

President's Letter



I hope everyone is having a great spring! The General Meeting and BBQ was a great success. We had over 140 neighbors attend

the event on the 20th, and met lots of neighbors who have recently moved into the neighborhood. The bounce house was full of kids, and the BBQ was as good as ever. Pictures of the event are included in the newsletter and on our Facebook page. We even had a drone take pictures of the event, which should be available on the website or Facebook page. Thanks to Tim Keith, Bill Estes and the entire Ryan Place BBQ Company for cooking. I look forward to making this event a yearly event for our neighborhood.

The day before the General Meeting, a dedicated group of volunteers began work on the chicanes on Cantey. The group cleaned four chicanes and installed plants provided by Ryan Place Improvement Association. Thanks to Kris Savage, Bob Plentl and Becky Plentl for their work on this improvement project. We have two more chicanes to finish, so look for RPIA's request for volunteers.

As I discussed last time, on May 7th, the city is holding an election to amend the city charter. The City Council voted to ask the citizens of Fort Worth their opinions on many changes, but the most important changes are:

- 1. Expanding the city council by 2 seats;
- 2. Raising the salaries of the mayor and city council; and
- 3.Extending the terms of the mayor and city council from 2 years to 3 years.

If passed, these proposed changes will impact how our city is run, and could directly impact Ryan Place. Please make time to vote on the 7th. RPIA will be posting times and locations of the polling locations.

The RPIA Board meeting on March 21st discussed some important new projects for the neighborhood. The Triangle Park Committee is meeting to discuss the improvements at that park. Our neighborhood has funds dedicated to that park's improvement, and now we need a plan. We should have an update on the status of the improvements for our next newsletter. Thanks to Aaron Shutt and Jennifer Renta for leading this endeavor.

Additionally, the Tour Funds Committee reported to the RPIA board its suggestions regarding the use of the funds generated by the Christmas Tour. After much deliberation, the RPIA board passed a resolution directing the funds to be used to enhance Daggett Park and School. The Board also suggested that the funds be used to create a tie in with Triangle Park, therefore connecting the two parks of Ryan Place.

The committee will be working on that direction and report back on its work over the next few months.

Fairmount Historic District Hosts 34th Annual Tour of Homes

Preserving Fort Worth History, one house at a time

WHO: Fairmount Historic District, Fort Worth, Texas.

WHAT: Named by *Southern Living* as one of "The South's Best Comeback Neighborhoods," Fort Worth's Fairmount Historic District will host its 34th annual Tour of Homes. More than 1,500 visitors will gather over Mother's Day weekend to celebrate the rich architectural history of the largest historic neighborhood in the Southwest region.

This year's tour will showcase five beautifully restored historic houses, a new build, a work in progress and a bonus property. Most of the houses were originally built between 1890-1930, and characteristics include: beamed interior ceilings, colonnades, pocket doors, antique hardware, prominent wide front porches, overhanging eaves, as well as exposed rafters and beams — to name a few.

Attendees will also enjoy a neighborhood parade to kick-off the event, and those looking to grab a bite to eat during the tour can visit one of Magnolia Avenue's many popular restaurants. And as a special treat, this year will also feature a Texas historic marker dedication for one of last year's tour houses celebrating its centennial year.


WHEN: Mother's Day weekend, May 7-8, 2016 from noon-6 p.m. both days.



Timely Tips for April Gardeners from Calloway's and Cornelius

April means "to open" or "opening," in allusion to it being the season when trees and flowers begin to "open". This is the month of rebirth and hope for the future. April means Spring, so get out your gardening tools and get moving. Calloway's and Cornelius Nursery are fully stocked with all kinds of plants and products for every purpose for today's gardeners. Consider adding Native Plants such as Texas Sage, Red Yucca, and Mexican Heather to your landscape. Native plants are perfect for our Texas Summer heat better than most, require less water, require less mowing, provide habitats for birds, butterflies and other wildlife, protect the soil, and save on fertilizers and insecticides.

