# Work began on the traffic

circles on Elizabeth Boulevard at Willing Avenue, 5th Avenue, and College Avenue on Monday, September 19 — as scheduled. If all goes as planned, the construction phase of the circles will be completed by the middle of October Construction has also begun at the intersection of 5th Avenue and Ryan Place Drive to the south. Ryan Place (Triangle) Park will remain unchanged, while 5th Avenue will be slightly rerouted from its present merge with Ryan Place Drive into a more distinct corner with a turn onto Ryan Place Drive. Increased safety is the goal.





# Block Captains Meet for Alley Rally

On Sunday afternoon, September 25<sup>th</sup>, the Ryan Place Block Captains got together for an Alley Rally to launch the Green Alley Project (GAP). Chairman of the GAP, Rick Tucker, welcomed the group of more than 40 block representatives and gave a brief overview of the project. Committee member Bill Vaughan offered a bit of general alley history as well as personal experiences as a long-time alley keeper.

The Block Captains will begin by getting to know their neighbors, after which they will collect data relating to the alleys attached to their block's properties. The Alley Committee will study the information about the individual alleys to identify specific problem areas such as trash, drainage issues, etc. in order to resolve and prevent the problems. The Block Captains will coordinate work in their alleys with neighbors on their blocks.

In addition to resolving problems in the alleys, the GAP will address creative uses for the alley spaces as well as additional security measures to offer blocks for their consideration. Residents of the individual blocks will determine the character, uses, and security measures that they prefer.

Dear Ryan Place Residents,


The construction phase of the Neighborhood Traffic Management Plan (NTMP) began on September 19th and is scheduled to be completed by mid-November if there are no weather delays. The City indicated it will take approximately twenty days to complete the construction process associated with the three traffic circles. Construction crews began their work and initially will focus on the traffic circles along Elizabeth Blvd. at the intersections of South Adams Street, 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue, and Willing Avenue. There will be some disruption in your usual routes in, out, and through the neighborhood and I want to thank you in advance for your patience and support. The construction of the chicanes on Cantey is scheduled to begin in mid-November and there will be signs indicating which streets will be temporarily closed. The construction process of the chicanes will take longer to complete since street construction is involved. As mentioned in prior newsletters, the City will try to make this process as painless as possible, but there will be changes in your daily commutes in and out of Ryan Place.

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Several comments suggest a misunderstanding of the by-laws that limits neighbor's right to vote. While there is a by-law amendment addressing the freedom of Ryan Place residents to vote for RPIA board members and by-law amendments, its intent and limits are perhaps unclear.

To be eligible to serve in any RPIA Board position, the by-laws were amended in 2009 to state that "Any person who meets the eligibility requirements for Sustaining Membership in the Association shall be eligible to serve as [an Officer or] a Director. . . . A Sustaining Member is a General Member who has contributed an amount greater than or equal to the minimum annual contribution as established by the Board of Directors [\$35]."

Requiring a contribution to the Sustaining Membership Fund from Board members was a hotly debated issue. According to the RPIA by-laws, "General Membership in the Association shall be open to any resident and/or property owner, 18 years of age or older, within the Association Boundaries. . . . ." RPIA has never required any payments, dues, or contributions from its residents, all residents of Ryan Place are considered to be members of RPIA, and neighbors have always contributed voluntarily to the organization. There have always been funds to be managed and allocated.

After Ryan Place received a sizable bonus payment from the natural gas companies related to oil leases signed by Ryan Place residents, the Board was forced to consider its financial management and the security of the money in its Treasury. The RPIA Board is ultimately responsible for the annual neighborhood budget, improvements, and disbursement of funds. The question debated when the by-laws were amended was, "Is it pru-

dent for people (board members) who did not contribute financially to RPIA to control and spend the contributions of those who did give?"

A by-law amendment committee was appointed and several months later, they presented their proposed changes. After their publication to all residents in the RPIA Newsletter, the RPIA By-laws were amended at the Annual Meeting in November, 2009, by a vote of 37 in favor and 16 opposed.

According to another amendment which was passed at that same meeting, "To be eligible to vote, an individual must be a Sustaining Member of the Association." The RPIA by-laws only govern the association, itself, and there are only two specified times that the general membership votes on an RPIA issue: the election of Board members (officers and Street Directors) and amendment of the By-laws. To vote in the RPIA Board election in November, you must have made a contribution to the Sustaining Membership fund. THE GOOD NEWS IS: 121 RESIDENTS ALREADY HAVE — and there's still time for everyone else to contribute!!!

All issues related to residents, their property, the City of Fort Worth, etc. are a matter of City vote, and are determined within the City's approved voting requirements.

Nominations for the RPIA Board will be presented to the Board at the October meeting on the  $17^{th}$  of this month. Positions to be filled are  $1^{st}$  Vice President, Secretary, and Street Directors for Alston Avenue, Lipscomb, Page, and South Adams Streets, Ryan Place Drive, and College,  $8^{th}$ , James, and Stanley Avenues.

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

#### RPIA LONG RANGE IMPROVEMENT PLAN

# Background and Surroundings (Part I)

This is the third of a series of articles dealing with the preparation of a Long Range Improvement plan for the Ryan Place Improvement Association.

The statistical data contained herein was extracted from the 2008 Tarrant County Appraisal District's on-line property data system. It does not include the property along Elizabeth Blvd. nor that between Elizabeth Blvd. and Jessamine Street.

