A **CCRP DOCENT** is a person who volunteers for a four-hour shift in one of the Tour Homes. The docent is assigned to a room in one of the Homes. Small groups of people/tourists follow a prescribed tour route through the house and the docent in each room tells the visitors a few interesting facts about that particular room. The facts are supplied to the docent on an index card and it only takes a few minutes to "host" a small group in a room. It's an easy job; our guests are friendly and everyone is in a festive mood.

CCRP treats its docents well: during a four-hour shift, the docent gets a "break" with refreshments provided – but wait! There's more! Docents receive not only a FREE ticket to the Tour, but also an invitation to the Winedown – a fun party for the "insiders" on Sunday evening after the Tour with dinner and drinks – ONLY for those who served as docents.

Focus: Get Involved!

First, thanks to all of you for the proactive response to crime in the neighborhood. Although we have had to deal with some issues, particularly burglaries, in the past few months,

you are doing a wonderful job of being aware of your surroundings and contacting the Police when you need to. I know you care about the goings on in the neighborhood as much as I do; there will be bumps in the road, we will deal with them together.

My topic this month is about the prevention of crime through involvement. The easiest way to send criminals the message to "STAY OUT OF OUR NEIGHBORHOOD!" is to be united and for everyone to be involved.

Involved in what, you ask? Let's start with RPIA, which, from what I have seen, cares dearly for our neighborhood and its future. Go to the meetings, meet your neighbors, and have your voice heard. It is easy to become isolated, especially in the city, but you are never alone. Don't believe me? Come to an RPIA meeting and I'll prove it to you. Within the neighborhood association, you have the opportunity to be involved in many different activities that help make your neighborhood a better place to live.

Next, there's the Code Blue Program run through the Fort Worth Police Department. It does require a sacrifice of some time, but it is effective. Then, too, we have crime watch groups for individual blocks or smaller areas in the neighborhood. Crime Watch is about knowing you neighbor and watching out for each other. (Do we always get along with our neighbor? No, we don't. But, I promise that if your neighbor becomes a victim of crime, you and your family are affected. So, argue nicely about things, but refuse to let your neighbor be victimized by criminals.)

I could go on and on, but you're getting the point that there are many ways to be involved through RPIA or the City of Fort Worth. Remember, apathy is the enemy and it erodes everything. I know, I know there are not enough hours in the day – I have kids, I have a job, too – all very valid for everyone, but if you have even one hour a week you can make a difference in your neighborhood. And, always remember the message we send to criminals by being involved: "STAY OUT OF OUR NEIGHBORHOOD!" Keep up the good work and remember: be safe today and safer tomorrow.

RPIA President's Letter

Reflecting on 2009. . .



Here we are, winding down another year in Ryan Place with all the traditional holiday festivities. As we start planning for 2010, it seems a good time to reflect on RPIA's phenomenal year in 2009. Just think, Ryan Place was --

- •named City of Fort Worth/League of Neighborhoods "Neighborhood of the Year."
- •for the second year in a row, named **Fort Worth Weekly's**People's Choice for "Best Neighborhood Group."
- •received national recognition and a national award from Neighborhoods USA.
- •received over \$10,000 in Sustaining Memberships and increased our Sustaining Membership household count to almost 150. Our contributions increased 42% over those in 2008.
- •broke all participation records for the 4th of July Ryan Run.
- expanded our neighborhood social event schedule with the addition of the Summer Festival and enhancement of the Chili Cook-off.
- became the first neighborhood in the City to obtain final approval for a traffic management program valued at over \$600,000.
- •completed significant neighborhood improvements including:
- o lighting of two pair of Ryan Place gates.
- o landscaping of one pair of historic gates.
- the installation of Ryan Place street sign toppers at every neighborhood intersection.
- adoption of neighborhood parks and aggressive parks improvements program; phase one completion of new fence at Daggett Park.

No one can argue that this list of awards and accomplishments surpasses that of any neighborhood in the City of Fort Worth. Although I'm biased, I would guess that we would also rival many neighborhoods in the nation that don't have a required annual assessment for homeowner association dues and

neighborhood maintenance. We've accomplished a lot with voluntary contributions and volunteer help!

On behalf of the RPIA Board of Directors, I would personally like to thank all 141 Ryan Place households who contributed money through the RPIA Sustaining Membership Program — some contributed twice! I would also like to thank the many volunteers, most of whom are also Sustaining Members, who helped with our many events and projects this year. We also owe the local businesses who have graciously sponsored Ryan Place events and advertised in the Newsletter a debt of gratitude.

As we think ahead to 2010, imagine what kinds of improvements we can make in Ryan Place if more residents pitched in and helped with our projects and activities – Ryan Place would benefit, but no more than those working together for all of our good. Believe it or not, Ryan Place will be an increasingly safe place as more of us get involved and get to know each other. And, of course, the more people who contribute financially through the Sustaining Membership Program, the more we can invest into improving our neighborhood.

During 2010, RPIA plans to continue with the momentum we've built over the last two years. We need your help. All of us benefit from what RPIA does and all of us should participate with the Association as we make Ryan Place the standard, the leader (the envy!) of other Fort Worth neighborhoods. Project Status

Due to concerns regarding delays on the Ryan Place traffic calming projects, RPIA President Keith Head contacted City Councilmember Joel Burns for official word on the issue. Bill Verkest, City Director of Transportation and Public Works (TPW) Dept., sent the following information:

"We are currently negotiating a consultant agreement to design the traffic calming devices and plan on a notice to proceed to the consultant by the end of November. Design will take about six months. Following public input and the letting process will put us at about October, 2010 for construction start with a completion date of March, 2011. This is truly the worst case scenario. Thanks!"

Yet another look at the by-laws . . .

