
## BACK TO SCHOOL READING

Bildungsroman is a German word that literally means "education novel." This word is used loosely in literature to refer to a coming-of-age story—some Bildungsroman many of us have read include Huckleberry Finn, Jane Eyre, and the Harry Potter series. Back to school season seems like the perfect time to try a new "education novel"—here are a few offbeat ones that I enjoyed.

Fun Home, by Alison Bechdel: You may have seen the Tony-award winning Broadway musical adaptation of Fun Home—whether you have or not, definitely check out Bechdel's original. A graphic novel for an adult audience, Fun Home moves back and forth between Bechdel's childhood spent helping out at her family's funeral home and her traumatic experiences in college, when her father died tragically just as Bechdel was coming to terms with his—and her own—sexual identity. There are so many intricate layers to this seemingly straightforward family drama, both visually and in terms of its storytelling, that make it fun to read and discuss in a group.

Silver Sparrow, Tayari Jones: Jones's An American Marriage is getting a lot of press right now. If you're like me and still on the library waitlist for An American Marriage, if you finished it and want more, or if you just like complicated friendship stories, check out her previous book, Silver Sparrow. The two protagonists who narrate this novel are half-sisters—their father. we learn in its first sentence, has two wives. One protagonist, Dana, knows she is part of a "second" family, but the other, Chaurisse, isn't in on the secret. In the first half of the novel, Dana narrates coming to terms with her complicated family and seeks a relationship with Chaurisse, and in the second half, we get Chaurisse's point-of-view on the same events. Jones is very good at relatable but complicated characters, and I found myself shifting allegiances as I read, and feeling deep sympathy for both girls by the end.





A Wind in the Door, Madeleine L'Engle: If you and/or your family's resident middle-grade reader loved A Wrinkle in Time, don't miss this poignant sequel. Meg is a teenager now, and her beloved brother Charles Wallace is navigating a serious illness. With the help of her friend Calvin and some mysterious supernatural guides, Meg has to confront the darkness that threatens her brother's life from within. I adored this book as a child and am still moved by it as an adult—the sibling relationship between Meg and Charles Wallace is such a gift to literature, and as in A Wrinkle in Time, L'Engle's characters remain human, and even sometimes humorous, as they set out to save the world.

Bonus: Ready Player One, Ernest Cline: Cline's book—now a movie—is the Common Reading for incoming freshmen at TCU this year. If you're into layers upon layers of 80s pop culture references and stories where friendship saves the day, this might be a good Bildungsromanfor you. Beware the all-too-plausible environmental and economic dystopia in which this adventure is set.

## SIGNPOSTS OF LIFE

I know I have written about the TxDOT installed warning sign: "Bridge May Ice In Cold Weather" and how the State of Texas could save taxpayer money by investing the cost of those signs by increasing state public education funding, maybe for physics lessons about cold road surfaces, moisture, and speeding vehicles!

But on a recent road trip south on US 281, after a morning snack at the Koffee Kup in Hico, I came upon a sign that seemed to sum up the divisions in our country:

"No Center Line!" (The explanation mark is my addition.) It referred to the dangerous condition of driving on a recently paved roadway without a painted line down the center. But could possibly describe our lack of cooperation, agreement, and compromise about the issues that face our country today.

It got me to thinking about other road signs that can have multiple meanings:

"Seek Alternate Route" – Seen prior to active road construction, this week approaching Bluebonnet Circle is an example. But maybe it is a direction that we need to, as they say, think outside the box to find a solution, a better way forward – an alternate route.

"School Zone" – Is it a warning about young children or busy parents making their way to a school, or is it about how we all need to keep learning throughout our lives?

"End School Zone" – Is about traffic safety for sure.

The power of the freeway overhead sign:

We want to be on the 'look out' for a lost senior in 1986 Buick LeSabre. (Have you noticed they are never driving a 2017 Jeep Wrangler JK Rubicon with removal doors?)

We are a data driven society. We expect our iPhone's GPS app like Waze or a TxDOT freeway sign to actually be able to tell us how many minutes it is to I20, I30 or I820. We want to believe that there is a computer program calculating the time it takes to get from where we are to where we might want to go.

Watch for other TxDOT signs which might have meanings beyond the highway and on to the highway of life. Post those signs on our neighborhood Facebook page so we all can learn the lessons of the road.

## **NEWS TO USE**

#### Starting the Third Quarter

Tips for homeowners to finish strong

Any athletics coach will tell you the start of the 3rd quarter of a game often sets the course for its remainder and how the team will finish. Come out strong and you'll likely finish strong - and win the game.

We are now a few weeks into the 3rd quarter of 2018. As if you need more to do, we ask "How's it going?" Where's that list of projects you made? Next to those new year resolutions? Ever thought about a set of **HOUSE RULES** to help manage them? Here are a few to help manage a strong 3rd quarter, finish out the rest of the year, and keep your home strong:

**August:** Replace tungsten or compact fluorescent light bulb with LEDs. Consider better security during the vacation season by adding motion sensor controls to lighting or installing cameras.

**September**: Labor day is a good time to install or test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and


replace the batteries. Add weather-stripping to pull-down attic stairs or access holes. Insulate backs of panels.

**October**: Check those doors – replace worn out door sweeps to insulate against heat/cold changes. Clean the gutters and make sure downspouts are flowing freely.


**November**: Check your foundation and roof for holes or problem areas. First freezes of the season often come in November, so prep for outside faucet protection early and save that plumbing bill!

**December**: Do you have a FIRE ESCAPE plan? Create one and practice it. Check that household chemicals are out of reach of children. Know who to call and where your poison hotline number is. The NATIONAL number is 800-222-1222, which connects callers to local centers.
