

City Council and FWISD Redistricting




Every ten years, after the results from the United States Census are made available, both the City of Fort Worth and Fort Worth ISD redraw council and trustee districts. So this being 2022, the redistricting procedures for both entities are complete or underway.

The Trustees for FWISD approved a new district map at their meeting in January. This map was the result of their Redistricting Committee's work in the Fall and early Winter. RPIA participated in this process by indicating to the Redistricting Committee and to the FWISD Trustees that Ryan Place would like to remain included in a district with our surrounding neighborhoods. Despite a proposal to divide Ryan Place from Fairmount, the Trustees passed new districts that placed the neighborhoods together in one district, pursuant to RPIA's request. Unfortunately, a few blocks in southern Ryan Place remain in a different trustee district. RPIA will work to create uniformity for Ryan Place.

The Clty of Fort Worth's redistricting process is still ongoing. Their process is more complicated because, purusuant to a City Charter amendment, the City is expanding the City Council from eight Council members to ten. Their Redistricting Committee proposed new council districts and now the City Council will become involved in the process. RPIA expressed to the Redistricting Committee and to the City Council that it desires to remain in a district with our neighboring communities. RPIA was successful in its request, as the map proposed by the Redistricting Committee includes Ryan Place in a district with the surrounding communities. The new proposed district also includes communities to the west and south of Ryan Place.

RPIA will remain involved in the City's redistricting process. If you have any questions or would like to participate in this process, let me know!

LIGHTS, CAMERAS, ACTION! 2022 SAFETY AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

Having lived in Ryan Place for over four years now, my family and I have come to love it even more than we hoped. We all know how special our neighborhood is, and that it's truly a one-ofa-kind place that you can't find elsewhere these days. When I volunteered for the Director of Public Safety position on the RPIA Board, I wasn't sure there was a whole lot that could really be done about improving neighborhood safety. As a husband and father of three boys, raising a family in Ryan Place is truly a privilege, but I felt there could potentially be ways to improve some of the challenges that we face, both geographically and from a lack of City resources. As I learned more, I realized that these challenges are indeed difficult, and I began asking neighbors for their thoughts on improving neighborhood safety and what we could do as residents to help. Ryan Place resident Red Sanders and I had several conference calls and meetings with FWPD, our NPO Officer Garner, as well as City council members and staff about these issues. The feedback from FWPD was consistent: put lights on your house, put cameras on your house, and if you see something suspicious, call it

Taking that feedback into consideration, I assembled a committee of around a dozen RP residents who were enthusiastic about collaborating on ideas and initiatives to further neighborhood safety. After several meetings and brainstorming sessions, we decided that the first initiative would be to create a safety awareness campaign called "Lights, Cameras, Action!", which is aimed at promoting those exact efforts that FWPD recommended. While we didn't get terribly creative with the campaign name, we felt that raising awareness on the nose was appropriate, in hopes that it just might help remind a neighbor to decide to put up lights, install cameras, or go ahead and call the police if they witness suspicious activity.

The campaign will focus on promoting one action item each month. Beginning in March, we'll have yard signs throughout the neighborhood promoting "Lights" and will roll out recommendations (in the newsletter and Facebook group) for lighting options to brighten up your residences at night. In April we'll promote "Cameras", and in May we'll promote "Action", largely in the same manner.

A second initiative that the Safety Committee is promoting is to explore the possibility of the RPIA applying for CCPD grant funds from the City to have high-tech, license plate reader cameras installed in various locations in the public right-ofway. The cameras are made by a company called Flock Safety (www.flocksafety.com), and are used throughout the U.S. These cameras send instant "real-time" alerts to FWPD if a stolen vehicle or wanted vehicle (with warrants) travels through Ryan Place. FWPD has numerous Flock cameras throughout the City that are all managed at the FWPD Real-Time Crime Center Headquarters, which is led by Sargent Dalton Webb. At the November RPIA meeting, Sargent Webb told several stories about criminals who were apprehended as a result of this camera technology, which is quite impressive. The Security Committee feels that having these cameras will not only benefit Ryan Place as a neighborhood, but will also benefit the safety of the entire City as a whole.