Since its inception in 1979, RPIA has revised its governing bylaws on numerous occasions. Over the years these numerous patchwork revisions resulted in a document that was difficult to understand and full of ambiguity. Recognizing this, a committee was chartered to draft a set of by-laws that were concise, legally sound, and supported the goals of RPIA.

To accomplish their goals, the committee researched by-laws of many successful neighborhood associations in Fort Worth and across the nation to formulate a document that would best serve RPIA. The draft includes three proposed changes:

Voting Eligibility - Under the current by-laws, all Ryan Place residents and residential property owners over 18 years of age are considered part of the general membership of RPIA. The general membership votes on any proposed by-law change as well as in the election of the board members (officers and street directors). The elected board members serve as representatives and are responsible for making all the "day-to-day" decisions pertinent to RPIA. The proposed by-laws are similar in that all Ryan Place residents are considered RPIA members, but add the requirement that one must be a "Sustaining Member" to elect board members or vote on proposed by-law changes. A "Sustaining Member" is defined as a general member who has contributed an amount greater than or equal to the minimum annual contribution as established by the Board of Directors (currently a \$35/year contribution) for that year. This change is being recommended to protect RPIA's primary source of revenue—donations received from the Sustaining Membership program. It is worth noting that any and all other issues that would go before residents for a vote would be sanctioned by the City – examples would be the approval of the traffic management proposals or the proposed historic overlay. A City sanctioned vote is not governed by RPIA By-laws; RPIA would only serve as facilitator to conduct the vote for the City under the rules/guidelines of the City.

Requirements for Board Members - A proposed change to the byl-aws also prescribes that all elected board members must meet the "sustaining membership" requirement in order to serve.

Board Member Terms - The current byl-aws call for board member elections to occur at the November general meeting, with all elected board members serving one-year terms. Members of the executive board are limited to serving no more than two years in the same position. The proposed change extends terms to two years in length. Elections still occur every year at the November meeting with different positions elected in staggered years. The proposed change also eliminates the restriction on the number of terms that can be served by a board member.

The adoption of these by-laws will be brought to vote at the November RPIA meeting on Monday, November 16th. Both the existing and proposed by-laws are posted on the RPIA website, HistoricRyanPlace.org, under "Current Issues," or you may re-

Planting Spring Flowering Bulbs in Fall

Spring flowering bulbs are such a welcoming sight after those long winter months. Many of the spring flowering bulbs require an artificial "chilling" process before they can be planted. This is generally accomplished by placing the bulbs in a paper bag in the vegetable crisper of your refrigerator for six to eight weeks prior to planting. However, Calloway's Nursery is offering to do that for you. We have many varieties of Tulips, Hyacinths, and Narcissus, which you can purchase from our stores now and pick-up in December, ready to plant. Let us simplify those "chilling" requirements for you!

When planting bulbs, the general rule is to plant them at a depth three times the diameter of the bulb. Use Calloway's Blood & Bone Meal at planting for added nutrients. 




Halloween 2009 For All of Us


Our household has been collecting data on our trick or treat activity here on S. Adams for at least two decades. We have counted the number of people who came up to our porch to receive a small amount of candy — some in costumes, some not, some are carried or pushed, some are running from house to house, some of the appropriate age for such activity, others wishing they were. Being a block south of the epicenter of the activity, we get a small fraction of those on Elizabeth, but, last night we set a twenty-first century high record of 656 "guests."

Keith Head spoke with Russ Wiles from the City and has provided the following information to residents who expressed their concern on several issues at the October RPIA meeting:

- 1. <u>Hemphill Quiet Zone</u> project on schedule for target date April, 2011. Roadway plans over 90% complete. City will send plans to TxDOT soon for their review and approval. Roadway construction should start sometime in 2010; RR crossing construction, early in 2011.
- 2. <u>Visual pollution on 8th Avenue</u> Russ Wiles is preparing a map of the strip of land beside the 8th Ave rail yard between Jessamine and Braum's. Mr. Wiles will talk to the Forestry Division of Parks and Community Development about the possibility of planting additional shrubs and trees between those that are already there. If we were to proceed with this project, it would be at the expense of RPIA.
- 3. Lipscomb Vegetation Issue Russ Wiles expressed concern that if he called the Forestry Department, they would take out all the vegetation; such clearing would completely expose the tracks to view. Instead, he suggested that RPIA contact the Forestry Department and specifically tell them what we would like in terms of vegetation clean up. He also suggested that someone from RPIA who is familiar with what we would like to have done be there when the crew comes out. Derek Arneson, Street Director for Lipscomb and Alston, has been asked to serve in this capacity.

College Avenue Reconstruction Information



RPIA President Keith Head has investigated the delay of the College Avenue reconstruction project. According to City officials, it appears that the reason was a combination of a request by "residents on College or in the area" and also a church on Lipscomb. At the time that the Ryan Place residents made the request to delay the project on College, there was to have been a College Avenue house on the CCRP tour. That house, however, was replaced on the tour this year.

At the same time, a church on Lipscomb didn't want the street in front of their building to be torn up during the Christmas season. They requested that Lipscomb be moved up in the schedule.

According to Mr. Anderson from the City, "To accommodate those concerns, we altered the order in which the streets were to be re-done. These were good faith actions to accommodate what we believed to be relevant to the whole neighborhood, but obviously that is not the case."

Keith Head's comment was: "I've expressed my concern to [Councilmember] Joel Burns and City staff that RPIA, and particularly the RPIA Streets and Traffic Committee, weren't consulted prior to this decision being made. As I've stated before, any resident has the right to express their concerns and opinions to City Hall, but, like it or not, for over 30 years, RPIA has been the "official" voice of Ryan Place to City Hall."


