Traffic Circle Gardens Update

We had such a wonderful team of volunteers who worked very hard on two weekends to beautify our Elizabeth Boulevard traffic circles. It is with a heavy heart, I say we were obviously unsuccessful in our first attempt. Please allow me to share our struggles and provide an update.

Last August, I noticed the plants in the circles were dying. I did some investigating and discovered the company hired by the city to do the landscaping had filled the circles with construction sand and covered it over with one inch of soil. John Kline, former RPIA President, and I contacted the city concerning this. After several weeks of phone calls and emails, the city finally agreed to meet with us on October31st.

I took many photos and soil (sand) samples and put together a presentation for the meeting. After several more weeks, the city said they had been, in effect, swindled by the land-scaping company, and they would never hire them again. They also said it was unfortunate we got stuck with the bad landscaping, but there was nothing they could do to help us.

We found this answer unacceptable. We began an unrelenting campaign of making a nuisance of ourselves. The city finally asked me to supply them with an estimate of what it would cost us to redo the circles. After pricing plants, labor, dump truck loads of good soil, mulch, fertilizer, etc., I sent them an estimate of \$9,219.00. After months of waiting, we finally received a check from the city for the full amount of my estimate. So the good news is, the circles have not cost Ryan Place a dime.

We have struggled and worked very hard to figure out why the plants in the circles have failed. I have been an award winning Master Gardener for many years, but I was baffled. I sprayed the roses for insects and fungal diseases. I fertilized and pruned them to encourage new

growth. Using a garden fork, we dug around each plant in all the circles to loosen the soil, allowing oxygen to get to the roots. It was then I noticed the soil was very wet.

We turned off the watering systems in the circles and daily monitored the soil with hydrometers. No mater how hot it got or how long it had been since the last rain, the soil remained wet. This explained why the plants were dying. Their roots were water logged and rotting! This was bizarre!

Exploratory holes, three inches wide and three feet deep were bored in the Adams Street and Willing Avenue circles. They immediately filled a few inches deep with water. Well, there you have it! The water is coming up from beneath the circles! Perhaps before John Ryan came along, there was a creek running through the area. Perhaps there are underground springs. We can only guéss. The point is, the soil is wet and stays wet.

I am removing all the dead plants and digging up and potting the ones that still show signs of life. I will attempt to nurse them back to health and plant them elsewhere in the neighborhood.

We plan to let the soil lay fallow over the winter. In the spring, we will add amendments to loosen it up. We will then search for plants that thrive in full sun and wet soil. We cannot use Texas native plants or more traditional landscaping plants, as they will not survive in wet conditions.

I knew it would be a challenge to grow gardens where there has been a street for one hundred years. Our circles present some unusual conditions, and because of this, we will have to experiment to see what will grow. We are not ready to give up yet. I will keep you posted.

Over the last 2 weeks Ryan Place has been experiencing a rash of back yard shed and garage burglaries. The suspect(s) are entering through the alley ways and breaking into the buildings. If the fence has a lock the screws holding on the hinges on the opposite side of the lock are being removed and the gate is then accessible to gain entry. Fences with no rear entry have sustained damage atop the railing of the fence. The same thing is happening on the buildings, the screws attaching the lock to the building are being removed and the hasp holding the lock falls to the ground. If there are exterior hinges on the door itself the hinge screws as well are being removed or the hinge pins are being knocked out.

All of this activity is taking place typically between 11 pm and 6 am. The majority of the crimes have been between S. Adams, 8th, W. Cantey St. and Elizabeth Blvd. Items being selected are lawn equipment, (mowers, blowers, trimmers) bicycles, and power tools.

I know that we will catch the culprit soon, but until then please check when the dog is barking or when you hear noises at night. If you have access to wild game cameras, or video surveillance it would be prudent to point it towards your alley/shed area. If you find you are a victim of a crime that has yet to be report you can either call an officer out or you can go to www.fortworthpd.com and follow the link of the right side of the page. It will take you only a few minutes to input your information and you will receive a report number for your records and insurance claims.

