Timely Tips for October Gardeners from Calloway's

Fall Lawn Care

Traffic Circle Landscaping Expenses

It was recently brought to my attention that neighbors may have an interest in seeing a breakdown of the expenses incurred for landscaping our three traffic circles this past spring.

First, let me give you the backstory. As some of you may know, RPIA allocated \$10,000 of the Gas Lease money received by our neighborhood in 2008 toward ongoing maintenance of the Traffic Circles and Chicanes installed in 2011 and 2012. As Suze Diesel detailed in her article in the September RPIA newsletter, the landscaping originally done by a contractor of the City of Ft. Worth was unsuccessful – primarily due to the poor foundation that was laid (largely sand). The Circles were re-landscaped this past spring and the City of Ft. Worth reimbursed RPIA for the expenses in the amount of \$9,219. Unfortunately, further difficulties have been experienced and we are now researching alternative solutions. You can read more about this in the September newsletter posted on the RPIA website at www.historicryanplace.org.

Getting back to the expenses, below is a breakdown for your review. This information was included in the monthly treasury reports for March, April and May (as the expenses occurred) distributed at the monthly RPIA

meetings, open to the public. Fortunately, because some of our Ryan Place residents lobbied fiercely with the City for the reimbursement of the landscaping, we still have approved funding for the maintenance of the Traffic Circles and Chicanes in the amount of \$7,862 (\$10,000 - \$3,081 [water impact fee in 2011] - \$8,275.79 [total expense shown below] + \$9,219 reimbursement).

*Includes 1) Removal and re-installation of drip tubing, 2) removal and replanting of 2 Chinese Pistache trees, 3) Excavation of existing soil & haul away, 4) Installation of 12 inches of mixed bedding soil provided by customer, 5) Testing of drip tubing to insure proper functioning and \$600 labor for all of the above.

First EcoScape Residential Landscape **Contest Winners Announced**

Three area homeowners commended for water conservation

In an effort to raise awareness of wasteful water usage the Fort Worth Water Department and BRIT® partnered to challenge area homeowners to create the perfect, water efficient landscape and compete in the EcoScape, residential landscape contest. Residents with 1,000 square foot (or larger) front yard were eligible and were asked to submit their water efficient yards that use native/adaptive plants and mix according to color, aesthetic appeal, and plant variety.

The winners of the contest are: first place, Betty Porter, 3217 Field Street, Haltom City; second place, Kathy Clark, 4005 W. 6th Street, Fort Worth; and third place, Rick Tucker, 2517 Ryan Avenue, Fort Worth.

It is estimated that up to 50% of all water used in the summer months goes to residential landscapes.

The EcoScape Contest was open to residential landscapes within Fort Worth city limits and Fort Worth's wholesale customer cities. The judging criteria included design aesthetic appeal through composition, use of color, and plant variety; water conservation; and overall yard/plant health. In hopes of making this an

annual contest, BRIT and the Fort Worth Water Department will again sponsor the competition next year. Applications will be available on the City of Fort Worth and BRIT web sites. Fortworthtexas.gov/water


