FROM LOST TO FOUND: HELP BRING YOUR DOG HOME

It seems like our neighborhood Facebook page and Nextdoor app are overrun with lost dog posts. What can you do to help your dog find its way back home if he or she ever slips out the gate or front door?

Consider having an Identification tag made. You can do this at most local pet stores or order one online. Just make sure to get a new tag if your phone number changes. There are also identification collars that have your number right on the collar, which is helpful for dogs that always seem to lose their tags.

Having an identification tag will likely dramatically increase the chance that someone will stop and pick up your dog. It shows that they have an owner and will likely be able to be reunited quickly.

Having your dog microchipped is also a great way to increase your chances that they will be returned. Of course, the person who finds your dog has to know about microchips and has to get the dog scanned. Your vet can microchip your dog. There are lower cost options as well. The Fort Worth Animal shelter on Martin Street will microchip for \$12. The Spay Neuter Network has low-cost (\$16.50) and sometimes free microchips. Texas Coalition Animal Protection (TCAP) will chip for \$30 or \$20 if done at the same time as spay/neuter.

After the fee, your chip company may encourage you to pay an annual membership fee. Be sure to ask what this fee is for. Usually membership fees cover insurance in case your pet is found 3,000 miles from home, in which case your pet would be transported home for free. Even if you do not pay the annual membership fee, as long as your dog is registered, you will be contacted if your dog is found. If you have adopted a dog from a rescue or a friend, make sure the microchip information gets transferred to you. You can call your microchip company to make sure your information is up-to-date.

Consider adding the microchip company's phone number and your pet's microchip number to your contacts in your phone or address book. This will come in handy if your pet ever is missing. Always call the chip company to let them know your pet is missing.

Any veterinarian should have a microchip scanner. Ryan Place is very fortunate to have their very own microchip scanner. This was purchased by neighbors and is kept by a volunteer.

Register the microchip. After microchipping, there is usually a fee to register the animal. Sometimes this is included in the cost of the chip. After you register your pet, be sure to keep your information up to date. The registration fee is usually a one-time fee.

On a stool pulled up to my kitchen counter, the smell of apricots stewing on the stove and Grandmother's fried pie dough recipe on the counter, my mind begins to melt into the warmth of the sun on my back flooding through the large south-facing windows. Different years, different kitchens, all the same wonderful loving memories of love, laughter, and family. There is no greater joy for me than cooking for others. Something about it beats even shopping and antiquing... which are both high on my list of self-indulgent delights.

It is kind of my anchor, probably because that is how I grew up. In my grandmother's big kitchen, with generations of family involved in food preparation of some kind. It wasn't just cooking. It was picking, plucking, stewing, canning, baking, cleaning, storing, pickling, planting, hoeing, harvesting... all just to get ready to cook!

Recipes weren't on the internet, meals didn't come in a Blue Apron Box, and cooking was a learned behavior, not a made-for-TV experience. Every morning (except Sunday) my great-grandmother got down her BIG wooden bowl, built a wall of flour, and started working buttermilk biscuits in the middle of it. BIG bowl = BIG biscuits.

Enough were rolled out and baked to last through the day for the whole extended family. Let me tell you, that smell of baking bread was the only alarm clock needed. If you didn't come to the table, you didn't eat. Period. Unless you were fast enough to sneak a cold biscuit, but you had to be really fast or a large wooden spoon would end up coming down on your outstretched hand. Pain to the max degree.

They did everything from memory. Cornbread, pie dough, cakes, jams. Granny did have one cookbook, and like her Bible it is well worn and marked. And then there was the Recipe Box. A small, overflowing, green wooden wealth of goodness. Traded church recipes, some on Sunday bulletins. Friends recipes. A few torn out of magazines, some off the back of cans or jars, but my all-time favorites are the ones in the handwriting of different folks.

As I sit here looking at Granny's sweet, shaky printing on a 3x5 notecard I can remember everything about her. She always printed, even when she "signed checks". She had a slight tremor as long as I can remember. She would laugh and say it was the Lord's way of reminding her to stay humble. There are no instructions on the notecard, just a list of ingredients, "cause we cooked them together and therefore you know how to do it."

Just a few short lines hold a lifetime of treasured moments. Memories that are truly priceless and life lessons that are forever. Sharing is caring. So as I sit here watching the light rays bounce off the floor and smell the warmth of something on the stove, my greatest New Year's wish for everyone is that your kitchen always smells like you are expecting the joy of family, love, and laughter.

Services to stop:



The RPIA's written communication activity (aka, the RPIA Newsletter) would be reduced to just one legal size sheet containing information about the next neighborhood social, a request for membership, and an article by their featured columnist.

The Apple Computer Company announced the release of the very first iPhone in January 2007. Apple co-founder Steve Jobs revealed the product during one of his famous keynote addresses. The touch-screen mobile phone had been in development since 2005 and reportedly cost over \$150 million to create. Apple's first iPhone was exclusively available through AT&T and thousands of people lined up outside of stores in anticipation of its release later that year. It was originally sold for \$599 and within less than three months of its release, more than one million units were sold.
