From: Fairmount's Facebook Page / NPO Marcus Russell

Date: April 2, 2013

Over the last 5 days I have received multiple phone calls and e-mails about a white Harley motorcycle driving recklessly up and down the Fairmount area. The bike as been located, thanks to several residents for pointing me in the right direction. It belongs to 1804 Lipscomb, the back apartment. If you see the bike out please call it in so that we can get it stopped. The license plate on the bike does not belong on it.

A shots fired call was reported this morning at the same address of 1804 Lipscomb. Officer arrived on scene and located several spent shell casings and a gun magazine containing live rounds. The rider of the bike is listed as a witness to the gun shots, but based on what I learned from folks on the street, it was him who had fired off the rounds. Apparently traffic has began coming in and out of the house since he and his girlfriend have moved in.

Please do not confront the individuals as he/she may have weapons on them. Just call 911 if you see the bike out and advise the call taker of his activity, such as speeding, reckless driving and let them know he is suspected of being involved in narcotics and weapons. You can tell them your NPO asked you to call it in.

Date: April 8, 2013

Looks like burglaries of vehicles were up last week around the Fairmount area. The burglaries of habitations saw a spike between the 2100 - 2200 blocks of the Fairmount NA area.

A few graffiti crimes were located on some historical buildings along the Magnolia strip.

On Thursday, April 11, my beat (C31) had 3 burglary of habitations. Since last Saturday the total is 5 burglaries of habitations plus 2 burglary of buildings. All the habitation offenses were early morning to afternoon hours. Most all the offenses had entry made through a back door or window where the suspect threw a brick through a window pane.

Officers were dispatched on another burglary of habitation to the 2700 block of Travis Ave. on Thursday at 12:20 am. Neighbors heard a window breaking and looked out to see a Hispanic male crawling through a neighbor's window. Officers arrived on scene and gave chase eventually catching the suspect hiding in an autobody shop a few blocks away.

Although the actor refused to cooperate with officers and detectives he was identified by the witnesses and crucial evidence was located at the scene of the house which should positively link him to the crimes. His MO was consistent with all of the crimes so we should be able to tie him to many crimes within C31 and possibly more

Most all of the offenses took place in the Ryan Place and South Hemphill Heights NA area.

Date: April 13, 2013

On Wednesday [April 10] we observed a dark haired female walking south bound in the alley

of the 2900-3000 blocks between 8th and Ryan Ave. She was in long sleeve black hoodie and black sweat pants. She was bending down and looking in each back yard on both sides.

I called 911; while on the phone I drove around the block because she disappeared from my view, proceeding down the alley northbound through the weeds. I noticed several houses that back up on 8th with their back doors wide open and their yards very suspicious looking. Several men shirtless and tattooed came out watching me drive down the alley. I explained what I was doing and they seemed un-phased. I then saw the woman back on the street ahead of me. I realized she had gone through a house and exited out on 8th street and [was] now on Lowden eastbound.

She seemed stoned to me, walking very slowly and robotic with her right hand always in her pocket. I followed from behind. I followed her down Willing northbound and then onto 6th street until the Police could take it from there. She seemed to be heading toward the Fairmount or Hemphill area. I have strong suspicion someone on 8th is selling drugs out of the alley because I have noticed a car there each day since as I have driven by.

Police are aware, but I am not sure they have the connection with the possible drug selling in the alley. I could be totally wrong here, but my gut tells me otherwise. Let's all watch for alley traffic; something is not right in that area of Ryan Place.

Date: April 15, 2013

I drove as much as the alley way this morning and it appears that there is a rear apartment at 2913 8th. The resident is parking their car adjacent to the back of the house. On the south end I saw the resident who lives on the corner or 8th and W. Bowie backing her large SUV into the alley from her driveway. Their driveway leads out to the alley so this area is worn down from their usage. I couldn't see too much usage between these two locations. If anyone has any further information please let me know.

