Looking back; moving forward

So, what's been going on in Ryan Place this past year? Let's take a look at this past year's Newsletters to see:

In **January**, the Public Art at 5th and Elizabeth was scheduled to be installed in April; the Historic Overlay Committee announced a "primary vote" to take place in March; Ryan Place residents attended a crime prevention meeting at St. John's Church; and RPIA adopted Ryan Place Park for renovating.

February headlined the RPIA Strategic Goals for 2012 as:

- Crime Prevention (alleys cleared, lighted, gated/locked, Crime Watch signs added; vehicle ID stickers; curb numbers; Code Blue promoted; PID reconsidered)
- 2. Ryan Place Park to be upgraded
- 3. RPIA to be converted to 501(c)(3) tax status

The RP youth (RPYA) held their first meeting; City street reconstruction began on 5th, Willing, and Cantey. The budget was presented in **March** and a group of residents organized to secure private security patrol.

In **April**, the Block Captains led an Alley Clean-Up; CCRP announced that with the City's award of a matching fund grant, streetlight installation would be completed by the end of the year. The Easter Egg Hunt drew a crowd and Central Market pitched in with cupcakes and future participation scheduled.

May saw a great attendance at the annual Street Dance and the first Taste of Ryan Place cooking competition at (still undeveloped) Ryan Place Park. The Croquet Tournament moved around the corner; Ryan Run canceled indefinitely.

In **June** and **July**, Joel Burns announced City funding to rebuild the column at 6th and Jessamine. The Newsletter recruited Welcome Lady Ruth Karbach and the Historic Overlay Committee announced a new guideline document. NPO Joel Stary was replaced by Mark Russell; annual July 4th Parade detoured around street construction.

August saw the RPYA take on maintenance of the traffic circle landscaping and a Mom's Group establishing itself.

September started with the annual Yard Sale; Central Market Foodie Truck was a welcome addition; Suze Diesel completed the east Elizabeth Blvd. column landscaping.

In **October**, RPIA sponsored its Chili Cook-off and its first Boo on the Boolevard; a new resident initiated a popular Wine Gathering.

November: Public Art installed; second Wine Gathering; Historic Overlay submitted to the City.

December is crowned by hard-working CCRP volunteers who produce a successful Home Tour every year; City Forestry Department's Free Tree program revived by a new Ryan Place resident.

Two things are apparent: RPIA produced many well-attended events — Easter Egg Hunt, Street Dance, Taste of Ryan Place, July 4th Parade, Yard Sale, Chili Cook-off, Boo on the Boolevard. Applause to the Events Chairmen and all those who pitched in to provide the good times!

Second, much of the effective activity in Ryan Place is initiated by individual residents (Moms Group, Wine Gathering, Croquet Tournament, Welcome Lady, RPYA, beautification, Block Captains, tree planting). Ryan Place is a great place for initiators.

RPIA started the year with a good plan — three measurable goals that were pertinent and for which we had resources. Crime has gone down in Ryan Place this year — and then back up. It would be difficult to pinpoint a cause; Ryan Place residents are more attentive to suspicious activity, will file police reports, and post crime information on our Facebook page. Aside from one publicized alley clean-up, however, the other Crime Prevention initiatives have not been pursued. Goals two and three, Ryan Place Park and 501(c)(3) tax status, are languishing. The 2013 RPIA Board has its work cut out: completing this year's "To Do" list.

and that generation of saplings is well-established by now. The five-gallon native trees provided by the City are for use in the parkway (between the sidewalk and the curb) only. Interestingly, trees can be used to fill in a vacant, treeless spot, or planted near a parkway tree that is in decline and will need replacing soon. Recommended trees are bald cypress, bur oak, cedar elm, chinquapin oak, Chinese pistache, desert willow, Eve's necklace, live oak, redbud, and red oak and requests for a particular tree variety may be made.

We need a minimum of 25 requests for trees to qualify for the program and get our trees this winter. To apply for free trees, get your name, address, phone number, and e-mail (if available) to John Frank at john_p_frank@yahoo.com or call 562-242-8224 right away. Indicate your tree preference(s) when you sign up.