The RPIA Board has yet to discuss the matter formally and no vote has been taken yet to move forward on the Flock Camera initiative. Your input is welcome and encouraged.

To kickoff these initiatives, the Safety Committee invites you to join us on Saturday, February 12, from 2-5 p.m. at a Ryan Place residence "to be determined", for some free beverages (alcoholic and non-alcoholic), free snacks, and free tunes from Safety Committee member DJ Brian Holland himself. We'll post the location on the RPIA Facebook group page once confirmed. At the kickoff event, you can pick up a yard sign, do the Safety Dance (it will be played), and learn more about the Flock Safety opportunity and how you can help make Ryan Place as safe as it can be. RPIA Opposes Wingstop Relocation

Ryan Place has always defended itself against intense and incompatible encroachment.

In late March we learned the owners of the Wingstop on 8th Ave. had purchased the three vacant lots on Stanley Ave. at the corner of W. Bowie Street. The corner lot is zoned Neighborhood Commercial and the other two lots are zoned Single Family Residential. The proposed fast food restaurant would require a zoning change for the two Residential lots.

Our April 29, 2021 the RPIA meeting was conducted via Zoom due to Covid, and the Wingstop representative appeared and briefly described their goals. We informed him we would review their packet and get back with them.

On May 11, we met in-person with the representative, and every aspect of the situation was discussed. We stated we would oppose a fast food restaurant in that location due to all of the unavoidable negative impacts it would force upon the neighborhood - especially to the immediate area - which is already clobbered by excess traffic and noise. It was made abundantly clear that in pursuing the zoning change they would be met with strong and organized opposition from the RPIA. The meeting was smooth and businesslike and we hoped they would listen and reconsider.

Why did we oppose it so vehemently? Well, just imagine - a fast food restaurant that is v-e-r-y busy - open late at night, with most of its business taking place late in the day and nothing to prevent them from operating 24/7. Now place it at one of the most dangerous and congested intersections bounding our neighborhood. Creating increased cut through traffic, noise,

disturbances, lighting, odors, etc. And most importantly - all this would be right next to homes. It's not hard to see why the neighbors in the area were less than thrilled.

They continued on nevertheless. Over the following weeks they offered some changes, but there was no way around the simple fact that a high volume fast food restaurant is simply an incompatible use for that location. Even the City told them their case needed some work.

As the Zoning Commission hearing date neared, an opposition petition was created, and over a two-day period 34 signatures were gathered from the properties within 500 feet of the proposed change. Everyone who was contacted on Stanley, James, and 8th Ave. signed it - even the two business owners across the street from the proposed change. The petition and several opposition letters were submitted to the Zoning Commission.

On November 10, 2021 we spoke in opposition at the Zoning Hearing, and the Commission decided by a unanimous vote to deny the application.

Then on December 14 at the Fort Worth City Council meeting, our City Council decided to uphold the Zoning Commission's decision - also by a unanimous vote.

We have always fought against encroachment into the neighborhood. Yet at the same time, we have always had a willingness to work with developers to allow compatible uses.

For now, we have saved ourselves from another incompatible use.

Hopefully we will eventually end up with something in that location we can live with... Literally.

Black History Month Spotlight: I.M. Terrell

Black History Month, celebrated in February, is a time to honor the contributions and legacy of African Americans across U.S. history and society, including activists, civil rights pioneers, and leaders in industry, politics, science, culture and more. In the spirit of that mission, each Monday, Wednesday and Friday for the rest of the month, a local Black hero will be featured in hopes that their stories will inspire readers all year long to explore other fascinating change agents.

