





THE FEVER: PART II

Last month, Ryan Place residents were alerted of a possible impending outbreak of what pathologists call "Spring Cleaning Fever". As previously reported, there is no known cure, but knowledge of the disease can lessen its effect. We continue now with that muchneeded information, kindly shared by an afflicted neighbor.

It begins with an odd itch upon the forearm, usually when hanging the sweater, only recently worn, back in the closet. Ever so slightly, the itch then crawls all the way up the arm. And the neck—whatever is touching it - feels tight. There follows a strange sense of walls contracting and the ceiling appears to lower, just a bit. Distracted, the potential victim starts counting shoe boxes, trying to remember the last time some of them were opened, and then, without any warning at all, the eyes focus on the long-sleeved garments hanging from the rods, zeroing in, with laser-like precision, on any that contain wool.

And just like that, before you know it, before you can shake your head firmly and back out of the closet, Spring Cleaning Fever has you.

Prior commitments—appointments, dinner plans, actually the entire to-do list—cease to exist, as with maniacal strength, you yank winter shirts down and toss them haphazardly on the bed. Pants are ousted next, then skirts and jackets, each new find quickening your pace until the fragile grasp on process disintegrates into general mayhem: winter shoes go flying, suede bags are sent airborne, and the hats and scarves nesting on hooks—they're plucked, one by one, and plunked atop everything else on [Text Wrapping Break]the bed.

(Side note: If you still have any leverage over your faculties at this early point, consider it a good time to ask how much wool—or tweed, for pity's sake—you actually need in Fort Worth, Texas.)

Breathless, half-bent with a newly-pulled muscle, you stop momentarily and stare at your heap of stuff—your hot, prickly, suffocating heap of stuff. Then you kick the air conditioner down a notch and head for the next room, because the stuff has to go somewhere.

In a devilish whirlwind, fully infected now, you flit through the house, the contents of a second closet upended for the first and spilling into a third, and on and on, resulting in such a septic domino effect that dresser drawers and under bed boxes can't help but get involved, too. Available surfaces pile high. Hallways clutter up. In dire cases, even medicine cabinets are compromised, the fever's toxicity dangerously accelerating in tandem with progressively more erratic behavior until finally, it's as if the top has been popped off the house and its contents stirred with a big, wooden spoon.

But no one's eating. Certainly, not you. (It's been reported in some instances, you don't even recharge your phone.) Your mind's eye sees only what the fever sees: wave upon wave of stuff.

Ugly stuff, broken stuff, was-going-to-return-it-but-didn't-stuff. (OMG, this receipt is a year old!)

Stuff you don't wear. (You last zipped it when?) Stuff you don't want. (Yes, it was thoughtful, but . . .)

Enigma stuff you don't understand. (Does this do something? Where's the other end of it?)

And the worst: stuff mixing its genre with other stuff. (Why is the lint roller with the Band-Aids?)

At this stage of disease, which can last upwards of a week, productivity can be at its highest. (Those in the field have observed accomplishments so impressive that—according to local gossip—Martha Stewart has dispatched spies to take note.) Bedroom closets enjoy complete seasonal makeovers, linen closets experience uniform towel folds, and, in the best-case scenarios, Goodwill piles by the back door overshadow modest stacks of items waiting for storage bins. If you find yourself among this rare, elite group of survivors—those labeled as having "extraordinary levels of resiliency"—congratulations.

Good for you.

If, on the other hand, you naturally suffer from what's called weakened resolve (a munificent label, if you will, for quitter), chances are you'll experience the fever's alternate final stage with a vengeance. Picking up at the point where you are staring at the stuff, it goes like this:

Somewhat dizzy, confusion takes over as your grip on certainty gives way to overriding unease. Is this a spring shirt or a fall shirt? Is this jacket full-on winter or could it be transitional? And those fuzzy socks—should I just keep one pair out? Moving as through a fog, you persevere long enough to hang things back up, generally squashing winter into one closet and summer into another, but, on the whole, zeal for the project as first imagined has evaporated.

Stuff. Stuff. And more stuff.

Cobbling the contents of the drawers back together is even harder, for while you still recognize the difference between paper clips and safety pins, the fine nuance of permanent marker verses dry erase pen is a challenge. And the disparity between leggings and tights . . . well, suffice it to say, you just start stuffing stuff back into drawers.

The final insult is now you can't find the sweater you always leave out in case you get cold, and you are cold because you kicked the air conditioning down too far.

And it's no longer spring outside, because after all, you do live in north Texas.

If not interrupted by something worse (say, for instance, a friend calls needing to stay the weekend) this waning but uncomfortable state can last—just like the more successful strain—well into a full week, so be kind to yourself.

Preferably by leaving the house and buying some stuff.

Author's note: Rare cases of advanced Spring Cleaning Fever have been known to spread to the kitchen, a discussion about which offers no hope. Accordingly, it, as well as reference to the lethal but often-ignored garage-infecting variety, has been deleted.



In the tradition of the Ryan Place Bottom of the Barrel Band, Whiskey Pants has entertained at the annual Crawfish Boil.



NEWS TO USE

CLAIM YOUR FREE MOSQUITO DUNKS

The Code Compliance Department is providing free mosquito dunks to Fort Worth residents to help control mosquito populations around the home and to fight mosquito-borne viruses. Water gardens and koi ponds are among numerous outdoor locations where mosquito dunks are effective.

Each household may pick up a free package of two dunks at the Consumer Health Office, 818 Missouri Ave. Residents must show proof of residency, such as a utility bill or driver's license. Pick up your mosquito dunks 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday while supplies last.

The dunks are small tablets comprised of an environmentally safe larvicide (a specialized bacteria that attacks larvae) that targets and eliminates mosquito larvae when placed in standing water.

Place the dunks anywhere standing water can collect, such as in flower pots, air-conditioning units, stagnant ponds, empty containers and even gutters.

The product is not for resale, and residents should follow the instructions on the label. Dunks are also available for purchase at any local hardware store.

The most effective way to control mosquitoes is to reduce their population:

- Remove standing water in empty flower pots, pet bowls, outdoor toys, gutters, etc.
- Properly maintain your swimming pool.
- When outdoors, remember to wear repellent that contains DEET.
- Wear clothing with long sleeves and pants when applicable.
