

PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Ryan Place,

The dog days of summer are here! I hope everyone is surviving the heat and finding ways to stay cool. RPIA traditionally takes a break in July, which means we don't hold a Board meeting and we don't publish a newsletter. However, we've been busy, so I'm excited to update you on what's been happening!

On June 14th, the newly created **RPIA Community Service** Committee held its first event at the Tarrant Area Food Bank. With approximately 20 Ryan Place volunteers (young and old), we were able to sort over 12,000 pounds of food to create over 10,000 meals for those in need. The community spirit of Ryan Place was on full display, and I want to thank Committee Chair Andy Deufel and Committee members Donna Thomson and Sarah Rucker for organizing the event. If you would like to join the Community Service Committee and help plan the next event, please contact me.

On June 27th, the City Council voted to move forward with the Council-Initiated Rezoning Process that will affect a percentage of property owners in Ryan Place. Legal notices to

affected property owners should have been delivered during the period of July 20th - July 30th. As I am writing this, I am being told the process is still on track with the schedule we published in the spring. Public Hearing # 1 will take place at the Zoning Commission Hearing on August 9th and Public Hearing # 2 will take place at the City Council meeting on September 12th. While I feel the Council-Initiated Rezoning is a positive step towards protecting Ryan Place from the intensive development we see appearing in surrounding neighborhoods, it's not a silver bullet. RPIA will continue to work with our elected representatives and neighborhood partners on additional tools to preserve the nature of our community.

Park improvement efforts are currently underway. Anyone that has walked by Daggett Park will see that construction has commenced on the park pavilion and playground equipment refresh effort.





Once we have approval of the plan, we will begin seeking park contractors to help us determine costs and timeline.

- Seeking resources and guidance from the City of Fort Worth's Historic Office on the process for implementing a historic overlay,
- Using existing historic overlay guidelines in place for different communities to promulgate guidelines that balance the interests of protecting the character and nature of homes in Ryan Place with the need to gain the support of a majority of members to whom the overlay would apply,
- Determining whether adopting an overlay for regions of the neighborhood in a piece-meal strategy would be an effective approach vs. attempting to adopt an overlay for the entire neighborhood at once,
- Determining which structures in Ryan Place would qualify as contributing structures and be subject to an overlay,
- Determining the best approach for educating the neighborhood on both the benefits and challenges of an overlay and gauging community interest,
- Understanding the enforcement mechanisms and processes should an overlay be implemented.

I want to thank Kathryn Hansen for stepping up to lead the Committee, and I appreciate the other neighbors who will be dedicating their time to this effort. I will keep the community updated on the Committee's efforts.

Many families and kids are gearing up for a new school year and many of us are excited college football will be starting soon! Fall (and cooler temperatures) are around the corner, so hang in there and we'll be promoting some fun fall events in the next edition of the newsletter. Enjoy, and thanks to all of you who contribute newsletter content and help deliver!

Ryan Place District Cohesion

Previous Fort Worth Zoning Historic Overlays for Ryan Place have had the goal of strengthening neighborhood cohesion by developing a single story for the whole of Ryan Place as we know it today. The area includes the following boundaries: West Berry on the south, 8th Ave on the west, Elizabeth Blvd. Historic District on the north and the BNSF railroad tracks on the east.

That narrative is that the development of Ryan Place mirrors the history of Fort Worth for the first half of the 20thCentury. It shows the impact of city planning and ebb and flow of real estate development impacted by world events of the 1900's – 1950's. Ryan Place experienced major growth between 1911 and 1952.

The development of the Ryan Place

neighborhood was the culmination of the prosperity and intense growth than began in Fort Worth around 1900. In 1902 Armour & Swift meatpacking company open plants on North Fort Worth beginning an economic boom in the city at large. Fort Worth's 1900 population tripled from 26,668 to 73,312 in 1910. The construction of the city streetcar lines through the southside was crucial to the area's development. Streetcar lines ran down South Adams St. and Willing Ave.

The discovery of major oil fields in Northwest Texas in 1917- 1918 fueled another economic boom in Fort Worth. By the 1920 Census Fort Worth's population increased by 45%. The industrial build-up during WWII impacted the city. By the end of WWII most of Ryan Place was developed.

Because this growth occurred over a 50-year period the Ryan Place District has an a range of architectural styles:

- A. Predominant Style, Craftsman, Construction Dates 1920's.
- B. Predominant Style, Minimal Traditional 1940's and 1950's.
- C. Predominant Styles, Prairie, Italian Renaissance, Colonial Revival and Spanish Eclectic - 1910's and early 1920's
- D. Predominant Style, Tudor Revival late 1920's into the 1940's
- E. Predominant Style, Queen and Craftsman, 1920's

These five sub-districts attempt to adhere our neighborhood into a single place we call Ryan Place.

In light of recent resignations, the board took action to appoint a new secretary (Donna Darner) and is seeking a new street director for Willing Ave.


The board was reminded of upcoming social events: the annual softball game, Fourth of July Parade, and the annual pool and BBQ party.

The board received an update on progress towards the Triangle Park renovation plan.




Does your home need a metal-framed yard sign to display during the Home Tour?


THIS YEAR, RPIA WILL ADD 25 NEW SIGNS, AT NO COST TO HOMEOWNERS

Signs will be allocated on a first-come, first-served basis.

While only 25 will be made this year, the hope is to continue making more each year.

On September 19, 1911, the Star-Telegram announced that merchandise broker Whitford Trawick Fry and his wife had moved into their newly completed home at 1112 Elizabeth Boulevard. He first house built and occupied on historic Elizabeth Boulevard. A classic example of a Prairie-style foursquare, the shake shingle siding and oversized wrap-around porch set precedence for future homes on the Boulevard. Like all the original dwellings on Elizabeth Boulevard but between 1911 to 1928, 1112 Elizabeth Boulevard was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1979. The home was purchased by new owners in 2020 who undertook a 14-month remodel project bookended by the COVID lockdown and the great snowstorm of 2021.

- ·Homeowners will store their sign to display for the tour, year after year.
