



"Target Hardening" Revisited

Hello, Neighbors,

We're the Cowart's in the2500 block of 5th Ave. Next month is our one year anniversary in Ryan Place. We just love the area; all our visitors comment on how beautiful the old houses are and how well the tree-lined streets are kept up. Michelle and I couldn't agree more. Under the beautiful exterior though, we have problems. Our main problem is crime.

Our homes are under attack by thieves. In less than a year, four homes within shouting distance of ours have been victimized in one way or another. These intrusions occurred during daylight hours and not even home security systems deter the brazen criminals. They are in and out so fast it must be nearly impossible for the police to catch them. If the robbers are "pros," they probably don't look out of place in our neighborhood. Many of us use lawn care, handymen, and pool services to make our lives a little easier. Plumbers and other repairmen are a common sight in any neighborhood. We are sitting ducks for the crooks!

So how do we protect ourselves? We should start putting our ideas together for a solution. I have an idea to share and I'd like your feedback. I'm not an expert on what I'm suggesting, but I'm praying some of you are or maybe know someone who is. I understand that there may be legal, financial, and privacy issues attached to my suggestion.

I think we need cameras. Lots of cameras. Cameras that record onto a hard drive so the footage can be replayed as necessary. I've been looking at cameras online and there are many varie-

ties. The most intriguing to me are the wireless types which transmit their video to a remote receiver where it is neatly saved to a hard drive or DVR unit. The bigger the hard drive, the longer it records.

I imagine that most thieves do not like being caught on video. If the robbers are doing their best to blend into our community while plying their dirty trade, cameras will expose them and give the police a place to start. Mostly though, I believe cameras will drive the criminals out of our area.

I talked to Officer Coleman, our NPO, about the effectiveness of cameras and his general opinion of the idea. He commented that we would need quality cameras to provide the necessary details for the police. We would need cameras at each intersection, facing up and down our streets for proper coverage.

Officer Coleman pointed out that anything we can do to make a crook's life difficult is worth doing. In my opinion, dogs are the best deterrent. Only the homes around us without dogs have been victimized; those with dogs, including ours, have not. Besides, does your home alarm wag its tail and cry when you come home?

We need something to drive the criminal element out of our neighborhood. Cameras are not perfect, but they may help identify or deter the crooks. We do need something though, and we need it quick. I've never lived in an area that had so many homes broken into so often.





Here are some crime stats for the last week or so. There seems to be a stolen bicycle trend from porches and alleys in the Fairmount area. Other than that it is looking good as far as crime trends go. The only lead I have for you is an older white male. So if you see a white male pushing or riding a bike that doesn't seem to fit him, or you see him riding a different bike everyday, call 911. He is also cutting the locking mechanism, so he might have a backpack with him with a bolt cutter of some kind.


If you have been a victim of a crime please call 911 and send an e-mail with information about the crime so that Ryan Place residents can be alerted.

Crime Update

I hope you all had a lovely Valentine's Day. Now look what's just around the corner — Spring Break! I know. Crazy, huh? The older we get,

the faster time flies.

Here's an update on what crimes have taken place in our neighborhood since January 1st. Stats from this time last year to current numbers show that we are looking good.

Assaults—1 (one-arrest)

Burglary of Building—4, (three were from businesses, three arrests on one offense, one was from a garage)

Burglary of Vehicle—4 (GPS, tools, I-Pad, purse, all in view, one was unlocked) one arrest

Burglary of Habitation—4 (all were back doors, one the power was cut but nothing taken)

Robbery—1 (Domino's Pizza delivery driver robbed at gunpoint on Myrtle)

Thefts—12 (ten were from businesses, the other two were cars) five-arrests, seven others known suspects

It is plain to see that the number isn't zero yet, but they are low-in both Ryan Place and Fairmount neighborhoods. I suspect that more and more citizens are getting involved and looking out for one another. I know that our AWESOME COPs groups are out on a daily basis, spending hundreds of hours per month, being vigilant and watching over not just their street, but all of both neighborhoods and beyond. I hope that many more of you will consider taking the training and becoming part of our COPs group. If you think it will consume all of your spare time you are incorrect. You put in as much time as you want. Take a moment and ask one of your neighbors who is active in the program or me, and see how easy the program is. I would be more than happy to explain how much you can actually learn about your own neighborhood and offer you an inside look at the police department and the City itself.

With Spring Break approaching many of you will take a short vacation or a lengthy road trip. Prior to doing so, please take the necessary steps to help reduce the chance of a crime happening on your property. Let the NPO know your plans by requesting extra patrol. Ask a trusted neighbor to watch out for your property. Stop your mail and newspaper delivery. Make sure your motions lights are working and set lights and TV timers to go off/on at various intervals. Have a neighbor park their car in your driveway. The more it looks like someone is at home, the better your chances of not having a crime take place while you are away.

