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Ryan Place Fire Truck Committee Needs Your Help!

It's about time for a long overdue update on our Ryan Place Fire Truck. Most of you who have moved into the neighborhood in recent years are probably unaware that Ryan Place has its very own fire truck! We do! It's a 1934 American LaFrance Type 399 Pumper built on a GMC Truck chassis, and we've had it for about forty years, give or take. It was originally purchased by the city of Arlington, Texas and was delivered to them on October 10, 1934. The truck spent the first few decades of its life in service with the Arlington Fire Department and was later used for training prior to its retirement.

Dr. David F. Lee Sr. of Fort Worth acquired the truck from Arlington in the early '70s, at which point it was used for a variety of interesting but non fire-fighting purposes. He was looking for a place to keep it, and Ryan Place's own Dr. E. Richard Halden Jr. and family offered to store it in the largest bay of their garage at 1001 Elizabeth Boulevard. Drs. Lee and Halden drove the truck in various events and activities and Dr. Halden was ofttimes regarded as Ryan Place's very own "Fire Captain". The truck became a fixture in the neighborhood and ownership of the truck was transferred to the Ryan Place Improvement Association in February of 1985.

After serving more than a decade as "keepers" of the truck, the Halden's handed off their duties to RP President Rob Hood. During his tenure, he and RP resident Doug Clark performed many significant repairs to the truck and spruced it up. Rob owned a trucking company at the time and volunteered to fix the brakes and replace the aging and failing "Flathead" engine with a more modern Chevy "Stovebolt Six" out of a 1950s truck. Doug took the fire truck to a local body shop and clinched a bargain price on a fresh paint job. Doug also

performed significant amounts of maintenance and restoration work - he manufactured the solid metal radiator cap and wooden ladders and hose-bed deck, replaced the running board mats and bell and performed numerous other repairs and upgrades. The truck lived under Doug and Linda's porte cochère from time to time as he performed work on it.

By the mid '90's storage was provided by Glenn and Patricia Polenz on College Avenue, followed by Bonnie Hyson on Elizabeth Boulevard, and they and a few others drove the truck during various events.

I assumed the "keeper" role in 1999, and for the next five years I oversaw storage and performed repairs (water pump, carburetor, throttle linkage, electrical, tires, siren rebuild, new electric cooling fan, etc.). I drove the truck regularly in parades in both Ryan Place and adjoining neighborhoods and circled throughout our neighborhood during each Candlelight Christmas home tour - sometimes with a load of carolers in the back. The truck was in the lineup multiple times in the downtown "Parade of Lights" and even participated in a TCU homecoming parade.

The truck broke on Saturday, July 3, 2004 on its way back from the Berkeley Place 4th, er ... 3rd of July Parade (they wanted to hold it on a Saturday). While crossing the railroad tracks on Windsor at 8th Avenue the rear axle pinion gear gave out. A large flatbed wrecker was called to load it and haul it back home to Old Fire Station #10, followed by arrangements to load and haul it to the Texas Fire Museum in Dallas, where it now sits inside their south exhibit bay awaiting repairs and restoration. TFM is a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation and restoration of antique fire equipment, and their sister organization - NTHFS (North Texas Historical Fire Society) is a regional chapter of SPAAMFAA (Society for the Preservation and Appreciation of Antique Motor Fire Apparatus in America). TFM hosted Annual SPAAMFAA Conventions in 2008 and 2011, and is nationally recognized for operating the largest antique fire apparatus restoration facility in the nation. TFM and



SPAAMFAA are serious organizations. We're almost done with the acronyms.