Last week and last night I received a phone call after 8 pm advising me of an individual trying to sell home alarms. Last night's instance, in the 2300 block of Lipscomb, was a w/m in his 20's wearing a blue shirt with lettering stitched on the right chest area, dirty blue jeans and had a bad odor. He was not carrying any paperwork or work ID badge. He was only carrying a half empty coke bottle.

He knocked on the door and told the female resident that he was selling alarms and needed to come in to check out the house for a proper estimate. He then proceeded to walk in uninvited. The homeowner stopped him and told him she was not interested and he was not invited into her home. She asked him 3 times to leave while he was already in her home. He eventually left and she watched him leave, but he did not visit any of the adjoining homes. The complainant said she spoke with several neighbors who said that he did not approach their homes. The 1st incident was further south, but had the similar description and suspect actions.

Please remember that most respectable businesses will supply their sales people with ample flyers to promote their business as well the sales person would be wearing more professional looking clothing with the companies name easily recognizable, and they all tend to give their employees an ID to wear. All solicitors must have a valid permit on their person at all times when they are conducting business. You can request to see the permit as well as their employee ID card.

If you get approached by an individual matching the description please call 911.

2nd Report

Date: April 16, 2012

It looks like we don't have to worry to much about the alarms salesman as previously mentioned. I have received multiple emails today saying they too were solicited by the same person. Still if you see him on your doorstep please request to see his permit with the city. If he fails to show one call it in so we can be sure to set him straight.

Subject: guy selling alarms in Fairmount Officer Russell,

I saw the security alert. The same guy came by our house at 2101 Alston Ave., at the corner of Hawthorne. It was probably 7 or 7:30 when he came. I didn't let him in the door, but that's because he found me on the front porch. He was wearing a shirt that said Nationwide Security or something like that. He had a badge on because I asked to see it. I also asked to see his promotional materials, which were to a company in Vancouver, Wash., called Trust Nationwide or something like that. He was a white kid, thin, probably 5'8, early 20's, really pronounced ears sticking out. Foreign letters on a tattoo down his right arm. He wasn't anymore pushy than any other sales people, but he does ask a lot of questions about people's home security systems. People don't like that. Even if his intentions are just to sell you an alarm system, people get understandably nervous when you ask questions about their existing system, as he did with me.

He said he would be working in Fairmount all week, from 2 to 8, fyi. He kept trying to get me to commit, so he could come back by and offer me this "great deal." You might warn him that he's making people nervous.

Date: April 18, 2013

The door-to-door alarm salesman was issued a citation last night for failing to have a permit with the city to solicit. If any of you see him out and about again please check his permit and if he fails to produce one please call 911.

On Wednesday April 17, 2013 I, Officer R Molina #3641, working as Unit C255 was dispatched at 2011 hours to the area of Ryan Place Dr just north of Lowden with the following details...STS THERE IS W/M BLONDE HAIR WEARING A BLU SHIRT AND JNS AND A BACKPACK -- STS HE'S GOING DOOR TO DOOR -- SUBJ WALKING N/B PASSING LOWDEN == ACTING SUSP -- WOULD LIKE HIM CHECKED OUT.

I asked CIT if he had a permit issued by the City of Fort Worth for soliciting his company door-to-door and CIT advised he did not. CIT was issued a General Complaint Citation (G868326) for 030.04 Solicit Trade or Patronage. CIT was advised he needed to get his permit through the City of Fort Worth before he began knocking on

doors again. CIT said he understood.

Saturday evening, 4/20, around 10 pm a white male was observed driving around the Fairmount area stopping and stealing Juan Rangel campaign signs out of numerous yards. The witness saw the activity that took place in the 1200 block of W. Arlington Ave.

No age or description was given of the suspect, only that he was driving in a blue Chrysler car.