Let's hope the numbers continue to drop and we catch the ones who are committing the crimes. Officer Coleman is doing a fantastic job in my absence, and he really enjoys the opportunity to serve each of you.

Dan Roberts has appointed a Strategic Plan Committee consisting of Teri West, Chairman, John Belknap, a previous RPIA president, John Kline, a previous RPIA president, Lamar Brown and Bart Bradford.

The Strategic Plan Committee held its initial meeting in mid-February to discuss the neighborhood's infrastructure (streets, sidewalks, drainage, etc.) needs that could be included in the 2014 City Bond Election. They reviewed the recent street improvements, committed and funded (but not yet started) street improvements, and the general conditions of neighborhood streets

At this point the Strategic Plan Committee is committed to preparing a list of needed neighborhood infrastructure improvements and submitting the list to the general membership for their approval and support.

Any recommended infrastructure improvements to be included in the 2014 Bond Election will be coordinated with any long range plan for our neighborhood.



Clark Griffith, Ryan Place resident for over ten years, will perform The Goldberg Variations by J.S. Bach at Steinway Hall, 3717 Camp Bowie Blvd., on Thursday, March 28 at 7:30. Admission is free.

Clark Griffith has twice competed in the Van Cliburn Foundation's International Piano Competition for Outstanding Amateurs $^{\text{TM}}$ and has won Best Performance of a Work from the Baroque Era both times, among other honors.

Mr. Griffith holds the opinion that J. S. "Big Daddy" Bach, single-handedly (sic) constructed the essential skeleton on which the tissue of Western music hangs in the same way that dramatists owe everything to Shakespeare. Bach established, by example, the by-laws of sound musical construction on scales large and small, simply putting onto paper music that would be accessible across continents and ages, re-imagined, retranscribed, and reinterpreted for each generation according to its needs.

Born and raised in Phoenix, Arizona, Clark Griffith received a Bachelor of Music degree in composition from the Curtis Institute of Music in 1986. Thursday, March 28 at Steinway Hall Fort Worth will be his first public rendering of Bach's sprawling defense of G Major, canons, and ornaments.



Ryan Place, above all, amazed them with its ambiance, charm, and character for the money. And of course, the prices compared to the DC area were compelling. Now they've got a big



Yard of the Month: 2900 block of Fifth Avenue



Kline-Sarsgaard Home

These neighbors have managed very well to keep a vibrant landscape, even in winter. Pansies provide that burst of color along the front, as well as in hanging baskets on the porch. More color with mini violas by the walkway which is lined with monkey grass. Finally, a large Asparagus fern flanks the front door while a cozy seating area invites you to sip your morning coffee in anticipation of spring.

From Zeroscape to Xeriscape

Now that street construction on Willing Avenue and adjacent cross streets is winding down, maybe there is a new beginning for

our parkways: xeriscape. Using plants with low water requirements isn't a new idea, but it is a good idea that a sprinkling of homeowners near us have decided to implement. Have you considered it?

On Willing, street and sidewalk construction destroyed a substantial portion of the plants in the parkway. The city committed to restoring the parkway to its pre-construction state, namely grass. We see a golden opportunity to save water and improve the neighborhood, all on the canvas of our block--and every other block where this sort of construction is happening.

Given water restrictions, what better way to gain attention to best practices than to offer an option of attractive, low-water plants and an efficient way to water? Neighbors who prefer turf can keep their parkway in grass, but xeriscape may appeal to some for its low maintenance, natural beauty, and low water requirements. We can still line our streets with beautiful trees, but we might also consider trees of appropriate scale for these tiny lots, as well as those well-suited to drought.

We aren't waiting. Our project isn't perfect, and it isn't finished, but we are happy with the start. We aren't experts, just enthusiasts, so much so that we bought materials and started the hard work. A professional irrigation company would have tied into the water system; we didn't. We did, however, make it possible to water with soaker hoses, and most anybody could do that. Drip irrigation is another option. There are many possibilities that don't involve a landscape married to a lawn mower and

string trimmer, or water running down the street and into our storm drains.

With enough interest, we might get a little help from the City. Surely, there is economy of scale from doing an entire block (e.g., raw materials). The city already has experts on staff, and we understand that Fort Worth is growing some of the very plants needed. With outreach, private nurseries might want to participate. Here is a chance to forge new partnerships. Everybody wins, but it won't happen unless you make your voice heard.

Ryan Place served as a model for recycling. Maybe as we move forward with other street projects in the neighborhood or the city, we can lead again.
