## CCRP Annual Meeting Report and Plans

The 2013 Annual CCRP Meeting was held Monday, March 11th, at 1315 Elizabeth Blvd.

Mariann Taccia, CCRP President, opened the meeting expressing appreciation to everyone in attendance and to last year's Soiree and Wine Down hosts, tour homeowners, as well as volunteers and Board members. A profit of over \$14,000 from the tour was reported by Treasurer Mike Lindner.

According to an update from T/PW, Phase II streetlight installation will begin the first week of April and Phase III will begin the first week of July. When Phase III is completed all mid-block streetlights will have been installed throughout the neighborhood.

Mary Edwards, CCRP Nominating Committee chair, and John Belknap, Nominating Committee member, conducted the election of the new Board of Trustees. We are pleased to welcome six



Have you ever thought about the importance of trees on your property or throughout the neighborhood? Trees play a major economic, aesthetic, and climatic role in the Ryan Place area. And yet, most of the time we take trees for granted – they are just there!

It is vital to our community that we become more active in the planting and maintenance of trees. Trees do more than simply provide shade, they also:

- Help to clean the air.
- Reduce storm water runoff.
- Raise property values.
- Capture carbon.
- Reduce energy cost.

As an example of the BENEFITS a single tree provides to our neighborhood the following table illustrates three of the tree types which grow well here:

- At 7 inches the Bur Oak will provide an annual benefit of \$54.
- At 7 inches the Chinquapin Oak will provide an annual benefit of \$46.
- At 7 inches the Chinese Pistache will provide an annual benefit of \$54.

Over the life of your residence, say 40 years, several trees in your yard could provide a nice little benefit. Think about it in broad terms – if each property owner had two street trees and two yard trees the impact on our neighborhood would be enormous. Over a 40 year span these tree would provide approximately 7 million dollars in benefits.

Planting a tree in the "parkway" (area between curb and sidewalk) requires a permit from the City of Fort Worth Parks and Community Services Department. Such a permit can be obtained by calling the City Forester at 817/392-5738.

The following trees are prohibited on city parkways: hackberry, sycamore, silver maple, mulberry, Siberian elm, mimosa, Arizona ash, cottonwood, willow, and Bradford pear.

## **Crime Update**

For this month's column I was asked by a Fairmount resident to pass along some information that she came upon. I have mentioned similar stories before, but they are worth repeating.

- 1. A friend of a friend left their car in the long-term parking lot at San Jose airport while away and someone broke into the car. Using the information on the car's registration in the glove compartment, they drove the car to the owner's home in Pebble Beach and robbed it. I guess if we are going to leave the car in long-term parking, we should not leave the registration/insurance cards or your garage door opener in it.
- 2. GPS. A friend told me that someone she knew had their car broken into while they were at a football game. Their car was parked on the green adjacent to the football stadium and specially allotted for football fans. Things stolen from the car included a garage door remote control, some money and a GPS which had been prominently mounted on the dashboard. When the victims got home, they found that their house had been ransacked and just about everything worth anything had been stolen. The thieves had used the GPS to guide them to the house, they then used the garage remote control to open the garage door and gain entry to the house. The thieves knew the owners were at the football game, they knew what time the game was scheduled to finish and therefore knew how much time they had to clean out the house. It would appear that they had brought a truck to empty the house of its contents.

Something to consider if you have a GPS - don't put your home address in it. Put in a nearby address (like a store or gas station) so you can still find your way home if you need to, but no one else would know where you live if your GPS is stolen.

- 3. MOBILE PHONES. This lady has now changed her way of listing names in her mobile phone. Her handbag, which contained her cell phone, credit card, wallet, etc. was stolen. Twenty minutes later when she called her hubby from a pay phone telling him what had happened, hubby says, "I received your text asking about our PIN number and I replied a little while ago." When they rushed down to the bank, the bank staff told them all the money was already withdrawn. The thief had actually used the stolen cell phone to text 'hubby' in the contact list and got hold of the PIN. Within 20 minutes he had withdrawn all the money from their bank account. Moral of the story:
- a. Do not disclose the relationship between you and the people in your contact list. Avoid using words like Home, Honey, Hubby, Sweetheart, Dad, Mom, etc.
- b. And very importantly, when sensitive information is being asked through texts, CONFIRM by CALLING BACK.
- c. Also, when you're being texted by friends or family to meet them somewhere, be sure to call back to confirm that the message came from them. If you don't reach them, be very careful about going places to meet "family and friends" who text you.

Please always have some way of identifying your property. Inscribe your initials or driver's license number, or you can always use our department's free program, RAPIDS, which gives you a durable bar code sticker to put on your property. If you have no way to identify your property and it's stolen, it is much more difficult to get your property back.

Microchip details: An identifying microchip, about the size of a grain of rice, is placed under the skin of the pet. The collar tag, issued at the time of service, has an 800 Hotline number that you can call with the pet's microchip ID number, located on the tag, and they will provide you with the owner's phone number. Or the animal can be taken to a vet to be scanned.

TCAP is a nonprofit organization that provides affordable, preventive animal care. Tax deductable contributions to TCAP would be greatly appreciated.

City of Fort Worth pet license registration information will also be available.

- •Only cash or check accepted at the time services rendered.
- •Dogs *must* be on a leash *or* in a carrier.

- •No appointment is necessary. Services will be given on a first come, first served basis.






