSLETTER

Despite the constant bombardment of depressing news about the economy, in particular the negative impact on giving to non-profits, the news on Ryan Place giving has been just the opposite. As you are aware, our goal for this year was originally \$7,000 in contributions, equivalent to last year's giving. Just three-and-a-half months into the year, we've already hit that goal! As a result, the RPIA Finance Committee has adjusted our income projections by \$2,000 for a 2009 target of \$9,000. If we achieve this target, our membership contributions will have increased by 100% over what they were just a short year-and-a-half ago.



This strong financial support is enabling Ryan Place to fast track several improvement projects while at the same time maintaining a healthy operating budget. First, we have placed an order for Ryan Place street sign toppers. The fifty signs on order will complete a project started years ago by Candlelight Christmas in Ryan Place (CCRP). This RPIA project will mean that every intersection in our neighborhood will have a "Ryan Place" street sign topper by the end of May.

During the month of May, we will also begin improvements to part of Daggett Park. RPIA will be "adopting" a portion of the park between the South fence line and Elizabeth Boulevard. The fence line will be moved to the North and the current chain link fence will be replaced with a period, black, tubular steel fence. Ongoing improvements to this section of the park will continue into the Fall.

Speaking of parks, we are proactively working with the City to adopt Triangle Park. Once adopted, RPIA will submit applications for matching funds grants for the improvements in that park. And, through a generous contribution from Candlelight Christmas in Ryan Place, the gate landscaping projects at all Ryan Place gates will continue! Thank you, CCRP!

As you can see, after one-and-a-half years of record contributions, RPIA is focusing on the "I" in our acronym, which is "Improvement." I am confident that 2009 will go down as a milestone year in Ryan Place for noticeable, non-City funded neighborhood improvements. And remember, we are just beginning!

The RPIA improvements, in addition to the completion of the street light installation project by CCRP, will visibly demonstrate why Ryan Place is a vibrant and proud neighborhood. These improvements should also provide proof to all of how Ryan Place earned its recognition as the City of Fort Worth Neighborhood of the Year.

If you haven't done so already, catch the wave and become a part of this enthusiastic momentum by becoming a RPIA Sustaining Member today!!!

Finally, I hope to see you all at the largest RPIA event of the year, the Ryan Place Street Dance on May 23rd. It will be a great evening where we can celebrate being named Neighborhood of the Year!

- 7) Historic markers near College and Elizabeth regarding the Chisholm Trail and in Ryan Park (Triangle Park) regarding the Vin Fiz Flver
- 8) And who has ever used The Rvan Place Cookbook or eaten at some past Soirees without being grateful for the gifted chefs of Ryan Place!?

These are tangible, charming enhancements to the community we all enjoy-and there are probably hundreds of intangibles the joy of spending time with neighborhood friends during the holidays, the pride of homeownership and sharing that jewel with others, the feeling of accomplishment after cleaning, decorating, cooking, and hosting for thousands during a Tour, the feeling of nostalgia upon driving into the neighborhood, the fun of strolling our children, then our grandchildren, down our sidewalks, the comfort of nosy neighbors who watch out for one another. I cherish all these things and more; I love my home in Ryan Place and fight every day to keep it. I know we all share some of these feelings; that's why we're here and why we care so deeply about

So, I write these thoughts to keep everyone aware of what CCRP and RPIA (Ryan Place Improvement Association) do for all of us. We ALL reap the benefits of the hard work of dedicated volunteers who work year 'round putting on events and creating ways to keep Ryan Place beautiful, up-to-date, and vital — and continuously striving to make it better.

Purse-onal Safety

Hello, Everyone — here are some tips for personal safety: Purse snatches are most often committed as a crime of opportunity. Property loss and injury can be greatly reduced or prevented by following some simple crime prevention techniques:

- *If at all possible, leave your purse at home. Carry just what is necessary (ID, and money) in a wallet, tucked safely in an inside pocket. If you must carry additional items (keys, phone), consider putting them in a "fannie pack" that wraps around your waist and can be hidden from view with a jacket.
- *Bring only what you need. Don't carry any more cash or credit cards than you need to do your shopping.
- *If you must carry a purse, don't hang the strap on your shoulder, diagonally across your body, or hung on your arm. A strong strap will not yield easily and you could be injured.
- *Never carry anything more valuable than you can afford to lose.
- *Take notice of people walking or driving near you at all times.
- *Hold your purse tightly and close to your body. If possible, wear it underneath a jacket. Also, secure the purse closure.
- *Shorten the strap on your purse so you can carry it tightly between your elbow and body.
- *If someone grabs your purse, let it go! It is more important to avoid injury than to save a purse.
- *Report anything or anyone suspicious. If someone seems to be acting suspiciously, contact security if you are in a mall, the manager if your are in a store, or the police if anywhere else.

