A 1954 Christmas Pilgrimage in Ryan Place


In 1954, Goldie (Tripplehorn) Brooks organized a Christmas tour of three Ryan Place homes to raise funds for the Garden Department of the Woman's Club of Fort Worth on Pennsylvania Avenue. The pilgrimage included two distinctive Wiley G. Clarkson-designed houses at 1216 Elizabeth and 2517 Ryan Place Drive and a midcentury modern house at 2312 Ryan Place Drive. Docents from the neighborhood and the Woman's Club of Fort Worth were recruited by Goldie Brooks; among them was a close friend, clubwoman, and creative whiz Willie Ruth Jagoda, the fourth owner of the Fifth Avenue home on the 2017 Candlelight Christmas in Ryan Place tour. The 1954 tour homes were decorated for Christmas using the latest trends but with an elegant twist.

The accomplished Goldie Brooks attended the Chicago School of Design and was a professor of interior design at Stephens College for women before her marriage to tax attorney A. Edwin Brooks. The theme she chose was "A Children's Christmas" inspired by her two young daughters. At the front door of the family's Georgian Revival Home on Elizabeth Boulevard, guests were greeted by a large Santa Claus. In the entry hall, the children's sugar plum Christmas tree was spray-painted gold and decorated with popcorn balls and fairies made from the new material Styrofoam. Snowmen and a miniature Santa Claus figurine and mounted wise men made in Mexico were arranged at a child's eye level. The central rooms downstairs were decorated in pink and cyclamen, colors made popular in the 1950s by the president's wife Mamie Eisenhower. Antiques must have been scattered throughout the home since Goldie Brooks gave a talk entitled "Antiques Go with Everything."

The Tudor Revival home at 2517 Ryan Place Drive was originally the residence of the Wiley G. Clarkson family. Adeline (Parnell) and her attorney husband Ercel G. Aycock were proud of the family's lineage which traced back to an American patriot who fought in the Revolutionary War. Eighteenth Century antique furnishings complimented the English-inspired home. The entry hall, living room, and dining rooms were filled with pink roses and carnations and gold-sprayed magnolia leaves and holly. The fireplace was the focal point of a religious vignette with a Madonna painting hung above the mantel, on which boys choir figures rested. On the piano were white angel figurines. Traditional Christmas green decorations decked the kitchen and breakfast room. The family had three older sons.

The home at 2312 Ryan Place Drive of Naomi (Sweeney) Reed and Thomas J. Reed, president of the Braggs-Weaver Machinery Company, was built around 1949. Unusual jeweled ornaments in Williamsburg Blue hung on a small unsheared Christmas tree set on the piano. Native trees again were available after the war and rationing ended, and they were more popular in 1954 than the aluminum tree with a color wheel light introduced in 1950. Mrs. Reed's color selection from the American Colonial period was part of a wave of nostalgia for the founding of the country. Maple furniture, fireplace bellows and other decorative items not useful to mid-century folks helped them feel a connection to these earlier idealized days.




Halloween Data Analysis


Another year's worth of Trick-Or-Treat data was collected on South Adams. The following graphs show the results of our thorough and pain staking effort to make sense of what happens around us on Halloween Night. An effort that some would say was a total waste of time. But what have we got but time.

Noticed this year people who had moved away from Ryan Place came back, some with their children to experience one of the things that make Ryan Place a special place!


The quarter-hour-by-quarter-hour graph shows the impact of the unsettled weather in the early hour of trick or treating. Also unusual was the lack of two peaks on this graph. Over the years this graph has had two distinct peaks. This year only one.



The total number of participants on South Adams was slightly down from last year continuing the trend of the previous four years. The average for the 2001-2017 is 529. We think we know why. This year the neighborhood had more decorations, more houses with welcoming porch lights all leading to spreading the total number of Trick-Or-Treaters around to more and more houses.