Winter is the ideal time to plant trees so we need to get them ordered right away. Contact John Frank about planting a green future for Ryan Place today!



Police Reports from Ryan Place Internet Security Alerts:

From: Officer Mark Russell By email - November 7, 2012

There was a break-in in the 2600 block of College Ave. yesterday, November 6, 2012 between 8:10 am - 8:47 am.

NOTE: The above information is all the police department has at this time. The below information was posted on our neighborhood Facebook page: "Our home, on College Ave., was burglarized today [Tuesday, November 5] at 8:45 am. We had left for work 30 minutes prior to the break in. The person broke in through our kitchen window through our back yard. They took several pieces of jewelry from the house along with other items FWPD wasn't able to respond immediately because we didn't have an alarm permit. Will be getting one of those today. It took us about 15 minutes to get there from work. The officer that responded was around the corner the whole time and would have gotten there within a minute had we had a permit. He did a great job! Lesson learned.'

Over the last few weeks the RP area had two houses broken into where the homeowner had an alarm system but not a permit with the city. I am sure most of you remember when the permits were not a requirement for police to respond to alarm calls. The reason why permits are now required is due to the number of false alarms the police responded to on a daily basis. Most of these were due to operator errors, animals inside the house setting off the motion sensors, or workers doing jobs at the locations. Because of all the false alarms the city changed its policy to require all locations with alarms to have a permit with the city in hopes of reducing the resources and money spent responding. The money obtained for the permit would help off set the cost of wasted resources such as gas and allow officers to respond to other calls. Instantly when put into place we saw a dramatic drop in false alarms and we were able

to do more proactive police work and our response times to other calls quickly decreased. Most other cities have the same policy on alarm permits for the same reasons.

The best thing I can tell you is if you have an alarm system, obtain the permit. Install an exterior horn that will emit the alarm to the outside of your home. This will let everyone around know that your alarm is going off. Then install a strobe light on the front of your house. This will tell your neighbors as well as officers exactly where that annoying sound is coming from. Your neighbors in turn would naturally call the police identifying the house and the possibility of the potential break in. The alarms are so loud externally of the house that 9 times out of 10 it will scare off the burglar.

If you do receive a call from your alarm company then call 911 and tell them you are on your way home to check on the situation, BUT you would like the officers to respond as well due to the recent spike in home breakins and tell them that your NPO requested it. If there is a problem lets all work together and find a way around it.

Recently the Ryan Place area has seen an increase in Burglary of Habitations, five (5) two weeks ago and three (3) this past week. Yesterday Officers D. Shipp and S. Thompson responded to a possible break-in in the 2400 block of College Ave, the same house that was broken into last week. The suspects were not on the scene so both officers spread out to locate the suspects. Officer Thompson was canvassing the area and heard some dogs aggressively barking at 2733 S. Adams at a vehicle parked in the driveway with two male occupants. Officer Thompson detained the suspects and conducted an investigation with Officer Ship. Officers learned that one of the suspects was the one attempting to burglarize the house on College Ave. Officers made an arrest on the suspect for 2.3 grams of Heroin, suspected 16.9 grams of codeine liquid and a slew of drug paraphernalia. He was taken to the Central Detective's office where he confessed to at least one burglary on College . It is believed that he and his partner, who was arrested for warrants, are

the actors on the rest of the RP burglaries.

Thank you to Officer Thompson and Officer Ship for their thorough investigation and their keen observations. They both should be commended for their outstanding police work.

November 13, 2012

Residents may not be aware that there is a bar located at 2510 Hemphill St. They have bands perform and they do not sell liquor, it is BYOB. The below information is being sent as a security alert because it occurred so close to our neighborhood.

