# RPIA PRESIDENT'S LETTER

The City of Fort Worth has started construction on the Hemphill West Quiet Zone Project. This project is to create a quiet zone at five railroad crossings so the routine sounding of train horns no longer happens. Five railroad crossings are to be modified in this project:

- Jennings Avenue add curb and gutter on the north side of the tracks
- Page Street convert street at the tracks to one-way westbound traffic flow
- Hemphill Street install center concrete median
- Capps Street convert street at the tracks to one-way westbound traffic flow
- Lipscomb Avenue install a wayside horn system

The city's roadway contractor started April 11 and should conclude the roadway modifications in July. Then in a follow up project, the BNSF Railway Company has been given their go-ahead to order and install railroad signal upgrades at each crossing; they report that their work will take 6 to 9 months to complete.

Finally, the City will coordinate with the Federal Railroad Administration and certify each crossing as a quiet zone immediately after all construction work is complete.

Thank you to all the Ryan Place volunteers and City staff that helped make this happen.

# FAIR MOUNT HOME TOUR.

**Fort Worth, Texas** -- More than 1,500 visitors will gather in Fort Worth's Fairmount neighborhood over Mother's Day Weekend to celebrate the rich history of the Southwest's largest historic district.

The Fairmount Tour of Homes will take place May 7-8 from noon to 6:00 p.m. and will kick off with a neighborhood parade at 10:00 a.m. Saturday. The event will feature an expanded Artist Fair with local artists and craftspeople showcasing their goods at the Welcome Pavilion located at Zio Carlo - Magnolia Brew Pub.

This year's tour will showcase multiple beautifully restored homes, a renovated commercial property, a new construction home built in an appropriate historic style, and a "work in progress" home to give visitors a behind-the-scenes look at home restoration.

"We're featuring a wide variety of properties this year," said Chelsie Thornton, co-director of the event. "It's such a treat to see inside these places and learn about their architectural history."

New additions to the event will highlight the neighborhood's urban charm as well as provide added convenience for tour attendees. Fairmount Bike Taxi will provide complimentary pedicab service between tour stops. Those hoping to grab a quick bite during the event can either visit one of Magnolia Avenue's many restaurants or the food truck rally that will take up temporary residence in the parking lot of SiNiCa Glass Studios.

"Our goal is for visitors to leave with a sense of what makes Fairmount such a great place to live. Part of its appeal is that it's become such a walkable, urban neighborhood while maintaining its historical roots," said Ashley Paz, co-director of the event.

Proceeds of the tour benefit the Fairmount Neighborhood Association, a 501(c)(3) organization, and its mission to preserve, restore and maintain the Fairmount neighborhood and surrounding historic district.

Located in the heart of Fort Worth, Texas, and covering nearly a square mile, the Fairmount Southside Historic District contains one of the richest collections of turn-of-the-century housing. Fairmount, comprised of 20 subdivisions platted between 1883 and 1907, was a fashionable and thriving neighborhood in the 1920s. Today, through the efforts of many residents, the area is being revitalized and restored to its past glory. Fairmount was recently featured in the January 2010 issue of *Southern Living* as one of "The South's Best Comeback Neighborhoods." 

# RYAN PLACE - THE NARRATIVE THAT IS FORT WORTH

As the RPIA board continues to get neighborhood input on the benefits of having a Ryan Place Historic Overlay District, we need to talk about just how historic is Ryan Place. The National Park Service has listed Elizabeth Boulevard on the National Registry of Historic Places. The City of Fort Worth recognized the homes along Elizabeth Boulevard as Fort Worth Landmarks.

But what about the rest of Ryan Place? Is it just as historic?

My thought is that the houses on Ryan Avenue many of us might say are "modest" are as historic as the houses on Elizabeth Boulevard like the ones lived in by the owners of Meacham's department store (whose daughter Minnie grew up to marry Amon G. Carter) or another lived in by Major General Hulen.

Why, you ask? I believe it is the narrative that reflects the history of Fort Worth in the twentieth century.

Ryan Place was platted and developed by John C. Ryan shortly after the disastrous South Side Fire of April 3, 1909. It was conceived as an exclusive residential neighborhood for Fort Worth's business and professional class. Soon the City of Fort Worth extended the city limits south to Berry Street. His "Ryan Place" would be within the city limits and close to street car lines. (Today, look for evidence of street car tracks down the center of South Adams and Willing streets!)

After the initial building of John Ryan's "Ryan Place," which might have been aided by the discovery of major oil fields in North Texas in 1917-1918, further development continued in phases until the building out of the area now called Ryan Place. After 1925, the dominant architecture of a small house was the copy of the Tudor Revival style, which had become popular when WWI veterans returned from England after the war. There are many of these Tudor Revival style houses in Ryan Place. This period of development extended until the early 1940's.

By the end of WWII, there was a pent-up demand for housing. The need to house young families started during the war caused the development of Ryan Place right up to the major thoroughfares of Eighth Avenue and Berry Street. These typically single-story, small frame houses have been called "Minimal Traditional." They usually have low pitched roofs and very close or almost non-existent eaves. This style of house has been dismissed as a "non-style" but noted by some to be the bridge from the more traditional styles to the American "ranch style," which would become popular in many Fort Worth suburbs. Today, these Minimal Traditional houses add to the economic diversity of Ryan Place, allowing a spread of income levels to call Ryan Place their home.