This activity constitutes the offense of Theft. The witness stated that he could see about 30 signs within the suspect vehicle. Depending on the value of the signs this could be a class B misdemeanor resulting in up to 180 days in jail and up to a \$2000 fine.

2nd Report

I now have new information on more signs being stolen. Ashley Paz has been made aware that numerous signs her group has distributed have also been taken or damaged. It was also reported that her vehicle was egged within the last few days.

We DO NOT believe that anyone associated with the Rangel or Paz groups has anything to do with these offenses.

Again please report any information related to this crime.

NOTE: City's ordinance prohibits any signs in the parkway (the area between the sidewalk and curb).

I normally do not send pictures out of people but because this individual had a stun gun and a pry bar on his person I decided to add it. [Photo not available for Newsletter publication.]

On 04-22-2013, Ofcr G.G. Hempstead, 3107 working C159 and Ofcr S. Escalante, working C154 were dispatched to [the 3000 block of] 6th Ave. ref a Sig 38--Suspicious Person. Details of the call advised that a WM wearing an orange traffic vest and carrying orange netting was going door to door advising he was employed by the City of Ft. Worth Water Dept. and stating that he needed to check for leaks. The Witness advised that he did not believe the male was a city worker because he was not wearing a uniform or occupying a city vehicle.

Ofcr also observed the arrested person holding a sharp chisel shaped tool in his hand. Ofcr placed the tool on the marked patrol unit and asked the arrested person if he had any weapons on his person. ARR did not answer, but began reaching for his pockets. Ofcr stopped the ARR and told him to place his hands on the patrol unit. Ofcr completed a Terry Frisk for officer safety and the safety of the arrested person. Ofcr located a hand held Stun Gun in his front left pocket, which was the same pocket he had begun reaching for.

He was issued GC G833517 for Soliciting Door to Door--No Permit and transported to 350 W Belknap. St where he was booked into jail. Thank you to the two different residents that called him in.

Spring Check List

With spring already upon us and summer approaching rapidly we need to remember a few things about Target Hardening. We will start to see more and more outdoor activities such as sporting events, yard work, gardening, and home improvement projects being done. Sometimes we can be a bit too complacent and leave items associated with these types of activities lying unsecured around our yards. All too frequently the pillagers roam our neighborhood streets looking for loose items to snatch. It only takes a moment to go inside for a break leaving a leaf blower, weed trimmer, lawnmower or whatever on our driveways or yards. Within moments the sneaky culprits pounce on the freebies and head off to the next unsuspecting victims. Don't just think about the larger items; saws, hammers, shovels, tree trimmers, hand tools, bicycles, anything and everything can be pawned, sold, or traded for a price.

Let's not forget our cars either. People are flabbergasted when they realize their phone cords are stolen from their cars. They are almost always left in plain sight for the window-shopping burglars. These items can be pawned for only a few dollars, but they are worth it when you can hit ten cars and come away with \$20+ of free money. Many times these cords are attached to their counterparts: the MP-3 players, cell phones, or handheld video gaming systems.

We can all help prevent such crimes by minimizing what we leave out and where we leave it. Pull the items as close to the front door as possible. Most criminals won't approach the house during daylight hours when they know people are home. They will, however, grab items that are close enough to the street, allowing them a quick get-a-away. Hide everything within your vehicle -- cords, CD's, shopping bags, backpacks, etc. can be placed in cabin compartments or trunk area. Truck beds are rummaged though every night and anything of value is taken. Yes, I understand it is a pain, but it's an unfortunate fact that this is the world we live in. We have to protect what is ours as best we can. So, HIDE IT, LOCK IT, KEEP IT OUT OF SIGHT.

Forest Park Pool to Re-Open



Two construction projects

set for completion in late spring are ensuring that Fort Worth residents can dive into summertime with new aquatics facilities.

A newly repaired Forest Park pool and the brand new Marine Park Family Aquatics Center are set to open their gates to residents, ending a three-year period with limited-to-no public pool facilities in Cowtown.