Now the important thing to realize is we can't just walk down to our local AutoZone or NAPA store and order the needed parts. We're talking 1934 here. There aren't even many remaining '30s axles laying around to rob parts from and most of them are likely sitting anonymously in a field or next to a barn somewhere. During the time the truck has been out of commission, we TFM members have chased many many leads and had some close calls. Many distant trips have been made. We'll know within the next few days about the possible availability of our latest prospect - a '30s GMC chassis with an intact axle located near rural Cumby, Texas. Who knows, we might get lucky with this one. We've also explored alternative options - after-all, more than a few parade floats have been powered by a Pinto motor and drivetrain. We haven't come up with anything that makes sense yet. A gear manufacturer in Tennessee quoted us over \$5000 to grind a new pair of gears but everybody agreed that was not reasonable. We're considering the possibility of modifying the Axle to accept a more modern differential. Time will hopefully tell us more in the next few months than it has in the last several years.

Full-blown restorations can easily cost well over \$80k-100k but that's not what we're interested in.

Our truck is in need of a lot of work. We could easily spend \$10-15k just going through it and making it safe and reliable, and another \$10-20k or more on appearance, depending on how nice we want it to look. We've got to decide how much.

We want to raise funds for the repair and restoration of our old fire truck and are hopeful this article will help generate some excitement and enthusiasm.

Please let us know if you are interested in helping move the project forward.



Composting.....Yes, Right in My Backyard


Ever wonder if there is a better way to dispense of those messy things left over from your household activities? Like coffee grounds, banana peels, onion and cabbage cores, even tree leaves and flower trimmings? There is, and it's easy and simple to do. All it takes is four very basic elements: Water, air, carbon material, and energy. And they're all there, practically for free in your own backyard. Here's the best part --- the result is a mixture of wonderful soil amendments that will make your flowers, shrubs, and garden bloom in the tough North Texas sun. Plus, no more smelling up the weekly garbage cart with leftovers stuffed in plastic bags and no more bagging up the leaves fallen from your trees! You can recycle them at home in your very own compost bin.


Back to the basics. Your yard trimmings and table scraps are made pretty much of carbon and water (ashes to ashes, dust to dust). They will decompose easily with a little help from your backyard friends. These are crawly, creepy micro-organisms and critters like beetles, nematodes, and earthworms. These organisms chew and chomp your food scraps to little pieces and then decompose all carbon material back into air and water. All they need is air (oxygen), water, and energy to survive. That's where you come in with an occasional squirt with the garden hose, some quick flips to stir in some air, and a walk out to carry the weekly dose of food energy. Coffee grounds, oak leaves, wilted flowers, old tortillas, apple cores, left-over pasta. The list is expansive, yet with some restrictions no meat scraps or grease, no chunks of concrete or stone, avoid pet waste, and definitely no dead bodies!

After a couple of months and with very little care your compost will come out smelling like the earth, rich in plant and soil nutrients, and saving you from messy plastic bags and rotten smelling trash bins. Sound too simple? Well, it can be. But, there can be some secret nuances you'll need to learn. We are thinking maybe early this spring, when the weather gets a bit warmer, we can have a composting demonstration in a neighbor's backyard. We'll make it easy for you to visit and see the composting process in action. This would allow you to dig into the details of a successful transition from messy garbage to a valuable treasure right in your own backyard. Talk to us about it.

Daggett Montessori Campus - Wynn Building Demolition

The Wynn Building on the Daggett Montessori campus located at the corner of Page Avenue and Lipscomb Street is scheduled for demolition during the week of March 10, 2014. Fort Worth ISD is demolishing the building to make room for a running track and to provide more open space on the campus. Asbestos abatement was completed and the interior gutted about 14 years ago; the building has been empty and unused since.

Site preparation may begin a few days beforehand and the area surrounding building will be fenced off for safety and security purposes. Established in 1983, Daggett Montessori was the first public Montessori program in Fort Worth ISD and was initially housed within Daggett Elementary and Daggett Middle Schools, the program was moved to the existing K-8 campus beginning in 2001. The unique setting, built on the former campus of the Edna Gladney Center for Adoption, consists of multiple buildings connected by covered walkways.