These phases of development, with its different sizes and styles, reflect the narrative that is not only our Ryan Place, but the history of Fort Worth.



# PROPOSED: PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT

The PID Committee met during April to review bids from four security companies. The committee's review will take into consideration the services provided, experience in neighborhood security patrol, and the cost. During the next month the committee will meet with a representative from each company.

In last month's newsletter, there was a chart showing crimes from 2005 to March 2011. From the same data, the statistics below indicate residential and commercial crimes by month, day, and blocks of time. The map on the adjacent page reflects crimes concentrations by block. The highest number of residential crimes were in the 2600/2700 blocks of S. Adams and the highest number of commercial crimes occurred in the 2600/2700 block of 8th Ave.



# PROPOSED NEIGHBORHOOD HISTORIC OVERLAY

What do Mistletoe Heights, Fairmount, and Ryan Place have in common? All of these neighborhood were instrumental in growing Fort Worth from a wide spot in the Chisholm Trail into the civilized, neighborly city it is today. All three areas have notable histories and architectural landscapes not found in more modern, sprawling suburbs. Alas, Ryan Place lacks the special protections afforded to our distinguished neighbors based on their zoning designation as historic districts.

What is a "historic overlay"? The term refers to a city zoning designation, Historic/Cultural (H/C). There are several steps involved before an H/C zone would take effect. First, the neighborhood generates its own H/C zoning guidelines; they are not developed by the city. Multiple public discussions occur before submission of the H/C zoning application. (Ryan Place had several discussions in 2009 and 2010, and we will host at least two more this year.) Next, the Fort Worth Landmarks Commission reviews the neighborhood's application and guidelines for compliance with City Ordinance. The Commission will then poll property owners in the proposed H/C district. A majority of property owners in the proposed historic district must approve the H/C zoning guidelines. The next step is review/approval by the Fort Worth Zoning Commission; the final step is review/approval by the Fort Worth City Council.

What does the Ryan Place Historic Overlay (RPHO) propose? The RPHO guidelines attempt to respect our broad diversity by focusing on maintaining the "look and feel" of the neighborhood. No homeowner would be required to change anything about their home, nor would any interior changes be regulated. The RPHO guidelines apply to additions and new construction only, which undertakings would be eligible for property tax freezes.

With homeowners at every income level, as well as significant populations of renters and businesses, Ryan Place will hold a unique place in Fort Worth's historic Near Southside. Our neighborhood includes cottages, mansions, and everything in between. What is now "Ryan Place" is a conglomeration of at least six urban developments built over the course of a century.

The RPHO guidelines have been generated over the past several years through the dedicated efforts of a number of Ryan Place residents. These folks have received a variety of opinions and input that reflect the diverse desires of our diverse neighborhood. 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# SIMPLE GREEN TIPS

I received these tips via email. While the facts have not been checked, these ideas seem reasonable. Maybe they'll make a difference for your household.

**Problem:** It takes 26 bottles of water to produce the plastic container for a one-liter bottle and pollutes 25 liters of groundwater.

**Solution:** Use aluminum or stainless steel reusable/refillable bottles.

**Problem:** 12 million barrels of oil were used to make the 88.5 billion plastic bags consumed in the US last year, and it takes 4 times MORE energy to make paper bags.

**Solution:** Use reusable bags and recycle/reuse the plastic and paper bags you already have.

**Problem:** 19 billion catalogs were mailed last year, requiring more than 53 million trees and 56 billion gallons of wastewater to produce them.

**Solution:** Go to <a href="http://catalogchoice.org">http://catalogchoice.org</a> and remove your name from the mailing lists.

**Problem:** Only 10% of the energy used by a washing machine is for the motor, 90% is used to heat the water.

**Solution:** Wash clothes in cold water.

**Problem:** Refrigerators account for 10-15% of the total energy bill in most homes.

**Solution:** Set the temperature between 38-42 degrees.

**Problem:** The 2<sup>nd</sup> biggest household energy user (after refrigerators) is the clothes dryer, costing you \$70,000 over your lifetime. An extra 15 minutes per load costs \$34 in wasted energy for an electric dryer and \$21 for a gas dryer per year.

**Solution:** Dry clothes naturally outdoors or on an inside clothes rack, do not add wet clothes during a drying cycle, and sort clothes by weight for efficiency.

**Problem:** A leaking toilet wastes between 30 - 500 gallons of water every day.

**Solution:** Fix that leak immediately.

**Problem:** If every household in the US bought just one 4-pack of 260 sheet recycled bath tissue instead of the regular tissue made from virgin fiber, it would eliminate 60,600 lbs of chlorine pollution, save 356 million gallons of fresh water, and save nearly 1 million trees.

**Solution:** Buy recycled tissue; the cost is nearly the same.

**Problem:** If every household in the US replaced just ONE roll of virgin fiber paper towels (70 sheets) with 100% recycled ones, it would save 544,000 trees.

**Solution:** Buy recycled paper towels, or, even better, buy reusable microfiber towels to wash and reuse.

**Problem:** Running a fully loaded dishwasher can use less water than washing dishes by hand, saving 10-20 gallons per day. If you select "Air Dry" instead of "Heat Dry," it will save 1/2 the electricity used.

**Solution:** Do not run the dishwasher until it is full, and select the Air Dry cycle.

**Problem:** If every American kept the tires on their car properly inflated, it would save 2.8 billion gallons of gas per year.

**Solution:** Check the air pressure in your tires monthly.

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
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
