





Ryan Place's Two Percenters

As we have previously discussed, you can please some of the people some of the time, but you can't please all the people all the time.

The summary results of the Ryan Place Neighborhood Traffic Management Plan showed indications of success for the five-year-long plan and implementation process. At the RPIA board meeting much time was spent discussing the speed of traffic on W. Cantey. Measured speed prior to removal of speed humps and the installation of traffic chicanes was 28 MPH vs. now of 29 MPH. (Actually an increase of one and one-half miles per hour.) That difference to difficult for the untrained observer to notice or to consider an inappropriate result of many years of work to rid the neighborhood of excess traffic volume and speed.

Volume - The good news is that W. Cantey Street carries 49 fewer vehicles. Which led our traffic experts to theorize that the folks traveling on Cantey weren't using our neighborhood as a "cut-thru," but they just might be our neighbors.

Speed - As it turns out the Traffic Engineering Manual requires the removal of the top 15% of the speed data when calculating the traffic's average speed. This fact got me thinking that maybe the top 15% of traffic is now driving much faster than the previous top 15%. And just maybe those drivers live in Ryan Place.

Back in the day of Paschal High School during the days of Principal O. D. Wyatt he always talked about how 98% of the students followed the Paschal Honor Code: they followed the rules, did their work and got along just fine. Some students, the other 2%, were the ones who got into trouble by not following the rules. They were the ones who had most of the contact with the deans of boys or girls. They were the ones sent to the principal's office.

Now as you have probably have guessed. I didn't meet O.D. Wyatt until graduation night right after they announced my name and I walked across the stage, shook his hand to receive my diploma. But since then I have, at times, acted like a Two Percenter behind the wheel.

Maybe some of Ryan Place drivers are also Two Percenters. They drive faster than the speed limit, coast through stop signs, and all that other wrong stuff. Therefore, if for no other reason than to make our neighbors of W. Cantey happier, I will slow down at least 1.5 MPH!

Lets try that on all our streets!
