## President's Letter

The summer is around the corner and we have an active month of May upcoming!

n May 16th, RPIA is having our general meeting. The main topic of discussion will be the Daggett Elementary School attendance zone. As some of you are aware, currently the southern end of Ryan Place is not in the Daggett Elementary School zone. After this issue was brought to our attention, RPIA discussed moving the boundary to fit the entire neighborhood into one elementary school zone with our School Board Trustees. They have discussed it with the staff and would like to make a presentation to the neighborhood. This presentation will be at our general meeting. Both trustees that represent Ryan Place, Ashely Paz and Matthew Avila, will be in attendance. Additionally, School District staff will be available to answer questions. Please plan on attending on the 16th at St. Johns!

On May 7th, the city is holding an election to amend the city charter. The City Council voted to ask the citizens of Fort Worth their opinions on many changes, but the most important changes are:

- 1. Expanding the city council by 2 seats;
- 2. Raising the salaries of the mayor and city council; and
- 3. Extending the terms of the mayor and city council from 2 years to 3 years.

If passed, these proposed changes will impact how our city is run, and could directly impact Ryan Place. Please make time to vote on the 7th. RPIA will be posting times and locations of the polling locations once they are available.

We have many projects that need volunteers. If you are interested in assisting with developing Triangle Park, helping develop an enhancement at Daggett Park, or interested in serving on an events or financing committee, please contact me. Our neighborhood is great because of the time and effort we all put into it. Also, RPIA needs a parliamentarian. If you are interested, please contact me at clovelace@lovelacekillen.com.

## **News from Our NPO**

Greetings Ryan Place! It is I, your inadvertent storm magnet of a Neighborhood Police Officer. It doesn't seem like it's been two months since the FB fiasco or just a month since Fairmount was almost stolen in the middle of the night off of the city map. Things have calmed down for the most part and we now have time to breathe and assess the goings on that found their way onto the evening news.

First, I'd like to take a minute to thank everyone who supported our department, our unit, and me at the combined neighborhoods meeting. I was humbled by the outpouring of kind words and pats on the back. As stressful as the situation was I don't think we could have gotten through it all without all of your support, patience, and understanding. What we all wanted was for me to be able to continue communicating with you all on a forum that is helpful and utilized by a couple thousand people. The outcome was more than satisfactory and with the addition of some simple guidelines we got what we ultimately wanted. Again, thank you to everyone who reached out to me personally and to all of those that attended the meeting. Your actions and words will never be forgotten.

That whole ordeal was a testament to how the gap between the police department and the community has been bridged. That success story would not have been possible without you and I'm reminded everyday of how lucky I am to be a part of what has been built here. The pieces were already put in place by you and the other amazing NPOs that were here before me. I just stepped in and continued what you all had put forth which is an outlet of communication that when utilized to its potential has become a very powerful and essential tool in my opinion. I will do my very best to continue the communication by means of every resource available. A perfect example of the communication between the neighborhood and the police department was the onslaught of vehicle burglaries committed by the BabyFaced Bandit in the month of February. Everyone did what I asked and played a part by constantly keeping me informed of what was happening. The total number of burglaries (reported and not officially reported) was upward of 70. That's an astounding number. That was a number that frustrated everyone involved. That was also a number that caught the attention of my chain of command and the chief himself.

When we looked at the hot sheet of the city it looked like a nuclear bomb went off in the middle of Fairmount. Yeah, that's a bad thing literally and figuratively. The key to putting an end to the reign of plunder was a video that captured BabyFace in the midst of one of his criminal acts. That was all it took. With that I recognized him and our entire team of NPOs put in hard work to watch him and the detectives were able to connect the dots which led to an unpleasant knock on his door and a ride to jail. His cohorts were implicated and they too were pursued until the heat became too much and they turned themselves in.

The constant communication between the neighborhoods and the police department are what led to the apprehension. This is another of many success stories that can be traced back to communication, cooperation, and teamwork. This is why I love my job. As we speak the burglaries have plummeted to an almost nonexistent level and we can take a brief sigh of relief. I say brief because as I have always told you, someone will take their place. When it does happen (and it will) I know that with the help of all of you I will be able to repeat a similar tale of success

Spring is here. Enjoy the weather before the arrival of the inevitable heat wave around the corner. I look forward to every shift and every ride around the neighborhoods. I've said this many times but you all make this easy for me. I'm lucky to be here and I'm lucky to be your NPO. Until next time. That is all. Carry on.

# From Start to Finish Remodel, Renovate, Restore, Fixer-up!

Should I use a contractor or "do-it-myself" or maybe something in-between? This month, RP neighbor and "Repeat Fixer-Upper," Kurt Nielsen provides some advice and wisdom based on experience on the "DIY" answer to this question. Kurt's grandfather was a carpenter, and based on the beautiful remodeling results I've seen, he inherited some of the craftsman's skills! *Donna Darner, RPIA Director of Historic Resource* 

I was a first time home buyer in 2008 and didn't quite know what I was getting myself into with the purchase of my first Ryan Place fixer-upper. My do-it-yourself attitude started with my mess of a kitchen, a YouTube video, and a "how-to" book. Eight years later, I am in my second fixer-upper just a few streets over, and even deeper in household projects.

The most important thing I learned over years of renovation frustration was to just get started. A lot of people prefer to start any project with a detailed plan but that just isn't the way renovating an old house works—not in my experience anyway. Luckily I have a lack of planning style, but so many times I was left with half-finished projects, too many pieces of hardware lying around, and more frustration. Did I mention unfinished projects?

Before I even think about how to tackle any project, I first make myself focus on just ONE thing, do some research, and just wing it. You have to have confidence in whatever project you are doing. If you mess up, so what? You can fix it and learn along the way.

The biggest project I attempted in both of my homes was a kitchen re-do. I had no idea how to build cabinets, let alone cabinets that actually looked good. I learned how to rewire a lamp on YouTube so surely they could teach me how to build cabinets right? Turns out, they actually could. My second set of cabinets was a little better than the first, and now that I have redone two kitchens, I have been able to help a neighbor redo theirs. I am a perfectionist to a fault sometimes, and this was the perfect way for me to get the results I wanted knowing that no corners were cut.

If someone were to ask for advice on do-it-yourself projects, here are my six tips:

- Pick one thing at a time (I have a few 75% finished projects so I should probably start living by the words I speak).
- Know that you will probably mess up at least once.
- Don't focus on the flaws; the only reason you notice them is because you created them. This is what makes your project a handmade piece of art.
- Have confidence but know your limits. I feel comfortable doing anything with wood, but won't touch plumbing.
- Focus on the end results and have fun.
- Know the quickest route to Home Depot (this one is very important).

This is no step-by-step instructional article by any means, but my goal is to encourage people not to plan too much. You never know what you are going to find behind our old walls or beneath the ugly flooring. You have to dig in, be flexible, and be ready for a challenge knowing at the end, it is going to turn out great and have a story to go along with it.



## A Legacy of Family: 2016 Candlelight Home Tour in Ryan Place

This neighborhood was developed by the Ryan family for families. Even streets were named after family members...Ryan Place Drive, Willing, Elizabeth etc. It was built by, and for, some of Fort Worth's most prominent families of the time. Families of cattlemen, bankers, lawyers and merchants. Folks who valued what they found here and wanted to be a part of the emerging story. 
