





CELEBRATE FAMILY AS YOU CELEBRATE THE SEASON

The holidays are a time for family, and hopefully all of our Ryan Place neighbors are experiencing the joys of togetherness and love with our families of origin or our chosen families this season. We all know that the best stories about families balance celebrations of those joys with representations of the more complicated aspects of family life.

Here are a few books from my recent reads that feature complicated families who still manage to appreciate each other's unique qualities and share love with one another.

Once Upon a River, by Diane Setterfield. *Once Upon a River* is a story about stories, and the power they have over families. It's also a story about a possibly magical river, and a possibly ghostly girl who is saved from the river one winter night, and immediately claimed by three families along the river's bank, all of whom are desperate to regain a lost family member and make themselves whole. If you like stories that alternate among perspectives and make you question your sympathies, while also featuring lots of truly good and empathetic characters, and you have some time to set aside, check out this long, meandering, heartwarming family tale.

The Best We Could Do , by Thi Bui. I have become a major fan of graphic memoirs in the past few years, and this is one of the best I've read. Bui narrates her family's immigration story, beginning in Vietnam in the 1940s, and ending with the birth of her own child in the United States. Bui's family is loving but complicated, and their story emerges in memories that at first may seem disjointed, but connect through Bui's detailed research and determination to understand her own past. You might end up wanting to get prints of some of this book's beautiful illustrations for your own family's house.

Inheritance, by Dani Shapiro. If you're in a book club, you've probably at least seen Dani Shapiro's superpopular latest memoir, Inheritance. The premise is perfectly twenty-first century: after taking an internet DNA text, Shapiro discovers that she is not biologically related to her beloved father—in fact, she learns through a very speedy and effective research process, her biological father was a medical student who donated sperm at a fertility clinic her parents used to aid her conception. The book chronicles not only Shapiro's coming to terms with this new understanding of her paternity, but also her efforts to connect with her newly-discovered biological family, who ultimately chart for readers an inspiring course for dealing with non-traditional family relationships.

Maybe it's our age or maybe a sudden realization of their importance or just a result of our recent week-end's activity, but I have been thinking about the importance of friends. We have spent the last several weekends visiting with friends we have known for years:

Private E-1 **Dennis** from Illinois and I met at Fort Polk, Louisiana during the summer of 1968. We were in the same Basic Training Company. He had been drafted after college while working at a small town bank west of Chicago. After basic training, Dennis' wife, Cindy, joined him at Fort Polk, and on one of her first days there her car was broken into and all her clothing was stolen. We helped her with clothing and lodging. And they became our friends for life!

After a year in Viet Nam, Dennis returned to the bank that had saved him his job and he retired as Bank President after 45 years. When I wanted to buy an old MG Roadster Convertible Dennis was my "lender of last resort." I had a red 1980 MGB

when we moved to Ryan Place in 1976.

George & Becki became our friends in the 1990s through shared interests in history of the built environment and modern art. They have retired to a "ranch" near Blanco, TX. This month we joined them for a gala benefiting the Old Blanco courthouse. They lived for several years above their three-car garage while planning their new home (with a three-car garage). We lived for several years above our two-car garage before doubling the size of the Thomas Guest House.

This week we are planning a dinner with two teachers who taught our daughters at Daggett Elementary in the 1980's. We are still grateful for their skills and efforts.

I had been led to believe that in 1944-45 **John** & I were both in the "Cradle Roll" class Sunday mornings at our church. But actually John is a year older and if he and I were in the same class it meant he had to repeat a year with us infants. If so, it was his last set back until he lost his judgeship in the

Republican Party sweep of 1994.

I also was thinking about other friends from the 1950s: **Rick**, **Walter**, and **David** when I realized they were all part of Boy Scout Troop 41. Rick taught me how to "trench" our tent and was my Best Man at our wedding in 1966.

During Boy Scout summer camp at Tyler State Park, the three of them did their best to help me pass swimming so I could gain the rank of First Class. Walter and I listened to the latest rock & roll record on his Dad's Hi-Fi Stereo System. After high school graduation, Walter and I mowed lawns in order to buy the appropriate clothing for college, usually from Clyde Campbell's University Shop in downtown Fort Worth.

Our goal was to dress more like the Kingston Trio. And that doesn't even include any of our Ryan Place friends.





'Tis the season, Ryan Place! The 35th Anniversary of the Candlelight Christmas in Ryan Place takes place on Saturday, December 7th from noon to 9 p.m. and Sunday, December 8th from noon to 5 p.m. **The Parham home**, at 2516 Ryan Place Drive, is a two-story

The Parham home, at 2516 Ryan Place Drive,

neoclassical designed by Wiley G. Clarkson. Clarkson, a celebrated builder for the time whose media were stone, mortar and wood, built this residence in 1922. And if you really want to take a stroll back in time, you won't want to miss **the Shipley home**, at 1030



The Shipley home, at 1030 Elizabeth Boulevard,

Elizabeth Boulevard. This is a large two-story house built in 1916 with a rectangular plan and a glazed green-tiled hip roof. And looks can be deceiving!

Over a century old, **the West home**, (pictured at right) and located at 2530 5th Avenue, has had a few modifications, keeping her in the 21st century. The home's exterior looks as good as when it was built in 1915, but the interior reflects a contemporary vision. It has an open floorplan for entertaining and displaying a collection of Fort Worth artists that can be seen throughout the house.

The Lane Home, at 1107 Elizabeth, is a two-story brick house built in 1919. The current homeowners purchased in 2014 and have remodeled stages each year mixing modern with antique details.

The Wells home, (below) at 2424 College Avenue, is a Georgian Revival Style home built in 2006. It is a fantastic blend of historical touches and modern conveniences. Among the home's features are an imperial staircase, beautiful chandeliers, and gourmet kitchen.

South Adams Trick or Treaters


These are the results of the Umpteenth Trick-Or-Treat data collection on South Adams. This year we enlisted life-long friends who recently moved to Texas to experience one of the special events in Ryan Place.

Joanne is a CPA so we assigned her the most serious jobs of counting the T-O-T's in quarter hour segments. Jim, the Human Resources expert consultant, made certain that no one was illegally characterized in a way that would delay their success in later life.

This year the total number of participants (461) rebounded to look more like the 24-year average of 507.

The total number of participants on South Adams was impacted by several factors:

1. Rain showers most of the day fed a pent-up



demand to leave the house and do something fun.

- 2. Unfortunately the cold front that set off the day's rain led to a chilly north wind.

So in order to help us make those determinations, this year we present three pie charts summarizing the costume data:




