

EXTEND YOUR SUMMER WITH A GOOD BOOK

August in Texas means school uniform sales, last trips to the lake, and settling into the scorching heat that makes it confusing that everyone is always walking around saying "summer's almost over." If your August reading goals are to recapture lazy summer days and ignore the responsibilities of fall, here are three shorter books set during summer break:

The Penderwicks, by Jeanne Birdsall. This is part of a five-book middle-grade series; although my daughter's friends love the whole series, we're only on the first one, and it is adorable. Four sisters with distinct personalities, along with their horticulturist father, rent a cottage behind a mysterious

mansion, and quickly befriend the lonely boy next door. Birdsall is clearly inspired by Little Women, but who doesn't need more Little Women their lives?

Pride, by Ibi Zoboi. Another classic literature remake, this one more literal. Zoboi takes the plot of Pride and Prejudice and sets it in a Brooklyn neighborhood, squashing the plot into one romantic summer when Zuri Benitez's sister Janae is home from college and two handsome boys named Ainsley and Darius move in next door. Zoboi picks up on the YA lit trend of combining prose with verse in this sweet and quick read, which touches on contemporary issues of gentrification and class conflict, picking up on the social commentary central to Austen's original work.

Where We Come From, by Oscar

Cásares. If you read one book set during the summer, one book set in Texas, one book that addresses current politics, make it **Where We Come From**.

In this short but powerful novel, Nina looks forward to her nephew and godson Orly from Houston spending the summer with her in Brownsville, but it turns out the timing of his visit couldn't be worse, as Nina has become unwittingly involved with a human trafficking ring smuggling immigrants across the border. Nina's and Orly's journeys become intertwined with one of the young immigrants, and the book's complicated and loving treatment of all of these relationships are matched by Cásares's beautiful writing.

It's about SECURITY:

In light of recent events and concerns about security, we offer an upcoming series of articles and information about VIDEO security systems. What are their various forms & configurations? What are the PROS & CONS of each? Costs?...and why?

The articles, lists and charts will be broad based (there are MANY variations) but as objective as we know how to make them. Hopefully, if you are considering a video security system we will be able to provide you a reference to help tailor the best system for your home (or business) and your dollar. (NOTE: Updates and extended charts may appear in the ONLINE version of our newsletter)

We'll start with a brief VIDEO SECURITY SYSTEMS GLOSSARY for camera types & variations:

All cameras will have resolution (quality of the image) specifications noted as megapixels (MP) The greater the MP number 2, 4, 5, 8 etc. the better the resolution. A 2MP camera might be good for identifying people in an office, store or warehouse situation where the camera to subject distance is no more than 20-35 feet. The higher resolution 8MP camera could identify objects (like an automobile license tag) at a distance of anywhere from 100-200+ feet.

In addition and in tandem with the MP resolution, all cameras will have ratings describing their ability to produce a particular scan rate on a monitor - HD is High Definition, often defined as 1080p (for 1,080 lines per progressive scan) some older cameras as 1080i (for an interlaced scan) or 720p. Newer (and more expensive) cameras are capable of the 4K resolution & scan rates. NOTE: this standard has been changing rapidly in recent years, but many people may not notice the differences.

All cameras will have a field of view (FOV) expressed in degrees. Security cameras typically have a wide to very wide FOV roughly equivalent to a 16mm lens on a 35mm type camera. (approx. 102°. For reference, "Normal" camera lenses have an FOV of about 40° across the horizontal)

The "form factors" of most cameras have three basic forms: bullet, turrent and dome, which refers to the exterior shape of the protective container of the camera. Requirements for powering the cameras and how these may vary with each camera will be covered in later discussions

Network IP Camera: (Internet Protocol) a type of digital video camera that receives control data and sends image data via the Internet over Ethernet or network CAT 5 or CAT 6 cable with RJ45 connectors. Unlike analog closed-circuit television (CCTV) cameras, they require no local recording device - only a local area network. However, to view saved recordings later, a compatible DVR would be required.

...SECURITY (CONT.)

HD-TVI Camera - is a type of analog to digital high definition CCTV (closed circuit television) security camera (megapixel video over coaxial cabling / HD [high definition] over coax) that supports up to 1080p (this standard was released in 2014)

PTZ Camera - has Pan (left to right), Tilt (up & down) and Zoom (in & out) viewing capabilities from remote operator location. Camera is motorized and often refered to as a "robo"

If you are not familiar with computer networking protocols, requirements for Ethernet or coax cable runs, most, if not all of the above camera types and their systems may require professional installation and setup due to power and transmission needs.

You can expect to pay anywhere from \$300 + labor for a low-res basic 4 camera setup to well over \$5,000+ for 6-8+ cameras in a high res environment, with a 1-8+Tb digital video recorder (DVR) and monitor.

Doorbell Camera - several brands are available (prices range \$40-\$360+). RING PRO, for example, has 1080p resolution, 160° (almost a fisheye) FOV. Custom motion zones and units to extend the WiFi signal are available in some models.