After the 2009 swim season, six of the seven city pools – which were originally constructed in the 1920s and 1960s - were closed due to age, wear, and tear. The sole remaining pool, Forest Park, was the city's oldest, but had been renovated in 1991. The pool opened in May 2010 as usual, but was forced to close when pool's liner failed.

The City was left with no aquatics facilities during 2011, prompting residents and staff to take action. Basic repairs to Marine Park Pool allowed the city to open one pool in 2012, but an evaluation of the Citywide Aquatics Master Plan led to the funding and construction of a new type of facility that would replace the aging location.

In government-speak, the new center is known as an Enhanced Neighborhood Family Aquatic Center, but it streamlines ideas in the city's aquatics master plan to speed up funding and construction of new facilities.

The center, estimated to cost \$4 million, is the first of five of its kind called for in the aquatics plan. The city's adopted Aquatics Master Plan proposes the construction of the four remaining centers over next five to 10 years.

To help meet demand for pools while new facilities are constructed. Forest Park pool also got a much needed facelift for the 2013 season, allowing it to open alongside the new Marine Park Pool.

Work is under way on both projects with a grand opening date set for May 25th.

BOARD ADOPTS PLANNING COMMITTEE'S RECOMMENDATIONS

After several working sessions, your Strategic Plan Committee (Terri West, Chairperson, John Belknap, Lamar Brown, John Kline and Bart Bradford) presented their recommendations of Public Improvements to be included in the up-coming bond issue to the RPIA Board of Directors on April $15^{\rm th}$.

The Fort Worth City Council has not set a date nor amount for the next Bond Issue Vote; however, the vote is anticipated to be in 2014. RPIA President, Dan Roberts, charged the Strategic Plan Committee this year to create a list of Public Works items suitable to be included in the next Bond Proposal. The Committee's recommendation included:

STREETS TO BE RECONSTRUCTED

- ■Ryan Place Dr. 2300 Block
- ■Willing Ave. 2800 Block
- Robert St. 1000 Block
- ■Bowie St. 1200 Block

STREETS TO BE REHABILITATED

- •Jessamine 1500 Block (This is the common street between Fairmount and Ryan Place. RPIA will seek their concurrence.)
- •Elizabeth Blvd. replace deteriorated curbs, but maintain the stone curb street name signs.

SIDEWALKS

- Reinstitute the 2004 Bond sidewalk replacement program, or
- •Create a similar cost sharing program whereby the property owner pays 25% and the City 75%.

The Committee also recommended that the President meet with Councilperson Burns on this matter as well as send a formal request to the City Council and Public Works Department.

The Strategic Plan Committee formulated its recommendations after reviewing all of the Public Works projects in the "pipeline" and other "commitments" made by the City.

Ten Little Improvements


It is important to the whole neighborhood always to remember that the "I" in RPIA stands for **IMPROVEMENT.** In fact, the Ryan Place Improvement Association was originally formed to garner resources to create and maintain neighborhood improvements. Such improvements span a wide range of items from streets to clean yards. It only makes good logical sense that every property holder works diligently for the improvement of the whole neighborhood. The following is a list of some very simple items that each of us can do to help build and sustain (IMPROVE) our neighborhood:

- Plant a street tree. (See April, 2013 Ryan Place Newsletter for the benefits of a tree.)
- Plant a flowering tree in your front or back yard.
- 3. Every spring and fall plant seasonal color in your front yard.
- 4. Stop your yard maintenance person from blowing grass clippings and tree leaves into the street.
- 5. Turn on your porch light every night.
- 6. Put a lock on the alley gate.
- Keep the street gutter clean and free of leaves and other debris.
- Report the "pot holes" in your street. Call Transportation/ Public Works dept. 817/392-8100.
- 9. Keep your alley clean and mowed.
- Make sure your lawn irrigation system is not leaking or watering the street.


