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

RPIA President's Update

Hello Friends & Neighbors -

Are you ready for summer? Terri West and several other neighbors are cooking up a spectacular July 4 event, combining the parade with some fun new traditions. This is one of Ryan Place's mainstay social events of the year and is fun for all ages. Hope to see you there!

I am excited about the progress we are making on several of our neighborhood initiatives, including our new website, updated by-laws and long-term strategic plan. Your neighbors are working tirelessly on these projects to continue to move our neighborhood improvement efforts forward, and I thank them all for their dedication.

The new website should be up and running this summer. I know it can't happen fast enough, but remember this is a volunteer effort. The new site will maintain much of the current information, but will offer many updates in information and a refreshed look and feel with beautiful photos from our neighborhood photographers. We will include the newsletters and meeting minutes that have been requested by many.

Expect to see information about the new by-laws in the next newsletter to be published and distributed in August. We will also hopefully be holding information sessions this Summer/Fall to discuss our long-term strategic plan with the neighborhood. This is a critical plan we will use to drive the future development strategy of Ryan Place.

On another important note, one of my neighbors recently asked, "What is up with the traffic circles on Elizabeth Blvd? Should I try to sprinkle some flower seeds on them in the hopes that something might grow?" Those are very fair questions.

The Board has consulted with Dotty Woodson who is an Extension Program Specialist - Water Resources with Texas A&M's AgriLife Extension Service. Dr. Woodson has worked with the City of Fort Worth on several projects. After some study and analysis, she helped us determine the underlying problem with the failed landscaping attempts is a lack of proper drainage. Following a full report and proposal from Dr. Woodson, the City agreed to cover the full cost of installing a drainage system. Fortunately, they know her as a very credible resource and will be consulting with her to formulate a successful plan. The work will ultimately be done by contractors of the City. We are pushing for this to be done by the Fall planting season so we can get the Circles looking great this year. Lucky for us, Dr. Woodson has agreed to advise on the landscaping efforts that will take place after the drainage system is put in place.

So what is the cost to Ryan Place for all of this? Surprisingly, nothing, except the cost of re-landscaping. On another positive note, the soil in all three Circles was recently re-tested by Texas A&M and was determined to be of high quality. The soil represented the largest part of the cost for the landscaping effort last year. Because it will be reusable, this should keep costs down for the next round of landscaping. Have a safe and happy Summer!

Time to water, time to mow. Time to water, time to mow. Time to water, time to mow.

Here it is June. The beginning of summer. It is a time to **water** and a time to **mow**. **Water** is supercrucial for our new seedling trees just planted along our parkways in Ryan Place. We are in the midst of an exceptional drought, with our hottest, driest days ahead. The trees planted last year and this spring need water to survive and grow. Our subsoil is dry and never got the replenishing rains last fall and this spring. Recent rain showers couldn't wet down to the root zone of these young trees. Neither can our lawn sprinklers add enough water to soak into the ground one foot, or so, where the tree roots need the moisture. In fact, watering the lawn will actually compete for water with the trees. (Grass Wins!). Use your garden hose and let the water trickle out slowly to soak the area deep around each tree.

And **mow**. Not only will we need to cut the grass in our yards, we also need to trim and mow the alley behind our houses. The brush and weeds are back there, taking their share of space and waste. The city will not be coming through Ryan Place to clean our alleys this year. So it will be up to us to get the job done. A clean alley makes the neighborhood look better, plus it opens up the vision for our security patrols (police, Code Blue, and surveillance cameras.) Each homeowner is responsible for their half of the alley. Neighbors can work out any type of arrangement to keep the weeds and shrubs trimmed this summers. And please, don't use the alley for a dumping ground. People have to walk, and drive, and work in this space. Keep it clean.

Two things you need to have ready this month—your garden hose and your weed whacker.

Timely Tips for June Gardeners

from Calloway's

It's getting hotter and summer time activities are getting into full swing. June brings both the opportunity to plant summer color, and the routine garden maintenance of mowing and weeding. Keep up with the mowing so you don't have to bag the clippings. Mow every 5 to 6 days instead of every 7 to 10 days and let the clippings fall back into the lawn which recycles nutrients but does not promote thatch. Keep the mower blade sharpened.

Mulching is the best way to conserve moisture in the landscape. A three to four inch layer over the root zone retains moisture, keeps the soil cooler and helps prevent weeds.

June is a great month for setting out colorful summer annuals. Marigolds, Salvia, Petunias, Verbena, Cockscombs and Celosia are great in sunny locations. Color for the shady areas includes Caladiums, Coleus, Impatiens and Begonias.

Make your landscape a bird-friendly one by fulfilling all of a wild bird's basic needs, food, shelter, water and nesting sites. The best types of plants to use to attract local birds are the plants they are most familiar with. Native landscaping uses local and regional trees, shrubs, flowers and grasses; the same plants that birds recognize as rich food sources and appropriate shelter.

Reduce the use, Reuse the most, and Recycle the rest.

We have gotten most of life's problems, if not controlled, at least identified when we get concerned about the use, misuse, deployment and stowage of our Garbage, Recycling and Compostable Carts. But since some might want to be reminded of the process and etiquette I have asked Jerry Lemunyon of Ryan Place Drive for a few tips:

Ryan Place is not like some neighborhoods where trash bins cover the landscape 24/7. Carts are set out the night before Tuesday and should be taken back after pick up by 8 am Thursday morning. (Sorry Jerry, but I had too add my parenthetical comments. - Chris) (Fortunately July 4th is on a Friday this year. Carts should be well hidden by then!)