RPIA Meeting Notes

Monday, April 20, 2009:

Officer **Ron Andriotto** was not at the meeting and there were no new neighbors in attendance.

President **Keith Head** reported that train loading noise on 8th Avenue has increased, and is outside agreed-upon hours. There may also be air quality / pollution issues related to the trains. Solutions are being sought.

Fort Worth Animal Control Officer **Christina Hotch-kiss** presented a broad overview of stray and aggressive animal problems and advised of laws and codes currently in effect, as well as solutions.

Executive Committee Reports

President **Keith Head** advised that RPIA has met its contribution goal of \$7,000 and the Board has increased the goal to \$9,000 for budgeting purposes. Fifty street sign toppers have been purchased and will be installed in the next few weeks at every intersection in Ryan Place. The first Daggett Park improvements are scheduled for completion before the Street Dance.

Vice President **Mariann Taccia** reported that our new neighborhood e-mail system, Constant Contact, is functioning smoothly, and she presented a list of upcoming Ryan Place events.

Treasurer **Kevin Prigel** reported that the treasury contained approximately \$7,400 from memberships. Also, the Historic Overlay will soon go to public hearings.

Olivia Flynn reported that the Ryan Place Directory is expected to be delivered in June. The Calloway's Yard of the Month winners for April were **John Nowland** and **Peter Fowler** at 2521 5th Avenue.

Committee Reports

Gina Roberts asked for help distributing flyers on the Ryan Run to other area runs. Ben Broadwater volunteered to oversee the July 4th Parade. Gina also requested homes for the CCRP Tour and volunteers at every level.

Croquet Czar **Chris Ebert** quizzed attendees on their appreciation of The Game. (Gina aced it.)

Lana Campbell reported that the Street Dance will be BYOB, and that **7 Bridges** has a new sound man who is punctual.

John Kline announced that Traffic Calming is in the design stage and the sidewalk replacement program has been suspended due to budget cuts.






Volunteer and add this to your resume



Art is on the way!

As a first phase of applying for the City of Fort Worth Public Art award, Ryan Place has circulated petitions to discover whether residents support Public Art projects in the neighborhood. One of the petitions was sent via our new e-mail system to our 287 member neighborhood e-mail list. The results were overwhelmingly in favor of the application; of the 131 responses, 130 were in favor of applying for Public Art projects for Ryan Place.



The two agreed that John gets most of the credit for the recent landscaping, as he created new, asymmetrical beds flowing across the terrace. He plans for waves of color, with lots of yellow to complement the house. And, yes, John says a lot of his plants did come from Calloway's! Keep your eyes on this beautiful yard as it "grows up" and develops.

Timely Tip for May Gardeners:



This month is a good time for planting ground covers, either as a lawn or in other locations of your landscape. Now is the time for planting seed or sod for your lawn grasses. Bermuda grass has the best traffic tolerance, and requires full sun to prosper. It is very drought tolerant. St. Augustine grass has the most shade tolerance, but is the least drought tolerant and is most susceptible to diseases, insects, and iron chlorosis.

Other ground cover plants should be used where grass is difficult to grow or maintain. These can range from low growing evergreen shrubs, vines, grasses, perennials and even annual color. Groundcovers can provide solutions to a landscaping challenge or just add a bit of much needed texture and color. They help to define space and create various moods. Small-leafed, smooth textured groundcovers used in broad curved plantings can convey a feeling of spaciousness, whereas large-leafed, coarse textured groundcovers create a feeling of closeness.

Selection of a suitable plant for ground cover depends on the area where it will be grown. Some ground cover plants prefer partial shade, others thrive in deep shade or full sun; a few grow well in either sun or shade. Some, however, prefer moist soil while others need dry or well-drained soil.



Since the mid-1960's to the early '70's when the early urban pioneers began moving back from the suburbs into Ryan Place, it has been said that our Ryan Place "traditions are easy to be-

gin, but hard to stop." This month I have gathered four people who were there when some of our longest running activities began: the 4th of July Parade, the Candlelight Christmas Tour, the Croquet Tournament, and the Labor Day Garage Sale Weekend. These events have made Ryan Place well known in Fort Worth and all of north Texas. We have other activities -- the Ryan Run, the Chili Cook-Off, the Ryan Place Musical, the Porch Parties and the Mardi Gras Parade, but none have had the impact nor the longevity of these four.

