Southside Infrastructure Improvements Started

Fort Worth Water's plans to install new water and sewer lines and pave streets on the south side of Fort Worth have started. This impacts Council District 9 and customers in several neighborhoods, including Ryan Place.

The area is part of the 2018 bond program. Transportation and Public Works is repaying the streets and installing curbs and gutters throughout the project. Fort Worth Water partnered with TPW to replace water and sewer lines, in conjunction with the bond project, in order to avoid Fort Worth Water coming back into the area at a later date. There is also a coordinated effort with ATMOS Energy to validate and verify line locations.

Ryan Place and Rosemont residents who live on Willing between West Cantey (at the north end) and West Devitt (at the south end) should take note: TPW [Transportation and Public Works] will be narrowing the street from the existing 38 feet to 34 feet in order to protect the trees. This standard for neighborhoods is 28 feet.

Stormwater drains will not be affected in this project, but new curbs and gutters will help alleviate issues with water flow.

New streets will be replaced with the same materials as exist now. Asphalt will be asphalt, concrete will be concrete. New driveway approaches will be constructed in the city right-of-way. The contractor will talk to the property owner prior to doing the drives for both single and double approaches.

Citizens will be alerted to pending construction of the water and sewer lines, as well as paving, via 7-day door hangers and 1-day (tomorrow) door hangers.

Affected streets include Curzon Ave. (water/paving); Gorden Ave. (water/sewer/paving Cleburne Rd. to W. Biddison and water/paving from W. Biddison to W. Butler); Willing Ave. (water/sewer/paving); Irwin St. (water/paving); W. Magnolia Ave. (water/paving); James Ave. (water/sewer/paving); Hemphill St. (water/sewer/paving); W. Waggoman St. (water/paving); and Livingston



Ave. (water/paving). Project also includes curb replacements, etc. which may be needed and are within 1/4 mile of a school. Completion is projected to be sometime in the following year, 2021.



A NEW YEAR – SAME NEIGHBORHOOD

Same Neighborhood or, is it?

Sometimes incremental change is difficult to recognize. It is only when it is highlighted that our attention becomes more focused. We have been in Ryan Place for 44 years. We weren't the first of a wave of new owners to join the few remaining original Ryan Place residents, but maybe the second or third.

Our parents didn't quite understand why we would want to live in a 50-year-old house without central air conditioning, but with a 500 gallon tank of fuel oil buried in the backyard. Our change of address was a highlight to our parents that we were going to abandon the suburbs and move into the inner city. A move that to them at first seemed foolish and maybe even dangerous.

Another recent highlight was the May 2019 change to Section 30-1 of Chapter 30, "Streets and Sidewalks" of the Fort Worth City Code. It brought attention to a concern to some that suddenly Ryan Place property owners would be required to repair/replace sidewalks which were deemed defective, unsafe or hazardous and declared a nuisance by the City Of Fort Worth.

The responsibility of a property owner developing property shall construct sidewalks (parkways, driveways, curbs, and gutters) to the City's predetermined standard has been "long-standing city policy which was in the 1986 Transportation Manual". That was the major change of the May 2019 ordinance.

The requirement that the property owner maintain "defective" sidewalks has been in the Fort Worth City Code since 1964 and was not changed by the ordinance revision of May 2019.

After a conversation with a representative of the

Transportation/Public Works department, I learned that there currently are no plans to change the enforcement of the ordinance requiring property owners to maintain defective sidewalks adjacent to their property.

Is it the same neighborhood?

Yes and No. The housing stock is 50 years older, as are the second or third wave of "new" owners! There are younger parents with young children who are continuing the support of our local schools. There are new neighborhood residents that continue to defend the neighborhood at Zoning and City Council meetings. There are fresh ideas for making Ryan Place a better place to live.

Same neighborhood, or is it?



CULTURE CORNER

Happy 2020, neighbors! This year, I'd like to switch things up and bring in some new voices. I'll be asking community members whose work intersects with their reading lives about books they'd recommend to their neighbors.

This month, I spoke with Leann Maxwell, a Near Southside academic and life coach helping her clients navigate life's transitions. Below are a few books that she has found meaningful.

Wolfpack, by Abby Wambach: Leann appreciates how this book on leadership combines the unusual perspective of retired women's soccer star Wambach with themes that are universal. It's also easy to consume, with points and action items clearly laid out in each chapter. (I listened to this book on her recommendation and can add that it's great on audio!)

Mindset: The New Psychology of Success, by Carol S. Dweck: Holding up a seriously annotated copy, Leann told me that she uses this book all the time in her work and in her own life. Dweck explains the difference between a fixed and a growth mindset, and gives advice for developing a growth mindset—one that sees failure and setbacks as part of the learning process—in areas of our lives where we want to see change happen.

Dear Girls, by Ali Wong: "Just a really fun book to read." Ali Wong is a comedian writing this book to her daughters (although Leann emphasized that this is for adults only!). Wong writes about successes and failures and doubt and love and parenting, and as Leann says, hearing someone's unique perspective on these common experiences is always interesting. Her biggest takeaway is a lesson for us all: "After reading this book, I won't turn my nose up at what I deem 'weird food'!"