Carts should be put on top of the curb, a few inches from the edge, not in the gutter. Late night rainstorms or water pipe breaks can send torrents of water down the street gutters, carrying with it your tipped-over cart. And consider this: the first thrust of the pickup machine is out, pushing those delicate cart wheels back into the cement curb. Crack! (Undercover Code Enforcement workers all carry rulers to check that you aren't over the edge!) (You're not going to get to say anything unkind about rain! Bring it on.)

Weekend warriors (that's gardeners, not members of the National Guard or Army Reserve) should keep their refuse from their handy work in back of their property. Placing trash, recycles, or vegetation carts out on the street on Saturday makes it a 5-day weekend. Also, big bulk trash pickup happens the third full week of each month. Hold that pile until the weekend before. Remember: Trash attracts trash. (The first 'full week' is defined as one that begins on Sunday having a date that is a single digit number less than 8. That clear?)

All trash, recycles, and vegetation must be contained inside the cart. Placing cardboard boxes and plastic bags of grass trimmings or leaves outside, next to the carts, is unacceptable. The truck and it's machine only picks up the cart, not the extras. Solutions: Cut up the cardboard boxes and place them in the recycle cart, and start a compost pile in the backyard and use your leaves at home. Thinking home-grown compost might save you a trip to the Home Depot. This can minimize the amount of "trash" that appears on our curbs every Wednesday morning.

Wednesday evening is a good time to practice your "Pick up 10 pieces of trash per week." It is easy to find 10 things to throw away, recycle, or compost on the street. (Sometimes right in front of your house.)

All carts must be stored on your property somewhere so they can't be seen from the street: behind shrubs or in the back yard, the garage or the alley. Ryan Place is a special place let's treat even our garbage carts like they are special, too.

To Tour or Not to Tour? That is the Question

On Mother's Day, I went on the Fairmount Home Tour, talked with Fairmounters . . . and the question came up: Will Ryan Place continue to have a Candlelight Tour?

That seems to be the question of the hour. CCRP (Candlelight Christmas in Ryan Place) has just finished its 30th tour, and that seems to be a mile-stone of some sort requiring us to step back and reevaluate what we're doing as a tour, as a non-profit organization, and as a neighborhood. CCRP was specifically chartered to preserve and enhance the historic ambience of the neighborhood, and as a mission, that's still viable. But several things seem to be winding down. The huge Streetlight Project that's been running for over a decade is in its last phase. Through the tours, CCRP has raised over \$231,000 for streetlights, and we are down to our final accounting with the City and the final installations. Also, the cadre of CCRP board members who have been organizing the tour for decades are ready to hand the baton to another generation. Then there's the docent problem. Over the last decade, it's become harder and harder to find enough docents to staff the homes during tour weekend, which puts more stress on everyone and takes some of the fun out of the experience.

And there's the key word: fun. A historic home tour is many things—an educational experience for the general public, the final "look at me" phase of a long restoration project, the sharing of a piece of history, and of course, a fundraiser. But it should also be fun for everyone involved, and I think it's easy to loose sight of the fun aspect as we become busy and stressed.

During the thirty years of the tour, I've done a whole range of jobs. I've been a docent, a committee chair, a board member, and four times a tour home. I think one of the glories of living in a wonderful old home in a historic neighborhood is sharing the uniqueness of where you live. This has also been one of the underpinnings of our neighborhood revitalization as it promoted a part of town that was being overlooked by homebuyers. I remember when Ryan Place was considered a sketchy place to live and Fairmont was considered a tear-down waiting to happen. When my family was in the process of buying our home in Ryan Place, most banks wouldn't even consider a mortgage in that area, and one friend said, "What are you going to do with an old house like that? You obviously can't live in it. Are you going to tear it down and build something livable?" In pre-restoration and pre-historic district Elizabeth Boulevard, no one wanted to sink money into a run-down mansion that looked more like a money-pit than a home. A lot has changed in forty years, and it was due to three things: RPIA fighting to stop the erosion of zoning and services, Candlelight Tour attracting young families back to the neighborhood, and the safety net of historic zoning on Elizabeth Boulevard.

But to return to the original question: Will Ryan Place continue to have a Candlelight Tour? The answer lies in the hands of the neighborhood as a whole, since the neighborhood supplies the docents, board members, and homeowners that allow the tour to exist. For that reason, CCRP would like input from the neighborhood on the direction for the future. Should the tour continue? Is there enough grass-roots support to sustain the tour? What project should be our post-streetlight goal? And above all, how can we put more fun back in fundraising?

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CODE COMPLIANCE QUESTIONS

Can I place a sign or post a handbill in a median, at an intersection or alongside a road or highway?

Recently several residents have raised concern about real estate signs, in the parkway. This falls under regulation by City Code Compliance.

The City of Fort Worth only allows official traffic control devices in the right of way. Citizens cannot place, erect or otherwise post a sign in a median, at an intersection or <u>alongside a road</u> or highway. This includes stake, corrugated plastic, cardboard, posterboard and other temporary signs. (excerpted from fortworthtexas.gov)


We need to form a committee to make recommendations on the method and cost of repair, implementation of work, and housing upon return. Interested mechanics and fund raisers are needed for this committee.
