



Mise en Place: Bentley's

(putting the local restaurant scene in [Ryan] place)

The three Cs of the neighborhood's newest restaurant seem an unlikely combination: coffee, crepes and craft hot dogs. The quality of each leg of this tripod props up the concept of family-owned and - operated Bentley's, finally open on the far west end of West Magnolia Avenue.

Breakfast starts when doors open at 6:30 a.m., Monday through Saturday (the place is closed Sundays). Bentley's serves Cuppa Craft hot and cold brew coffee (from \$3.25 to \$4.5). Savory offerings include the Original Breakfast (\$6): one large, wafer-thin crepe stuffed with a satisfying mixture of eggs, sausage and cheddar cheese. Countering the richness is a sweet side of maple or bourbon syrup. Also on the breakfast menu, the Fairmount (\$5), features crema topped with seasonal fruit and powdered sugar.

Bentley's adds all-beef "farm dogs" to its rotation for lunch and dinner until 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday and until 10 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays. The Bentley (\$7) comes on pretzel bun with grilled onions and pickled jalapeñs. A cool shmear of jalapeñ cream cheese nicely sets off the heat. The Pork-Worth (\$8) includes a generous portion of pulled pork, red cabbage, fried onion strings, BBQ sauce and mustard on a "honey'd" bun.

Round out any meal with an order of skinny, tender-crisp seasoned fries (\$4). For \$1 extra, get them topped with buffalo sauce and bleu cheese or tossed in a popular combination of garlic and parmesan. Other options include dogs inspired by Tex-Mex, Vietnamese ("Bent Mi" is Bently's take on a bahn mi sandwich), and Italian cuisines and a savory crepe with meatballs. Several sweet crepe desserts also grace the menu.

The one vegetarian entré, the Billy crepe (\$6), combines spinach and mushrooms with goat cheese and a balsamic glaze. Most of the menu can accommodate vegetarians and gluten-free diners. Substitute marinated mushrooms or grilled eggplant for a hot dog or pile any crepe/dog toppings on a baked potato.

The restaurant's hipster atmosphere blends well with the neighborhood. Dine while standing along the interior wall, watch a worker cook up a large stack of delicate crepes or chat with the owner about the Hopdoddy-inspired French fries. Outside, where seating is not quite so limited, a canopy offers shade and a chalk wall offers diversion for kids and creatives alike.



Good Neighbors Animal Rescue

is your neighborhood animal rescue.

We have been very busy with dogs lately as well as all the kittens and cats. *Our next dog adoption will be our 50th dog adoption!* At present we have 15 dogs available for adoption. We also have several dogs that we are helping the owners with vet bills, vaccines and heartworm prevention. Several of our dogs are owner surrenders, but the majority are strays found in Ryan Place or Fairmount neighborhoods.

We do our best to help neighbors who find dogs on the street foster them with our support. Our goal is to keep neighborhood animals and strays out of the shelters. **Ryan Places** is lucky to have its own **microchip scanner** that neighbors donated to buy. It currently is with a GNAR volunteer, **Kris Savage**, Call or text 817-507-6742. **Fairmount** also has a scanner that resides with **Maureen Harris**, 682-597-496.

GNAR has a found dog protocol that we follow to help reunite owners with their lost dogs. We provide any immediate vet attention and flea/tick medication as needed. Unfortunately, some owners are not found and these dogs then get vaccines, heartworm test and prevention, spay/neuter, and microchip if needed. The services we provide exceed our \$120 adoption fee thus we still heavily rely on donations.

Many of our dogs get adopted within a couple of weeks but we do have some long term fosters. We have a small network of regular fosters but we are always looking for more dog fosters. All of our dogs are in foster homes as we do not have a shelter. One benefit of this is we get to know our dogs to help find the best fit when adopting.

Donations can be sent to the same address via paypal. You can also help by sharing our adoptable dogs from our Facebook page or website.

If you have a dog, please make sure it is microchipped and has a dog identification tag for quick return of your loved one. Sometimes neighbors are more likely to pick up a dog with tags than without. Also please make sure your dog is on heartworm preventative. You can get your dog tested for heartworms at TCAP (Texas Coalition for Animal Protection) for \$20 and purchase inexpensive heartworm preventative there.