Four of our South Central NPO team and our Sgt. worked an overnight detail last Thursday (7/31) morning from 1200 AM-

0700 AM hours. We had officers on foot walking the alley ways and another on a bike riding the alleys and riding on the streets. We were trying to locate our overnight shed/garage burglar. Although we did not make any arrest we did see at least 2 w/m's riding their bikes around between the hours of 0200-0400 in/out of RP and Fairmount. The good thing was I was pulled over by a midnight beat officer within the first hours we were out there. I was surprised to see how many people were walking from establishments around Magnolia and walking deep into RP after 0300 hours. Several were young females alone and intoxicated, one who was dancing in the middle of the street with her purse dangling from her shoulder.

We were utilizing plain vehicles and plain clothing trying to follow these individuals, but they were able to lose us using the cloak of darkness. Air-1 helicopter was summoned, but they too lost them even with using their FLIR system. I would say that the riders must have gone into a house in the area between Elizabeth, Jessamine, 8th and 5th. One looked to be in his mid to late 30's and was tall and slender. The second, who was not with the first cyclist, was in his early to mid 20's and appeared to have been slightly intoxicated and we think entered into a house south of W. Cantey between 8th and 6th around 0230. Putting the time closer to him leaving a bar on Magnolia as that was the direction he was coming from.

The good news is that since that time neither RP nor Fairmount has had a single burglary of a garage of shed. Hopefully what this means is that the suspect saw us and now knows they are being watched or an even better idea is that he/they are in jail. As you can see by the report there were 3 burglaries of vehicles, but they do not appear to be related. Two were during the day and the other at night. One had a suspect vehicle and the actors live across 8th on Livingston close to Paschal.

One thing that I did see several of the RP residents were doing was lighting up the alley directly behind their house. I saw multiple bright lights attached just above the fence line shining down on the fence and ground area. This looks to be a very good deterrent.

SECURITY ISSUE: Time to check YOUR alley. Clear trash, mow, trim over-grown plants!



Grass vs. TreesTrees win!



In last month's episode, the old-established grass sod was beating up on our newly-planted trees in a tumultuous battle going on in our front yards. Thanks to some recent rain and cool weather, plus our diligent watering routine, our young saplings have pulled ahead even this late in the summer. Don't stop now. Continue to give these new additions to our yards plenty of water, at least up until time of the first frost in November, or while their green leaves are still hanging around on their twigs. During our second year, next summer, we will need to stay dedicated to keeping the area around our new trees moist. After then they should be able to go it alone against the bully lawn grass.

You'll notice there is one area in our lawns where our oldestablished trees have diminished the growth of the grasses. It happens in an area right under the trees and spreading out away from the trunk. Here the old trees have won! Now if I had to choose between having shade or grass on these spots, I would choose the shade. Shade trees add value to the property (up to 20%) and keep the cooling cost much lower around the buildings during the summer. Shade also gives a space for the birds and the bees.

Most lawn grass species are poor competitors when facing off with a mature shade tree. Here are a couple of reasons: First, the shade from the tree does not allow direct sunlight to reach the grass below. Most grasses require five to six hours of direct sunlight every day to flourish. Without full sun the grass becomes thin and weak. Second, large shade trees can outcompete the grasses for water and nutrients. Remember when we planted our young trees this spring? The grass bullied the water and nutrient away from the saplings. Trees get revenge when they grow up and get older!

Solutions: Accept the fact that trees beat grass in the shade. Plant shade-tolerant ground cover plants instead of grass up next to the tree. Also, some relief can be given by trimming the lower tree branches to allow more sunlight to reach the ground beneath the trees. All our efforts to water and fertilize the grass growing under the trees is almost vain because the trees have a so much more competitive roots system right below the ground surface.

So, keep you young trees watered this year. And, make a move to keep those bare spots covered beneath the older trees.