The purpose of this study is to document the physical nature and character of the RPIA area as basic data on which a Long Range Improvement Plan can be created.

- I. LONG DEVELOPMENT TIME Most of us refer to our neighborhood as Ryan Place. However, from a legal platting standpoint our neighborhood is made-up of six different subdivisions, platted and developed over a long span of time. The architectural character and style of housing within the RPIA area varies a great deal simply because the homes were constructed over a 100 year period. The following information covers 729 properties built in the RPIA area. The data was abstracted from 2008 tax records:
- 1900-1914 the beginning of the Ryan Place area's development 13 (1.7%) residences constructed.
- 1915-1919 World War I era 36 (4.9%) residences constructed.
- 1920-1929 boom era prior to the Great Depression 270 (37%) residences constructed.
- 1930-1941 pre-World War II including the Great Depression 151 (20%) residences constructed.
- 1942-1945 World War II 76 (10%) residences constructed.
- 1946-2003 post war and modern era 183 (25%) residences constructed.
- **II. HOUSING MATERIAL** An analysis of 37 blocks within the RPIA area shows only 18 blocks or 48% to be totally masonry. An additional 4 blocks have half of their homes with masonry construction. In contrast, 15 blocks or 40% have more than half of the homes in frame construction. Note that almost all of the housing situated on the perimeter of the 37 block study area is frame construction.
- **III. OCCUPANCY** -- Much to the average Ryan Place property owner's surprise, approximately 20% of the housing within the area is rented to its occupants; this figure does not include garage apartments and rooms.

An analysis of 37 blocks reveals that the areas with the greatest concentration of renter occupied properties lie on the perimeters of the Ryan Place area.

Renter occupied property is a prevalent factor within the neighborhood; of the 37 block analysis area only 3 were totally occupied by property owners. The remaining 34 blocks had various amounts of renter occupied properties ranging from 60% to 3.3%. The table below shows those blocks with more than 25% RENTER OCCUPANCY:

**IV. MARKET VALUE** – An analysis of the (residential land and improvements) 2008 market value of 37 blocks in the RPIA area clearly illustrates the wide range of values. The block having the highest median value has a value of \$279,300 and the block with the lowest has a value of \$45,900. This means that the block with the highest median value is six (6) times that of the block with the lowest, a wide variance.

# Timely Tips for October Gardeners



Usher in the autumn season with creative displays for indoors or out! Pumpkins, gourds, and bales of hay all started arriving in our stores in late September. Combine them with pots of mums and other blooming color and a transformation quickly occurs!

Create an eye-catching vignette in your landscape with bales of hay, a scarecrow or two, multiple sizes of pumpkins, and pots of garden mums or other seasonal color. Create a pyramid of pumpkins and squash by selecting different colors and stacking them one on top of the other. Simply displaying a "pile" of pumpkins in the same color palette and different sizes will draw one's eye and interest to an area of your landscape.

Color Creations filled with blooming or colorful foliage plants can be used on patios and porches. Freshen up existing containers and nestle an interesting pumpkin or gourd in amongst the plants. You can also fill a favorite container or pot with a mixture of produce for a simple, impressive look!

A pumpkin or squash can easily become a festive flowerpot for fall. Select a perfect "container," one without any scratches or nicks and one that will sit flat and not roll around. Cut an opening and remove the loose pulp inside. Add potting soil and plant

directly into the "container" or leave the plants in their own pots and place them in the "container." Remember that this is only a temporary, but unique flowerpot!



# Snow Cones — the Final Report

It has been a busy summer and, needless to say, very hot! Months of over 100° days made the summer treat of shaved ice and syrup flavors even more wonderful. We traveled extensively around the county as far away as Lake Worth and Saginaw and as near as the Fiesta Mart on 8<sup>th</sup> Ave. We even sampled a snow cone on Fifth Ave – not our local Fifth Ave., but the one across from New York City's Central Park.

Our evaluation criteria: location, customer service, ice texture, size, flavor, presentation, and cost.

Let's start with the lower end of the listings: Unfortunately, the New York City snow cone was pre-packaged, came in only one flavor, was at the very high end of the cost distribution, but had a great location across from the famed toy store FAO Schwarz. One member of our evaluation team only took three bites before tossing it in the nearest trash can. That snow cone was not up to Texas standards!

Our study indicated that the most important feature of a great snow cone was ice texture. The more coarse the ice the less

likely the snow cone experience will be enjoyable. Flavors were important, but most snow cone syrups were close enough to the same. The range of flavor was often enhanced by the addition of milk or cream.

The number one snow cone stand is the New Orleans Shaved Ice, Camp Bowie at Merrick.

Ice texture – Perfect. Location – Not too far. Customer Service – Spot on. Size and Cost – Three different sizes, Three different prices. Flavors – Standard and Exotic. Presentation – Includes lollipop in each cone.

This stand was visited by our team of evaluation experts four times. We were able to sample many of the standard and some of the exotic flavors. One member of our team even chose Dill Pickle! Other favorites: Mango, Black Cherry, Banana Foster (with cream), and the old stand by – Rainbow.

As the season ends on our last visit, the bravest among us will choose "Horned Frog." It must be purple, but we can only guess the flavor.

Our winter quest will be hot chocolate and cup cakes.



Establishing RPIA as a 501c(3) non-profit organization was again recognized as a project than needs to be addressed.


A neighbor has offered to provide irrigation for the landscaping at the south corner of College Ave. and Elizabeth Blvd. (Thank you, Neighbor!)