The building, built in 1984 by the Gladney Center, was named in honor of prominent Fort Worth attorney Sproesser Wynn of the McDonald, Sanders law firm, counsel to The Texas Children's Home and Aid Society, one of the founders of the Family Law Section of the State Bar of Texas and its second chairman, former chairman of the American Bar Association Committee on Adoption, longtime attorney for both Edna Gladney and John Justin and the 1968 Republican nominee for Texas Attorney General.

CRIME PREVENTION & SECURITY

Well it looks as if we survived the holidays! Thank goodness! I just wanted to express my gratitude for the warm welcome that I have received from everyone. The past month and a half I have been greeted with open arms and everyone that I have come into contact with have been nothing but gracious and kind. Honestly, I didn't know what to expect as I transitioned from patrol to NPO but everyone has made this transition easier than expected and I'll be forever grateful. Thank you again.

As I wrote in the last newsletter I worked patrol in the Fairmount/ Ryan Place/South Hemphill Heights area from 2001-2003 and again from 2007-2010 and the brunt of the problems have always been burglaries and thefts. The past month and a half I have seen the reported burglaries and thefts and they are a concern. I have been a victim of burglary and theft and it is unsettling to say the least. They have tapered off the last couple of weeks but in my opinion one burglary/theft is one too many. I have been meeting with residents who have been victims of these crimes and I've also been meeting with residents who have emailed me to meet with them for advice on how to secure their house. I don't mind doing this at all and in fact I'm very happy to do it. Feeling secure when you're in your home and when you're away is what we all want and it's what I along with the beat officers strive to maintain. We should all feel secure in our homes without worry of someone breaking into our houses or vehicles but the reality of it is there is always going to be someone who feels they can commit these crimes and get away with it. It's the goal of beat officers and myself to impress upon them that it is not okay to come into these neighborhoods and have free reign. COP patrols have stepped up along with extra patrols by beat officers and myself. These extra patrols may or may not be why we have seen burglaries taper off but we are all doing our best to deter crime of any sort. One thing that impresses me about Fairmount/Ryan Place/South Hemphill Heights is the communication between neighbors and how everyone looks out for each other. As residents of these neighborhoods it's important for everyone to watch out for their neighbors and keep an eye out for any suspicious activity. I've caught many burglars in my 14 plus years and a great deal of the apprehensions were due to residents calling in on suspicious activity or calling in on a burglary/theft in progress. Some of the apprehensions were from officers being in the right place at the right time. In other words it was luck. I just want everyone reading this to understand that your help is needed when it comes to catching these thieves and burglars. From what I've seen residents have done a great job calling in suspicious activity and I hope that continues. I also don't want anyone to feel like your wasting our time when you call us out to investigate suspicious activity. That's what we're here for. That's what is going to help us catch somebody up to no good. Keep up with watchful eyes and calling us out when you need us.

As I wrote earlier I have been going to some residences to offer some advice or tips and here is some of what I've been telling people:

- -If you don't have an alarm on your house then get one.
- -Get an alarm that makes loud noise inside and outside so it can also get the attention of neighbors. Burglars hate loud noise
- -Put cameras inside or outside your house or both. Detectives can look at still frames and get good descriptions of burglars.
- -Write down serial numbers on all your electronics, game systems, laptops, IPads, guns, etc. You have a good chance of getting your belongings back.
- -Take all your belongings out of your vehicles. Don't make it easy for burglars to take your stuff by leaving expensive goods in your vehicle. Lock your doors!
- -Light up the outside of your house with floodlights in front and in back. Make sure they have motion detectors.
- -Make sure if you have dogs that your doggie door (if you have one) isn't big enough for a small person to climb through.
- -Call some security companies and inquire about how to reinforce your front and back doors and possibly your windows
- -When you're not home it may be a good idea to close your curtains or blinds so burglars can't get an inventory of your belongings by just looking in your windows.

These are just a few helpful tips. They're not guaranteed to stop someone from breaking into your house/car but they may deter some. As always if you have any questions or concerns please feel free to contact me. I'll see you all in the neighborhood!