A successful garden begins with good soil. Organic material is important to the soil composition. It helps with drainage and increases the microbe population. Expanded shale is used to break up hard compacted clay soils. Top dress your flowerbeds and containers with organic mulches.

Hopefully you have your tomatoes, peppers, squash, and other warm season vegetables already planted; if not get them in the ground right away. To get the highest yields, make additions of fertilizer (called side dressing) every couple of weeks, starting about a month after transplanting or seeding. If your yard is too small for a traditional garden plot, try gardening in containers. The bigger the container, the better!

If you want to create a truly dynamic garden, inviting colorful guests like butterflies and hummingbirds is definitely the way to go. Butterflies like sunshine and plenty of space to fly around, so opt for a sunny, open spot. Both enjoy having some type of cover as a resting spot. Your garden can even include a water feature for butterflies and hummingbirds to play in.

St. Augustine and Bermuda lawns should be actively growing now; so it is a great time to apply fertilizer. Please consult one of our Texas Certified Nursery Professionals for the best advice for your lawn. A correctly fertilized lawn now will better help your lawn to handle the Texas Summer heat!

Mise en Place: Nha Trang Vietnamese Cuisine

(putting the local restaurant scene in [Ryan] place)

The newest restaurant on Magnolia Avenue is not new at all, but a reimagined former sushi joint. After years of competing with the trendier Shinjuku Station at the opposite end of the bustling foodie street, Temaki Sushi reopened earlier this year as Nha Trang Vietnamese Cuisine.

A variety of authentic dishes focuses on few staple proteins: pork, chicken, beef, and shrimp (vegetarian choices are rare). The single-page menu divides entrees among noodle, rice, crepe and banh mi sandwich categories. Options range from the familiar spring and egg rolls (\$4-5), potstickers (\$5) and fried rice (\$10-12) to dishes featuring more exotic ingredients like squid, mung beans, turmeric, and tapioca starch-based noodles and dumplings. A few seemingly out-of-place desserts include French macarons (\$7) and mocha—Japanese sweet rice cake—ice cream (\$5).

I tried the hu tieu mi (\$11), a well-constructed bowl of delicate egg noodles in seasoned broth with melt-in-your-mouth tender pork, plump shrimp, two perfectly soft-cooked quail eggs and crisp bean sprouts. Don't expect the vast, economic portions found at many pho joints including the recently expanded neighborhood favorite Le's Wok (812 West Rosedale Street). The Vietnamese noodle soup here elevates quality over quantity and does not disappoint!

An extensive offering of wine, beer, cocktails and other beverages fills the reverse side of the menu—a shame considering my server never took a drink order. In hindsight, I might have liked to try a hot brown rice green tea (\$3) or hot Vietnamese coffee (\$4) on that overcast, chilly, post-hailstorm morning.

Some kinks are still being worked out (the lone server did not know how to answer another patron who asked whether the kitchen had hoisin sauce, and somewhat







helplessly pointed to "this one" and "that one" on the menu when asked which dishes were most popular). But the place is eager to please the Magnolia Avenue crowd with its chic interior, softly piping Frank Sinatra, and elegant view of some established culinary gems and soon-to-open dining spots. Happy hour happens from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m., Tuesday through Thursday, when diners can enjoy 25% off appetizers, drinks and cocktails. The Thirtieth on the 30th!

Its not often that Dallas asks Fort Worth to come over to help, but for the third straight year the Dallas Heritage Village at Old City Park has asked the Ryan Place Croquet Tournament to come over to demonstrate, instruct and talk with their visitors about the game of croquet. The Dallas Heritage Village uses historic buildings, most of which were moved to Old City Park from other towns around Dallas, in order to demonstrate the history of Dallas and North Texas.



This year to "enhance the visitor experience," Ryan Place Croquet will set up our croquet wickets on Family Game Day, Saturday April 30. 