Other types of cameras which are available, but not really suitable for exterior home security include:

Hidden Camera - just what it sounds like and typically used for indoors or weather protected applications. May come as a clock, or other device to cloak its purpose

Micro Camera - variation on the hidden camera. Design and use in your own small space. Ideal for monitoring internal theft activities.

Board Camera - another variation on the hidden camera - sees through pinhole size aperture, usually has superb low-light capabilities.

Snake Camera - video lens at the end

of a wire/tube. Law enforcement uses these in a car's A/C vents for...well, you can use your imagination...

There are also complete Security System Bundles, Wireless Transmission, various Access Controls and a multitude of accessories, including the special monitors and connectors needed to let you see what your cameras are seeing... (not just any old monitor will do...)

Next time:

RYAN PLACE: A PERSONAL HISTORY UPDATED

We moved into the Knox and Evelyn Thomas Home in 1976. Our decision to buy a Ryan Place house was a reaction to the lessons we learned from our parents whose definition of success was to move away from where you grew up, to move west, to move out of the city center, from urban to more and more suburban environments. We weren't the first wave of young families to discover Ryan Place with its sidewalks, shaded tree-lined streets, neighborhood schools, homes that reminded us of our grandmother's, and neighbors that actually knew each other.

The Ryan Place 4th of July Parade was already a tradition when we got here, and the neighborhood had fought city hall several times with varying degrees of success. Traffic calming along 8th Ave was yet to be accomplished by a combination of Italian Cypress trees and the late afternoon "picket-fence" effect on drivers' windshields as they headed to the suburbs. Speed Humps and Chicanes were a long way off. Traffic calming on Elizabeth Blvd. was simply a No-Thru-Trucks sign at 8th Ave. No one had ever even thought of traffic circles.

When you live in a neighborhood, you automatically become a part of its history. You become what President Obama called "part of our patchwork heritage." Our neighborhood patchwork was in part created by the economic cycles and history of Fort Worth and the nation. This patchwork is what makes

it possible even now for young families to rent, buy, and buy again as their family economics dictate.

Why was I qualified to write a personal history of Ryan Place? (Glad you asked!) Back in the 1980s, I raised my hand at the wrong time and became the newsletter editor; that was when "cut and paste" meant just that. At my work, our group "clerk steno" didn't seem to mind doing a little extra typing. My plans were to write a "Ryan Place - Then and Now" column using the old RPIA Newsletters I had saved. However a review of the stories five, 10, 15 years ago, from 2009 revealed that things were pretty much like they are now, you could just change the names: Councilman Herman Stutte became Councilmember Joel Burns, became Councilmember Ann Zadeh. Gas pot" meters become natural gas wells, Lone Star Gas became Chesapeake became Atmos, 1985 became 2019.

I drew on the written record when it agreed with the points I wanted to make. The interviews with people that have gotten Ryan Place to where it is today were mostly true (as true as personal histories ever are).

Other articles were my opinion on stockade fences, protecting set-back requirements on new construction, and some other stuff that was just fun. We are back to where we began my journalist journey, almost to the Labor Day Garage Sale Weekend.





FROM THE CITY OF FORT WORTH & TARRANT COUNTY DESK:

Public Health Senior Public Information Officer Richard Hill, Tarrant County Agency

Topic: Illegal dumping

Have you witnessed illegal dumping in your area? Cities in Tarrant County, Tarrant County government and area law enforcement agencies are working to prevent this illegal activity, but they need your help.

If you see illegal dumping, contact local law enforcement or call the North Central Texas :

Stop Illegal Dumping Hotline at 1-888-335-DUMP (3867). Leave a message with all the details including the location of the activity. Information provided is strictly confidential.

Residents are also reminded to protect the environment by disposing of household chemicals properly. Most Tarrant County residents can take their materials to the Fort Worth Environmental Collection Center (ECC), 6400 Bridge St. (At I-30 and Loop 820)

Examples of hazardous household chemicals include paint, pesticides, automotive fluids, household cleaners, solvents and batteries. Household chemicals should never be poured down the drain, onto the ground, into storm sewers or into trash bags. Health experts note that a single quart of used motor oil can pollute up to 250,000 gallons of water.

Most Tarrant County cities and some surrounding cities and counties allow citizens to use the ECC for hazardous waste disposal. To use the ECC, residents of unincorporated areas of Tarrant County can get a free voucher by calling the County Environmental Specialist at (817) 884-2634.

New state law cracks down on roof scams

A new state law makes it clear that it's illegal for a contractor or roofer to waive an insurance deductible.

"This new law will help further protect consumers," said Texas Insurance Commissioner Kent Sullivan. "Roofers who waive deductibles are cutting corners. Take your business elsewhere."

Under the new law effective September 1, violators could get up to a \$2,000 fine and up to six months in jail.
