

PRESIDENT'S LETTER (CONT.)

We will share more details as we work through them. The Ryan Place Fourth of July Parade will remain the morning of July 4 th as it has been in recent years.

Neighborhood leaders met with the Parks Department on March 20th to discuss progress of the new pavilion and the construction schedule for the Daggett Park refresh. We're excited that we're getting closer to the construction phase. As I'm writing this, we have a meeting scheduled with the Parks Department and Councilwoman Beck's office on Monday, March 27th, at City Hall to discuss the Triangle Park refresh, and I look forward to reporting the progress on that effort in future communications.

In closing, I want everyone to know that neighborhood leaders are aware of the concerns of an ongoing renovation project in the neighborhood. Many of us love Ryan Place because of the diverse community of wonderful people, the beautiful historic homes, as well as the diversity of the styles of homes throughout different parts of the neighborhood. From time to time, things happen that give us reason to believe that the character and charm of our neighborhood are being threatened. When these incidents occur,

the neighborhood has struggled historically to find a solution that balances the need to preserve the character of the neighborhood while also preserving the right of property owners to have control over their property.

The tools available to neighborhoods to help strike this balance can come with advantages and disadvantages, and with a neighborhood as diverse as ours, there are often differences of opinion on what tools are the most appropriate.

Accordingly, we are co-hosting an educational session and Q&A with the City of Fort Worth's Preservation and Design Office on Monday, May 1 st at St. John's. This will hopefully help inform and guide future decision making for our community. You will find more details about this event in the newsletter.

The Wine - "Haus made Frosé" by Wine Haus, 2023



Secretary's Report

At the February 2023 BOD Meeting each director gave a report on his respective area of responsibility.

Highlights from meeting include: introduction of new NPO Jenny Bell; community review of Triangle Park concept completed; bids being called for re-landscaping Elizabeth Blvd gate areas; building of a database of RP homes and their history has begun; candidates for City Council District 9 have been invited to speak to RP residents on April 17th; proposed 24-unit townhome build on Hemphill next to Lisa's Chicken was denied by

Zoning Commission; RPIA is opposing the zoning request to change 3005 & 3011 Stanley Ave from "A-5" (one-family) to "E" (neighborhood commercial) and is sending a letter stating such to Zoning Commission.

At the March 2023 BOD Meeting each director gave a report on his respective area of responsibility.

Highlights from meeting include: Triangle Park Committee scheduled to meet with City Parks Dept and Councilwoman Beck this month; RP leadership scheduled to meet with City Parks Dept PM this month regarding placement of the new pavilion in Daggett Park; Fire Station Skate Park grand opening is April 29th; a City Council rezoning project has been initiated and a public meeting will be held in May to discuss; a forum for City Council District 9 candidates is scheduled for 7pm on April 17 th at St. John's here in Ryan Place; Cantey St. is on list for restriping in 2023/2024; three homes confirmed so far for the 2023 Home Tour; on May 27th W. Robert St. will be closed between 6th Ave and Ryan Place Dr. for a wedding ceremony.

Researching Your Home's History

STEP 1: Tarrant County Deed History Card

In the 1930s the property tax office of the Tarrant County Clerk's Office set up an index card file for residential property. Each of these cards has information about ownership of the address, a built date for the house, construction details, and permits as well as a drawing of the footprint of the house.

First, you need the addition name and block and lot number of your property to find the historic deed card for your address. Check one of the following for these items: (1) Tarrant County Appraisal District tax bill or Tarrant County Appraisal District website, (2) documents relating to the purchase of your property, or (3) the deed to your property. Note: the year built listed by the Tarrant County Appraisal District is often inaccurate.

The Tarrant County Deed History cards are online:

https://www.tarrantcountytx.gov/en/tax/property-tax/deed-history-card.html.

The deed card will supply you with a possible year of the building of the home, and an early owner's name,

who may or may not have been the original owner. With this information, you are ready to check entries about your address in the Fort Worth city directories.

STEP 2: Fort Worth City Directories

The Fort Worth city directories are one of the most valuable resources in your quest for your home's history. The best year to start your research is the first recorded deed year on the Deed History Card. Most of the addresses that fall within the Ryan Place Improvement Association

boundaries were built after 1908, the year when entries by street name were added to the alphabetical directories by surname.

Check both the street section for your your address and the surname sections for the name(s) of resident(s). Then go to the Directory from the year before and continuing working year by year until you find the first time the address is missing. The first directory in which the home address is listed narrows down the possible year the house was built. Information for the city directories was collected in different months and in either the previous year or the year that the directory was published.

City directories from 1877-1928 (on microfiche) and the city directories books from the 1930s-2016 are available at The Fort Worth History Center, 501 E. Bolt, 817-392-7740.

Library patrons at the FWHC can accessed many city directories on the Library Edition of Ancestry.com via the

center's computers. Also, telephone books from past years are at the Fort Worth History Center. The telephone books are helpful in several instances.

Tarrant County Archives has the city directories books from 1877-1999. A few years from 2000 and forward are in their collection. The Tarrant County Archives is open to walk ins on Tuesdays-Fridays, by appointment only on Mondays, and hours are 9-12 and 1:30-4:30. It is helpful to call ahead about your research interest and arrange a time for a visit. The parking fee can be waived by archives staff who will stamp your parking ticket.

The Tarrant County Archives

is at 200 Taylor Street, Suite 5200, their phone is 817-884-3272, and email is archives@tarrantcounty.com.

The Portal to Texas History at https://texashistory.unt.edu/ has a few city and business directories for Fort Worth.