A HOUSE AND ITS PEOPLE

When newcomers David and Laurie Mikitka bought their 5th Avenue residence this year, they inherited a 1926 John C. Ryan Land Company newspaper ad featuring a drawing of their Greek Revival house, built for Albert Venting, a professor of religion at Southwestern Baptist Seminary. Venting, a holder of a plethora of degrees from six colleges, was well-known in Fort Worth and North Texas Baptist circles since he also was a church pastor, violinist, and hymnologist. Albert Venting's childhood is a story of losses. He was the only child of Count Sobieski, a Polish government representative, and an American artist. His mother died when Albert was born in 1883 in Nebraska, and his father placed him with friends two years later but died when Albert was five. Albert did not know of his true parentage until age 12, when his foster mother died. His foster father, a professional violinist, envisioned an orchestral career for Albert and objected to Albert's growing interest in philosophy and religion. Richard

While at his first Texas pastorate in Cleburne, Albert met his future wife, Ollie Lou Brown, and they married in 1911. When the couple moved to Ryan Place, they had no living children, but in 1928 Albert, Jr. was born. Six years later the family moved back to Cleburne where their son died in 1940 from pneumonia. The Ventings eventually returned to Ryan Place to live with relatives on Elizabeth Boulevard. After Dr. Venting ended his 30-year career at Southwestern Baptist Seminary, he

provided for his college education including Mansfield

College in Oxford and Harley College in London, where


adopted the rejected Albert at age 14 in 1897 and

Albert worked in the slums for three years.

commuted to Baylor University in the 1950s to establish the sacred music program and remained on Baylor's faculty until his 1965 death.

With the Great Depression, rentals and boarding house conversions began appearing in Ryan Place, and the Ventings rented the 5th Avenue property for two years to Edna (Keane) and Andrew Helgert, the chief accountant for the Swift packing plant in the Stockyards.



The home's next renters were the Carveys, who lived on 5th Avenue for nine years. Thomas Carvevich and his brother were emigres from the Austrian Empire (Dalmatian Coast of Yugoslavia) in the 1890s. They changed their name to Carvey and worked their way up the ladder to management at private clubs. Both became great favorites of Amon Carter. Thomas was the popular long-term manager of the Fort Worth Club, and his wife Florence Haney, the daughter of his mentor, was an active clubwoman. Their daughter Mary Jane graduated from Paschal High School, and their son Tom, Jr. received his B. S. from Stanford University during the family's years in Ryan Place. Tom Jr. served during WWII in the Navy's Bureau of Aeronautics and designed experimental turbo jet engines (he later became vice president of the space missile division of Hughes Aviation).

In 1946 the large demand for housing for returning soldiers and their growing families prompted the sale of the Ventings' 5th Avenue property. Since then, the home has been owned by a succession of long-term homeowners with one interesting exception. In August, 1973, the property changed hands three times in 32 days. World



events may have influenced this unusual property turn over: the bombing of Cambodia ceased, President Nixon was implicated in the Watergate Scandal, and the world was just one month away from a major oil crisis.

Today, Dave and Laurie Piz Mikatka respect the historic nature of their Greek Revival house and its rear original building but are making them more functional without changing their basic characters. The rear building serves as a studio for David and a guest apartment for their adult paternal twin sons who live in Austin. David inherited his Russian grandfather Mikatka's furniture-finishing tools and has built much of the family furniture and is handling the renovations himself. Laurie makes quilts and curtains and has a good eye for color choices in the home's decor. David's creativity extends to figurative sculpture, drawings, wood art, and building unique fountains. He has participated in art shows including the Texas Artists Coalition, and his sculptures are at the Rebecca Low Gallery. All this, yet the retired Air Force dentist still practices dentistry too.

Laurie and Dave met at the University of Arizona in Tucson. After Dave completed his dentistry degree in Southern California, he joined the Air Force, and the family lived in Fairbanks, Alaska, Oklahoma City, Wichita Falls, and San Antonio. They have been in the Fort Worth area for 13 years. Because of transfers with the military, they have lived in "subdivision land," as Dave calls it, but longed for a friendly neighborhood with a historic character. At their tenth place, they are putting down roots.

37th Annual Ryan Place Labor Day Garage Sale Week-End

Neil Daniel once said my most enduring contribution to the history of Ryan Place will be the Labor Day Garage Sale Week-end. As with all Ryan Place traditions, there is always more than just one person responsible. The first neighborhood wide sale came about because some of the street directors were tired of seeing garage sale signs all over the neighborhood every week-end. I just suggested we control the visual litter by having all the sales on the one week-end. I don't know how many addresses were in that first Star-Telegram classified ad, but by the third year we were up to 33.

The garage sale week-end fit into my theory of letting others do most of the work. It allowed the RPIA to skim off a little profit by charging for the newspaper ad and have all the real work done by each resident. In 1981, my administrative assistant didn't speak so highly of my idea since the newsletter announcement of the sale gave our office phone number. While answering calls for information and taking addresses for the newspaper ad, we talked to twice as many people as those who paid the \$5 toward the ad.


Just as North Texas has summer time "pop-up" rain showers, the Garage Sale Week-end has "pop-up" yard sales and lemonade stands. For many years our entire neighborhood has looked like Elizabeth Blvd. on Halloween night. 
