

PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Ryan Place,

One of my favorite parts about this job is meeting the new neighbors and sharing with them all the good things that come with being part of this community. There's been several opportunities to meet new neighbors recently at Cowtown Cleanup, the New Neighbor Mixer (of course!), and the Easter Egg Hunt. It's great to hear where people are moving from, how they landed in Ryan Place, and what their experience here has been so far. Not surprisingly, they usually have good things to say! The next time you're at a Ryan Place event, please try to find someone you don't know and introduce yourself; we always want the new members of our community to feel welcome.

Monday, April 17th, was our City Council District 9 Candidate Forum. We welcomed candidates Elizabeth Beck, Pamela Boggess, and Jason Pena. We had prepared several questions in advance related to the candidate's goals, their positions on zoning issues, TCU housing, and short-term rentals. We also took questions from the audience. It was a great opportunity to engage in the political process, meet the candidates, and gain

a greater understanding of the candidate's positions on the different issues. I want to thank Vice-President Cade Lovelace for organizing the event.

Although the neighborhood association isn't officially endorsing a candidate in this race, we are encouraging Ryan Place residents to vote. Early voting began on April 24th and election day will be on Saturday, May 6th. Traditionally, elected officials are more responsive to communities with strong voting records, so it's in our best interest to make our voices heard at the polls!

On Monday, May 15th at 7:00 PM, at St. John's, officials from the Fort Worth Zoning office will be meeting with the community on a Council-Initiated Zoning effort. Councilwoman Beck's office, the Zoning office, and RPIA are coordinating an effort to update some of the zoning in Ryan Place to protect the neighborhood from student-type housing being developed more frequently in nearby neighborhoods.



PRESIDENT'S LETTER (CONT.)

The focus of the rezoning effort would be the area fronting South Adams and eastward, with a review of the non-residential zoning along 8th Avenue.

The goal will be to rezone much of the B areas (multi-family) into some form of A (single family). As always, any property owner whose property is subject to a zoning change under this effort will receive notice from the city and be afforded the traditional due process.

A few members of the Triangle Park Refresh Committee met with Berkely Place Neighborhood leaders in late April to discuss their recent park rehab project on Ward Parkway. It was a good discussion, and they were able to share some important points about working with city offices, utility considerations, and fundraising ideas. Next steps for that effort include submitting an

updated site plan to the city and beginning a search for contractors.

Fourth of July event planning is underway, the tour committee is signing up tour homes and sponsors, and RPIA leaders and neighbors are working closely with another developer on a potential zoning change on the corner of Capps and Lipscomb. It's been very busy, and I appreciate all the volunteers who are working hard for Ryan Place!

Enjoy this edition of the newsletter, and thanks to all you who contribute content and help deliver!

4th of July Parade


Join us on July 4th for the Annual Ryan Place Independence Day Parade!

It has come to my attention that after a month of frosé and Kenny Loggins that my street cred may be questionable.

In January of 1989 Tone Loc (pronounced "loke," and rhymes with poke) released his debut album, "Loc-ed After Dark" on Delicious Records. While you may not know the record, I am certain you have heard the second single from this album, "Funky Cold Medina."

Well, it just so happens that Distribution Bar in South Main Village makes a cocktail of the same name. And, also coincidentally, Tone Loc will be performing on May 6th at the Fort Worth Convention Center.

The Vinyl — "Loc-ed After Dark" by Tone Loc, 1989

This album shot to superstardom, number one on the Billboard 200 chart, for several reasons. First, the guitar hooks, most of them sampled by the Dust Brothers who have

also worked with the Beastie Boys and Beck to name a few, made it accessible to a mainstream audience. And who doesn't remember jamming out to "Wild Thing" and "Funky Cold Medina?" Those songs take me right back to the hot Texas summers of my youth where I was probably rocking Umbros, Tevas, and rainbow Oakley sunglasses. (I understand this is probably not helping my street cred even more). Secondly, Tone Loc's gritty voice and smooth flowing rhymes are catchy, and just work. The Pair


Did I get lazy? Am I mailing it in this month with a cocktail named after a song from the album of choice? Wholeheartedly, NO!

Researching Your Home's History - Digitized Newspapers

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram and Dallas Morning News [which had a Fort Worth Bureau for decades] are digitized and can be an online resource for information about your land, home, and owners. Both newspapers are available for use from home for free if you have a current Fort Worth Public Library card or you can visit the Fort Worth History Center on Bolt Street to use their computers and the staff are available to help you. You will need to access the Fort Worth Public Library Databases and select Genealogy and History as your subject for a list of resources which include the Star-Telegram and Dallas Morning News. After you click on one of these newspapers' names, enter your library card number and password. Unless you have a special password, simply use the last 4 digits of your library card number for entry.

If you have authorization to use databases at a local university or college, these two newspapers are often available. For example, TCU Library has two versions of the Star-Telegram and Dallas Morning News; the ones labeled Historical are easier to use. "Real Estate Transfers" was a frequent column in both papers in the 1910s and into the 1920s. In the search bar, use your home's description in the following order: lot number, block number, and addition and be sure to place the entire phase in quotation marks. If your property happens to be listed, you will see the buyer and seller's names and can determine by the amount of money whether the sale was for land only or included building(s). Ryan Place lots in the 1910s and 1920s were \$1500 to \$4000. Some undeveloped lots sold two and three times as investors sold at a profit and individual purchasers defaulted on Ryan Place Land Company financed loans.

Using the lot and block numbers and addition search sometimes results in a list of new building permits. If you locate a building permit with cost of building(s) or an improvement to an existing house or outbuilding, you are indeed fortunate. The city records for building permits for the first seven decades of Ryan Place no longer exist.

The Fort Worth Record newspaper has permit and sales records for 1911-1912, the first two years of the Ryan Place Addition. They are available on the Portal to Texas History, University of North Texas https://texashistory.unt.edu/explore/titles/t02602/.

These and other digitized newspapers are helpful in providing information about home owners, your property, and photos or drawings. The search term "Ryan Place" yielded a series of Star-Telegram sales ads for Ryan Place from the 1929-1930 which featured a drawing of a different Ryan Place house in each ad, the name of the current owner, and their occupation or business. In another case, using the home's address yielded the actual week the original owners moved into 2300 Sixth Avenue and revealed the house was built in an earlier decade than previously thought.

When researching owners in any digitized resource, you will want to use variations of the person's name, especially try initials for given and middle names and also

try different spellings. You may need to expand your newspaper research to more locations to track the owner and find an obituary to complete his/her biography. The most productive site of Texas newspapers from small towns to large cities is the Texas Digital Newspaper Program at the free Portal to Texas History https:// texashistory.unt.edu/. Their online collection includes Texas newspapers from 194 years! You can select the county to see a list of the local newspapers available and can select a decade or year to refine your search. The digitized Fort Worth newspapers on the Portal to Texas History date from 1873-2011. A recent addition is issues of The Fort Worth Press commencing in 1922.

Chronicling America/Library of Congress is the free comprehensive national site for digitized historical newspapers. To limit your search to Texas newspapers, use hhtp://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/. The advanced search will allow you to limit the search to specific newspapers and within a date range.

There are a number of paid subscription digitized newspapers. Of note for Ryan Place researchers is Newspaper Archive (hhtp:// newspaperarchive.com) which has the Texas Oil Gazette, 1920-1920, and the Texas Oil Ledger, 1920-21; and Newspapers.com (hhtp:// www.newspapers.com/paper/#p place=TX) has the same oil newspapers and the 1969 The Skiff (Texas Christian University).

The United States Census Population records and maps will be covered in the next article.
