

### BIN THERE. DONE THAT.

### What's wrong with these pictures?



Bins are facing correctly, but much too close together. The city requests 12-18" between EACH bin, please. In addition, they prefer the bins off the street at curb if at all possible (Tree overhang may prevent this.).



This bin is up off the street on the curb, but TOO FULL. If this bin was emptied - you owe the driver, who's a REALLY nice guy.



Bins are off the street near the curb, but turned BACKWARDS - impossible to empty with the lifts on the truck. If these bins were emptied - you too, owe the driver, who's a REALLY nice guy.

On our trash pick-up day, the recent severe weather, wind and our mobile trash/recycling bins presented a mystery.

Those circumstances also brought a learning opportunity – as most mysteries solved can do...Here's how it went:

After that overnight storm, I realized a need to revisit my recycle bin, supposedly still at the curb. It was not to be. The bin. Was. Completely. Gone. Missing. Vanished. Nowhere to be seen.

"Oh, wow, that must have been some windstorm...it's not like my bin to run away from home..." I said to myself. It was odd. Up and down 6th Avenue, from the intersection of Cantey looking both north & south, I could see no other bins out of place. My green yard cart and the regular trash bin were \*exactly\* where I'd left them...except for my recyclables bin! I began my search ... and eventually drove virtually EVERY street of Ryan Place in search of it. Here's what I learned:

- The city can provide your bin's serial number to you
- Replacement bins can be obtained in 3-5 business days by request (no charge) if one goes

missing. Just call 817-392-1234.

 The rules around solid waste disposal are common sense (see photo & captions) to aid pickup.

As for the mystery of the missing bin? Turns out a very nice and responsible workman, "Carl", thought my windblown recycle bin belonged inside the gated property where he was working next door. It was only by happenstance I'd caught sight of it a few days later, verified the S/N as my bin and cancelled the order for any new bin. Happy ending right?

Well, yes, that part...but...

In my quest to find my bin – I'd held lengthy conversations with our city's solid waste experts and traversed the neighborhood, finding a number of trash bin violations which are pictured above.

#### THE BULK OF SPRING CLEANING

Our disposal of bulk trash, the result of that annual rite of spring, also receives guidance from the city for disposal:

Bulk is for large items only: mattresses, tree limbs, etc. Keep the pile smaller

than 6' high x 8' wide.

- No auto parts or tires
- No TVs or computers, glass or mirrors, (they break into dangerous shards)
- No hazardous chemicals
- No concrete slag and no \*BAGS, such as pictured below.

Place your bulk trash on the curb by 7:30 a.m. of the 4th calendar Monday where the monitor can see it and mark your location for pickup. If you miss that Monday - it will sit there for the rest of the month.

\*Why no bags? The truck lift may rip the bags - spilling their contents. City crews will not pickup contents or glass shards. More info is on the city's website...

#### LIGHT READS FOR THOSE LAZY HAZY DAYS OF SUMMER

Some of us have ambitious summer reading goals—when things slow down, it's nice to spend time by the pool or under the A/C with books we've been meaning to read for years, like Anna Karenina, or Harry Potter for the twelfth time. While I usually begin the summer with a serious book goal (this year I'd like to read Pat Barker's Regeneration trilogy by August—we'll see!), it's nice to have some manageable and fun "to be reads" on the shelf for summer as well. In that spirit, here are three short fiction series to put on your list and feel good about completing in a summer, or maybe even a really relaxing weekend.

**The Uglies,** by Scott Westerfeld. Made up of three books, Uglies, Pretties, and Specials (with some extra books Westerfeld has set in this universe, to pick up if you're really sucked in!), this fast-paced series is a YA dystopia with a relevant and fun premise: everyone living in this society has plastic surgery on their sixteenth birthday to become a "pretty," or a perfect specimen of physical beauty. The heroine, Tally Youngblood, is excited that her 16th birthday is here and her days as an "ugly" are coming to an end, but of course, it turns out that becoming "pretty" is more complicated than she has been taught.

**Emily of New Moon**, by L.M. Montgomery. Most readers are

familiar with Montgomery's Anne of Green Gables, but many Montgomery fans prefer the lesserknown Emily series, made up of Emily of New Moon, Emily Climbs, and Emily's Quest, which Montgomery wrote in the 1920s. Like Anne, Emily is an orphan who is taken in by stern quardians, in this case, her two aunts who live in the family's ancestral home, New Moon, on Prince Edward Island. The Emily books are less funny than the Anne books, but also, I think, a little less preachy, and they feature a slightly spooky supernatural romance narrative that runs through all three books. Like the Anne books, these work well to read aloud.

**Crazy Rich Asians,** by Kevin Kwan. It may seem like a cop out to recommend a book that one of the most popular movies of last year was based on, but if you loved the film and haven't yet checked out Kwan's trilogy, Crazy Rich Asians, China Rich Girlfriend, and Rich People Problems, consider this your marching order. I flew through all three of these, and although they are admittedly light on plot, the descriptions of amazing food and gorgeous scenery, Kwan's fun and sarcastic tone, with footnotes that make you feel like an insider, and the consistently lovable main characters make these perfect for summer reading.



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
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