"On Friday 11-9-12 around 0145 hrs [1:45] am] I (Officer KD Willingham 3595) was on routine patrol traveling northbound on 2600 Hemphill when I observed 2 white females iumping up and down attempting to flag me down. I made contact with both women and they stated that two black males had just robbed them. Immediately I observed VIC1 to have torn stockings and scratches on her arms. VIC2 was visibly upset and began to cry and she attempted to speak to officers. VIC1 advised that they had just left 2510 Hemphill, gotten into their car, and were in the process of searching for a good song on her iPod when two black males approached them from the west in the dark parking lot. VIC1 said the suspects did not allow them to close their doors and also forcibly pulled them from the vehicle. VIC1 said SUS1 was a dark skinned black male, wearing an orange t-shirt that was pulled over half of his face and she was unsure if SUS2 was wearing a black or red hooded sweatshirt, but SUS2 was also a black male. VIC1 said that SUS2 was the one that had what she believed to be a fake gun so she grabbed it and he began to drag her till he was about to get her purse from around her neck/shoulder area. VIC2 said that SUS1 just took her purse without actually hurting her. VIC1 said that she did in fact feel pain and I observed multiple scratches and abrasions on her person. VIC1 and VIC2 said both suspects fled back to the west behind the Dollar General and did not come back out. No CSSU SGT Kenjura C250" The above information is a public record from crimemapping.com.

Hello, I just wanted to update yall on some issues in the area.

This weekend a bunch of car windows and store windows were shot with a BB gun. Unfortunately there were no witnesses or suspects for any of these offences. Stay vigilant and on the look out for anyone walking with a BB gun or any sounds of a BB gun being shot please.

Also, I was contacted by a resident in the 2500 block of Willing Ave. about two females that knocked on his door saying they wanted to clean his house. The resident was suspicious, almost assuredly, of the females and had them leave and called 911to report it. The resident then called me and told me about the encounter. He made all the correct steps in having them leave, collecting good information on them such as license plate number and a good description, called 911, and then informed me. To my understanding the two females have not been located at this time. I was able to do some research on the car and found that it belongs to some guestionable individuals. A member of the house where this car belongs was recently arrested for theft and robbery.

A YEAR IN REVIEW

Over the past year the area has seen many changes in both the business area as well as in

the neighborhoods. Magnolia is booming with business and night life. Many new restaurants and taverns with live music have opened and a few other new businesses are scattered about. We have a new hotel on Forest Park and Rosedale and another on the way next door with an adjacent restaurant. A big new 7-11 and Jack in the Box are open at Rosedale and I-35; a new Quick Trip gas station will soon break ground at the intersection of Hemphill and W. Rosedale St. A 170 unit apartment complex at College and W. Petersmith is already under construction. There are a lot of other buildings being refurbished and put into use as well. In the neighborhoods we have seen many historical houses remodeled, others torn down and replaced by beautiful new homes, and formerly vacant lots have new dwellings.

We have so many citizens looking out for one another and our COP groups are awesome. They put in countless hours of patrol day after day amounting to hundreds of hours each month and thousands of hours each year – and that is just the COP patrols on my beat. People are getting more involved in the safety of their neighborhoods, calling in more suspicious activity as we work together to catch more bad guys.

Thank you so much for being ever-vigilant in our quest to rid our community of crime. Change is all around us and we will continue to see our unique area of the city blossom. Let's all continue to improve our personal safety as well as target-harden our homes and vehicles. We can do this by working together, being good neighbors, and watching out for one another.


It soon became Elizabeth's cat.



I got a chance to stop by last Friday to see this lovely garden for myself. Talk about a warm welcome! I immediately felt like one of the family, as we strolled through the breathtaking multi-tiered backyard and "no mow" front yard.

I attribute much of this "homey" feeling to Ron's sincere, down-to-earth approach to gardening. He's quick to share his gardening triumphs and challenges. He points out numerous experiments in progress. He's the first to admit that plants sometimes have to be removed or transplanted because they're not thriving. It's all part of a learning process.

Ron's wife, Ann, cheerfully noted that her husband never works off plans or schematics. Ron confirmed this with a shrug and a smile. His gardening guide is the "Man Upstairs." Ron said he always consults his "Higher Authority" before planting anything. Sometimes it turns out to be the ideal spot; other times it's not. But no matter what, much was learned in the process.

With the exception of the tri-level backyard deck, just about everything in Ron's yard was created "in house." (Favorite moment: I