AROUND RYAN PLACE...

America's Fastest-Growing Cities

Forbes magazine recently looked at growth of population, employment, wages and economic output to create their list of America's fastest growing cities. They also used home price growth as a proxy for wealth. Forbes shows us the 25 metropolitan areas (including metropolitan divisions) across the country experiencing the biggest overall surges, plus the growth rates and projections that got them on the list.

Number one is Boise City, Idaho, with a population growth in 2017-2018 of 3.08%. Also in the top five was Dallas-Plano-Irving area coming in at number three; but Ryan Place residents should be proud, appreciative and concerned about the fifth fastest growing city in the USA:

Good ol' Fort Worth, Texas.

Home prices, population and job growth – not to mention the sunbelt climate North Texas enjoys - solidified our place in their top five.

Other sources back this up. As of August 21, 2019, and according to CityLab.com Their criteria includes the basics of population and job growth, college graduates, growth of the creative class and, in their series about all this, something they

termed: inequality coupled with the new urban crisis (?). what we want our growth pattern to look like. How do we best

Whatever criteria is used, Fort Worth is consistently in the top 5-10 of population growth (typically we're third), job market growth, growth of college-educated adults (again third), and rate of growth in the creative/techie class (2nd only to Miami[!?]).

What will this growth begin to look like in Fort Worth in this, the 21st Century? What will it look like in and around RYAN PLACE?

We are already seeing and feeling its effects. Zoning request changes, new construction of multitudinous high density apartment complexes, plans to increase population density in heretofore low-density residential neighborhoods (Paschal Neighborhood as well as our own have been dealing with these issues), increased traffic flow and its concomitant problems.

These actual changes and request for change are just beginning. We must adapt and grow – but especially in our thinking.

Growth is healthy, desirable and beneficial...as long as it is managed properly. Physicians and those concerned with healthy outcomes have long described uncontrolled growth as a cancer. Ryan Place residents need to seriously consider

what we want our growth pattern to look like. How do we best manage our city's growth to keep our neighborhoods healthy, vibrant and desirable places to live, work and go to school? Growth and its benefits don't happen in a vacuum.

Since TCU won the Rose Bowl and the recession of 2008-2012, Fort Worth and Ryan Place have been blessed with many opportunities.

Growth should not surprise us.

Decisions made in the heat and passion of a moment often bring unintended consequences. Planning, review and revisions to those plans need to be the norm. It's what our board meetings and consultations with our surrounding neighborhoods are all about.

Help us; help yourselves with well regulated growth – participate in the activities and governance of Ryan Place. We are one of the best (and healthiest) neighborhoods in the city.

Let's keep it that way.

February. That little month of the year where we find the gardeners among us staring out the window at the dead spots, asking "Is there anything I can do with this mess?"

If you are one of those types and smart enough to direct that question to a master gardener, you'll not only get a resounding yes for an answer, but also a three-word directive: prune, prep, plant. That's shorthand for prune your roses, prep your dirt, and plant a vegetable. Preferably, one you'll actually eat. (If you are wondering what grows well here, you'll find a handy list, complete with planting dates, at <u>aggie-horticulture.tamu.edu</u>, the quintessential website for all your gardening questions.)

I, on the other hand, being the sort of haphazard dirt dabbler who neither listens to answers nor masters anything, prefer my own three-

Proposed new development: La Paloma/The Lex at 2260 Hemphill St. – Project Summary

Saigebrook Development and O-SDA Industries are partnering for the project. It is a Texas-owned firm, specializing in 'owned complexes' with a time horizon of 15+ years, onsite management and they consider themselves a green builder.

It is the same company that is building a senior living of 88 units, the Overly Project, and Sunset at Fash 66 units, and the Cielo Place, inclusive of repurposing a former Baptist church into the complex.

Project on Hemphill

This project consists of 72 units at 2260 Hemphill across from Daggett Montessori (La Paloma/The Lex, named to be determined). The property is currently zoned E. It would

need to be rezoned [requiring support from neighborhoods and Hemphill Corridor Task Force (HCTF)]

Apartment sizes are planned to be:

1 bed 650 sq. ft. (21 units) 2 bed 850 sq. ft. (36 units) 3 bed 1050 sq. ft. (15 units)

The development is a Work Force housing project, with tenants background checked and they must meet income criteria. Tenants must earn 2.5 times the monthly rent. Monthly rent credit apply at 30%, 50%, 60% of average medium income of \$72K/annually.

Saigebrook is competing for Texas federal tax credit of 9%, which tax credit will be traded for cash per equity partner. Even if approved by neighborhoods, Saigebrook may not secure the tax credit and be beaten out by other projects competing in the North Texas area.

Most units are 3 stories high (facing Hemphill Street), exterior façade and exterior design to be decided later after approval of project concept and securing tax credit. Saigebrook is familiar with Near Southside standards and willing to work with the neighborhoods on façade. In addition, Saigebrook has confirmed it is knowledgeable of Near Southside Building Standards and would abide by them.

Saigebrook is taking comments and ideas for improvement and seeking working partnership with neighborhoods. The builder needs letters of 'initial support' to move forward, not necessaily complete approval, but seeks initial letters of intent to support its position.