Isaiah Milligan "I.M." Terrell (1859-1931)

Educator

Isaiah Milligan Terrell, educator, was born on Jan. 3, 1859, near the city of Anderson, Grimes County, Texas. Terrell was the son of Alexander, a blacksmith, and Nancy (Oneil) Terrell and received a private education taught by two missionaries before attending Straight University in New Orleans, where he earned a bachelor of arts and a master of arts degree.

In 1881, Terrell was hired as a private school teacher in Anderson, Texas. And a year later, he was selected by Fort Worth's Superintendent of Schools, Alexander Hogg, to head the first free public school for African Americans, called the East Ninth Street Colored School.

In 1890, Terrell was named principal and superintendent of colored schools. The East Ninth Street School was moved to the corner of East 12th and Stedman streets in a property trade with the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad in 1906 and renamed North Side Colored High School No. 11.

In 1909, a bond election provided funds for a new building, which opened in May 1910. I.M. Terrell was named principal and served until 1915. In honor of its former principal, the school was named I.M. Terrell High School in 1921. The school at East 12th and Stedman streets became an elementary and junior high school in 1938, when Terrell High School was moved to its present location at 1411 E. 18th St. During Terrell's years of service in the Fort Worth public schools, the first fireproof school building in Texas for African Americans was built.

Terrell was a member of the Mount Gilead Baptist



Church in Fort Worth. Mount Gilead in 1913 was the oldest Black church (founded in 1876) in the city and was the largest African American church of any denomination in Texas.

On Oct. 15, 1915, Terrell left Fort Worth to become the fifth principal of Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College and was administrator at Prairie View from 1915 to 1918. Following his tenure at Prairie View, Terrell served as president of Houston College (also known as Houston Baptist Academy) in Houston's Fourth Ward, superintendent of the Union Hospital and then worked to secure funding for a new Houston Negro Hospital before serving as the first superintendent.

Terrell died on Sept. 28, 1931, in Houston. The I.M. Terrell High School in Fort Worth, buildings at Prairie View A&M University and the Houston Negro Hospital (Riverside General Hospital) all stand as monuments of his efforts and achievements.

A wide range of sites will be considered for the 2022 list, including commercial, residential, religious, public buildings, neighborhoods, bridges, monuments and landscapes. Owners of properties recognized as endangered benefit from increased public awareness and assistance from Historic Fort Worth to address issues at the properties.

New Southside Biergarten is a Hit

Ever since the famed Bearded Lady gastropub left its original home at the corner of Magnolia and 7th Ave, its absence has been felt. A new biergarten has now moved into the spot to bring a German flare to the southside.

The Radler is a self-proclaimed "German-cycling pub." As a non-cycler, I am not sure what that means, but despite my arrival by car rather than by bike, I loved the Radler.

There is a respectable beer and wine selection, heavy, of course, on German options. The food menu is mostly hot dogs and sausages of various kinds, with a smattering of appetizers that will make you wish you hadn't ordered a meal at all.

My table opted for the Bavarian Pretzels, the Loaded Baked Potato Tots, and the Fried Cheese Curds. Wow. The pretzel, served with homemade queso, was every bit as good as you'd expect from a German pub, but the tex-mex twist of queso as a dip was uniquely delicious. The cheese curds were also fantastic fluffy and crisp. The all star though, is the tots.

We're not talking about Sonic tater-tots here. These tots are the size of my two-year-old's hand. They're much more substantial than your average tot, so there's less crunch and more potato. Loaded up inside with bacon and cheese, these things are to die for.

I'd like to tell you more about my main course, but I can't even remember it. I went into a food coma directly following the appetizers. I only have a vague recollection of corny dogs, bratwurst, and Black Forest Ham sliders.

The Radler isn't the next Bearded Lady because it's something completely its own. It's more down to earth. It's simple, yet it has plenty to offer, whether for lunch or for late nights on the town.

Best of all, it's closer to home.