In 1970, **Joan Kline** was at a meeting in her living room. (Joan and Art Kline had so many children that legend goes they always left the front door unlocked so none would be accidently locked out. Their house was always "open for any meeting.")

CE: How did Fort Worth's first neighborhood 4th of July Parade and picnic begin?

JK: Mel Dacus, the first RPIA president, suggested a parade on the 4th of July since up until that point in the life of our organization it had only been hard work and no fun! Mel, the producer of Casa Manana Summer Musicals, knew how to run a board meeting and throw a party. He made a few calls, called in a few favors, and that first year the parade and the picnic to follow had free Dr. Pepper and a band led by Joe Stecko, the Casa musical director, along with other musicians from the orchestra pit at Casa Manana.

Ross King, our neighborhood pipe organ builder, assumed the responsibility for the band at the parade and picnic the next year, and the Bottom of the Barrel Band came to be.

RK: The First Annual Rehearsal of RPIA Bottom of the Barrel Band, an egalitarian organization of musicians interested in justice and fair play, was established for the purpose of raising funds to preserve and encourage the installation of the historic two foot tall, iron, ring-topped hitching posts, a few of which remain along Elizabeth Blvd. (Note: BOB refers to the fivegallon paint barrel which, turned upside down, was the Band's first drum; BOB does not refer to what one finds when the wine or all the good musicians are gone.)

CE: Ross, did anyone in the neighborhood suggest that the BOB Band needed to have more than one rehearsal and performance each year or that the band might actually march in the parade?

RK: What, practice? In order to sound better? That might have defeated the real meaning of the band's name.

What "march?" No. We always depended upon Pendley's or Gary Brown (BRECO) for a flat bed trailer or truck for structure. Besides, none of the band members could walk and play at the same time!

Sarah Jeffers, her husband John, and their four children lived in the John Ryan house on Elizabeth. I always thought she and John moved there to be close to the baby-sitting training facility at the Kline house just across the street. Sarah initiated the Christmas Home Tour.

SJ: For a few years my family had gone with me on Mother's

Day to the Swiss Avenue Home Tour in Dallas. I loved their tour and began to think that we could do it also in Ryan Place. I thought of Christmas because everyone's home is at its prettiest and also so it would not conflict with the Swiss Avenue Tour. The offices of the Swiss Avenue Tour were very welcoming and helpful to me in answering questions about how they organized their event each year.

The Ryan Place home tour was an ideal project, since our homes were the "jewels in the crown" of the area, and it was time for them to shine!

CE: Did you have a goal in mind immediately or did you just want to have fun? Did you have any idea the Tour would continue for so many years?

SJ: Yes, our goal was to have a fundraiser to restore our gates that were wrongfully removed and to showcase our unique and beautiful neighborhood. Our pride in the neighborhood and in this tradition continued the tour, and as new children come along, it is a rich tradition to pass on to them, also."

CE: Ross, you have now been successful in stopping a tradition, the Annual Rehearsal and Performance of the BOB Band. Why and how was this done?

RK: Candlelight Christmas in Ryan Place (CCRP) was organized to raise funds to restore the twenty foot high gates at the entrances to Ryan Place, a goal ten times taller than the hitching post inspiration of the BOB Band. Women who are about ten times better looking than BOB band members organized CCRP. They raise a lot more money. The handwriting was on the wall for the BOB Band; who can compete against an organization with the initials CCRP?


CE: Joan or Ross, what was the most memorable 4th of July Parade?

RK: I'll answer that one. There were two years: In 1976. RPIA made a terrible mistake -- scheduling the 4th of July Parade a day early so as not to conflict with the City's Bicentennial Bash on the banks of the Trinity on July 4. Unfortunately this invoked divine punishment in the form of a terrible thunderstorm during the 3rd of July Parade. Witnesses claimed to have seen the fastest (and wettest) parade in history that year.

The next day, on July 4th, the City received its own divine punishment for scheduling a conflict on the traditional date for the RPIA Parade and Picnic and Annual Performance of the BOB Band. Punishment took the form of a second, even more major thunderstorm coming out of a Cloud from the East, raining out the City Bash on the banks of the Trinity, and extinguishing the City fireworks extravaganza.

The second was maybe 1980 when the BOB Band director wrote a special arrangement for the 3rd-4th grade violin novices, Mary Jane Ebert and Michael Gonzales, to play their instruments. (I think they only played one or two notes.)

CE: You three have used up all the NEWSLETTER editor-allotted space and we haven't heard from the Croquet Czar or the brains behind the Garage Sale Weekend (previously thought to be in the Federal Witness Protection Program). Their comments will be offered next month along with the results of the Twenty-Fourth Annual Ryan Place Croquet Tournament!
